MASS MEETING AT OPERA HOUSE

Large Audience to Hear Rev. W. D. Wilson Sunday Afternoon.

A numerous and attentive audience greeted Mr. W. D. Wilson the traveling Secretary of the N. B. Temperance Alliance on Sunday afternoon. The chair was taken by His Worship Mayor N. C. Mackay. In a few brief remarks, Major Mackay expressed himself as feeling it an honour to be asked to preside at this meeting. He said that while dissatisfaction might exist over the non-enforcement or inefficient enforcement of the law, no one could doubt that prohibition had been of vast benefit to the country. He then introduced Mr. Boothroy as the first speaker.

Mr. Boothroy said in brief that the liquor question was the largest social question of the day. It was larger than the tariff or the navy or any other public question of Canada. The liquor traffic had besmirched and hurt our political life. It was the evil of party politics. It was politically an evil. It was an injury to the public health. It had killed more than smallpox or influenza. The medical profession was almost solidly against it. Lastly, it was economically bad and in this day we cannot afford to waste. He concluded by extending an invitation to all present to enroll in the Alliance, for the help of everyone would be needed in the coming referendum.

Mr. Wilson on rising to speak was greeted with loud applause. He said that this temperance question was a question for the doctor, the lawyer, the social worker and the minister. The doctor called intemperance a disease; the lawyer, a crime; to the social worker it was a vice and to the minister of Christ's gospel a sin. All these forces were opposed to it and before their challenge it must one day be wiped out.

But this will never be done by sitting down and thinking about it. Today in New Brunswick we are four days behind every other province but Quebec and hard work would be needed before we could catch up. The trouble is that most men are looking for the soft and easy jobs and are not willing to get out into the trenches. He quoted the poem, whose closing lines were:
The world is saved by sacrifice
Who saves it bows his head and dies.
A witty anecdote emphasized the fact that we can take out of this movement only what we put in.

The referendum was asked by the Alliance for June 27th but the speaker emphasized the fact that the question was not settled even then, pointing out that the brewers were already asking to be allowed to increase their alcohol percentage to 10 per cent.

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Hope Purchased for Fire Department—Police Duties Again Up.

A meeting of the town council was held Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. The full board was present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Chas. Stevens was asking for position as fireman at Electric Light Station. Placed on file. J. L. Lechance wrote re Town Engineer. Placed on file.

The town solicitor wrote that it was too late to have legislation passed, in reference to appointment of an auditor. He felt that this matter could be changed by the enactment of a by-law. Letter placed on file.

R. Flann wrote in reference to job as caretaker of dumping ground. He wanted \$1.50 per day from April 15th to June 1st and \$15.00 per month from that date until Oct. 31st. Another applicant was willing to do the work for \$1.25 per day. Both were referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee.

The town solicitor wrote explaining that Mr. Allard had applied for a loan under the housing act and his application had been approved. He had given a mortgage on his lot, but now decided he would not build and wished mortgage discharged. The Mayor and Town Clerk were authorized to sign such discharge.

Coun. Bisset asked if there was any probability of getting more money under the Housing Scheme. The Clerk read a letter from the local government executive stating that no money was available at present. Coun. Bisset moved that the communication lay on the table to be taken up later.—Carried.

The special auditor Mr. F. L. Belyea reported a progress of work of auditing the town books and enclosed a bill for \$125.00 on account. Coun. Belle-Isle criticized the progress of the work of the auditor. He stated that there had been about five weeks delay in commencing the work and that it was valuable. The report and account were referred to the Finance Committee.

SUSTAINED ACTION OF JUDGE BARRY

In a Restigouche County Court Case Which Was Heard at Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, April 13.—This morning the Appeal Court heard argument in a county court case from Restigouche, that of the King vs. H. F. McLatchey, judge of the County Court, ex parte Peter Dechene. This was a case where the plaintiff, Dechene, had recovered a verdict of \$72 on an action for debt in a magistrate's court, and in which Judge McLatchey reversed the decision on review. Application was then made to Mr. Justice Barry for a rule nisi to set aside the judgment of Judge McLatchey and the rule was made, returnable at court to-day. The court, unanimously, decided to confirm the rule granted by Judge Barry, being convinced that there would be a gross miscarriage of justice if the rule were set aside.

2.—Are we going to allow the dance halls to operate without license? 3.—What is the revenue from the Opera House? Coun. Wallace thought that the whole matter should be taken up and discussed very carefully. These were very important matters, and should be carefully considered.

Coun. Belle-Isle spoke strongly for an increase in license fee from the Opera House. Coun. Belle-Isle moved that the four questions be referred to the By-law and Legislation Committee.—Carried.

Coun. Moore stated it was necessary to purchase some new hose. The chief of the fire department and himself had looked over the samples and recommended that 900 ft. of a certain grade at \$1.85 per foot be purchased. Coun. Belle-Isle moved that the Fire Protection Committee be authorized to purchase 900 feet of this special hose from the Dunlop Co. at \$1.85 per foot.—Carried.

Coun. Patterson moved to revert to unfinished business to reconsider matter of the resolution passed on Feb. 28th and the Solicitors letter in reference to same. The motion carried on the casting vote of the Mayor on the following vote:—Patterson, Wallace, Moores, Bisset, Nays—Duncan, Belle-Isle, Chamberlain, St. Ouge. His Worship stated that he was of the opinion that he would be justified in ruling that this motion be non-existent.

Coun. Belle-Isle contended that the whole matter was out of order. If the Temperance Alliance instead of endeavoring to lay this matter talked of resolution rescinded would co-operate with the council and use their influence to get inspectors appointed, he would soon have a dry town. But they did not want the law strictly enforced. Were satisfied to catch the poor boot-legger while the ones higher up were never fined, thus bringing water to a local lawyer's mill. If the law was strictly enforced this lawyer would be out of a job.

The game was fast and interesting, all through and the audience present enjoyed many exciting incidents which arose during the game. The score was 18-25 in favor of the Newcastle C. G. I. T. team.

The audience was a large and appreciative one and took a keen interest in each and every play that was made. Both teams were matched and considered the short time are deserving of credit for the splendid manner in which they acquitted themselves in their second game.

DR. A. G. FERGUSON PASSED AWAY

Death of Provincial Dalhousie Resident Took Place Sunday.

Dalhousie, April 12.—This community was shocked on Sunday morning on learning that Dr. A. G. Ferguson had passed away at 3.30 a.m. Dr. Ferguson had been confined to his bed for over two months and just a few days previous to his death it was reported he was slightly recovering, so that the news of his death came as a great surprise to everybody. Impressive services were conducted by the Rev. R. J. Coleman at the home on Tuesday morning. The Rev. Mr. Coleman spoke eloquently and with a great deal of feeling on the life of the deceased. After the services the body was taken to the train where it was conveyed to Bathurst for interment. It was accompanied by his only child, Miss Roslyn Ferguson, other relatives and several Dalhousie friends, among them being Rev. R. J. Coleman, Mayor Barriar, Murray McKay, Thomas Scott, W. A. Craig, James Duncan, John Midgley and James Miller. Interment was in the Presbyterian cemetery. Services were conducted by Rev. R. J. Coleman and Rev. A. D. Arthurs. The pall-bearers were: James Henderson, W. J. Kent, J. B. H. Storer, H. Melanson, A. N. De-Brisay and Alexander Ferguson. The late Dr. Ferguson practiced over thirty years in Dalhousie where he had a large practice and was highly respected. He was a school trustee for many years and was also Chairman of the County Board of Health. When the Town was first incorporated under a board of three commissioners, Dr. Ferguson was one of the board along with the Hon. C. H. LaBillem and Capt. Powell. The first modern improvements to the town took place while these three men were at the head. The late Dr. Ferguson is survived by his wife and one daughter to whom the community extends its deepest sympathy in their sad bereavement.

INFORMATION RE SALMON FISHING

Policy of Dominion Government in Regard to Quebec Tidal Waters.

On March 2nd, Hon. Charles Macell M. P. for Bonaventure gave notice of the questions given below. It was only answered by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries on March 31st, on the eve of issuing licenses.

Mr. Macell (Bonaventure):

1. Will salmon fishery licenses for the tidal waters of the Province of Quebec be issued this year by the Department of Marine and Fisheries? If so, when?
2. What policy is to be adopted.
3. Will the present holders of licenses from the province be given the preference for these licenses?
4. Will applications have to be made?
5. If so, to whom and when?
6. Will due notice be given to license holders and the public generally and will application blanks be supplied?
7. Who are the fishery officials for the country of Bonaventure?

Answers:

1. Yes. After April first, next.
2. Licenses will be granted in accordance with the fishery regulations keeping in view adequate protection of the fisheries.
3. All applications for licenses will be considered on their merits.
4. Yes.
5. To a local fishery officer or to the Department of Marine and Fisheries.
6. Notice has already been given through the press. No special form of application is required.
7. None at present.

DRIVE TO THE RIGHT.

Public opinion generally will heartily support the government if the law passed two years ago, giving the executive power to put into effect the law providing for driving to the right should be proclaimed. New Brunswick is in an anomalous position. All over the country—except in the Maritime Provinces—people drive to the right, and automobilists who come to this province find themselves in an awkward position and one sometimes fraught with danger. As a matter of fact many accidents have occurred. New Brunswick stands to gain, not to lose, by making the change. It would help to increase the tourist traffic and thereby aid in improving the business situation. The efforts made by the New Brunswick Tourist Association would be strongly aided. The St. John Retail Merchants' Association support the idea of a change; so have some of the Boards of Trade. In principle, Hon. Mr. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, favors driving to the right, but has not yet made up his mind to put the law in operation. The time has come, however, when action should be taken. Ample notice has been given that a permissive law is on the statutes, and nobody would be taken by surprise—Globe.

OUR W. C. T. U. WOMEN.

I wonder if we have ever thought what an honor it is to be a W.C.T.U. woman. There are many organizations today doing splendid work, and many of us have seen fit to cast in our lot with them. Yet the old W.C.T.U. goes marching on. The evil doer would be glad to see it wiped out of existence, because it is one society that they are afraid of sometimes. We are at our wits end to know what to do to prevent certain things from going on. A certain man was nominated for the eldership of a Presbyterian Church, he went to his wife and said, "I cannot take this office, even if I am elected. I would be of no use." His wife tried to persuade him to do so. At last he came back smiling and said "I'll take it. There is one thing I could do, I could object." Many times the only thing the local W.C.T.U., seems to be able to do is object, and yet the very fact that we will object, has made many a scheme fall through that might have been carried to a successful issue.

Let us stand true to our W.C.T.U.

The following cases have been tried before Police Magistrate Francis F. Matheson, under the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, during the month of March:

Edward Thompson, Upper Charlo, selling liquor illegally, Mar. 19th. Convicted and fined \$100.00 and costs.

Edward Thompson, Upper Charlo, selling liquor illegally Mar. 20th. Convicted and fined \$50.00 and costs.

Simon Diotte, Kedgwick, selling liquor illegally, escaped from constable while securing bail and is now supposed to be in the Province of Quebec.

CASE GOES AGAINST LUMBER FIRM

Chaleur Bay Mills Must Pay Demand Of Boucher.

Quebec, March 30, 1921.—Judgment was rendered yesterday by the Court of Appeal in the case of Boucher vs. Chaleurs Bay Mills.

This was a case from the District of Gaspé wherein Boucher was claiming \$1,800.00 from the Chaleurs Bay Mills for having made a part of their drive a couple of years ago.

The Chaleurs Bay Mills claimed that Boucher undertook to drive the river for a certain fixed amount whereas Boucher claimed that no specified amount was determined, and that the Chaleurs Bay Mills had to pay him what it cost.

The Superior Court at New Carlisle presided over by Justice Tessier, maintained the action taken by Boucher.

Boucher appealed to the Court of Appeals, Quebec, and the Court of Appeal has confirmed the judgment of the Superior Court.

The Chaleurs Bay Mills was represented by Mr. J. F. Bugeaud and Mr. O'Brady, K. C. of Sherbrooke, and Boucher by the Honorable John Hall Kelly.

The convention included delegates from most of the Rotary Clubs of northern New York State, Ontario and Quebec.

Premier Meighen, who was one of the speakers on Saturday, referred to the wisdom of creating on the North American Continent a spirit of conciliation uniting in friendship the two great people of the Anglo-Saxon race. He heartily welcomed the visitors to Ottawa. "This organization," he said, "has a factor to play in that great work. It is a common place to say yet it is very essential and it is my duty to say it that the good of the world for the next century depends upon the amity and concord of the Anglo-Saxon race more than on any other single thing. If there was ever a time when civilized people cling with eagerness around the thought to save civilization that time has now come. If, which God forbids, anything ever arose to destroy the friendly relations that now exist between the two great English-speaking nations, then indeed the future of civilization is black beyond the powers of description. The people of each country have a work to perform in their own country, to save extreme demands of the one country to the other."

The Prime Minister said that he didn't altogether fall in with the idea that the United States and Britain should some day dominate the world. "The idea of domination was not the right idea," he said, "neither the idea of domination nor of aggrandizement of power: The correct idea was the aggrandizement of service." (Cheers.)

LOGS ADRIPT IN THE MIRAMICHI.

NEWCASTLE, N. B., April 4.—A large boom of logs in the Southwest Miramichi broke away and has started down the river towards Chatham. It is estimated that there are more than 1,000,000 logs in this boom. The logs mixed with the vast quantities of ice at present running down the river. These logs were owned by nearly all the mill owners along the Miramichi river, and although it is said that J. W. Brankley is the heaviest owner.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

Under Sub-section 2 of Section 78 of the Highway Act, 1918, no motor vehicle is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of physicians, clergymen and ambulance drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3,000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the fifteenth day of March and the fifteenth day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. The damage which would be done by allowing motor vehicles on the highways during this time of the year would be beyond finances of the Province to repair. All those interested in good roads in this Province are requested to comply with the above law and to co-operate in the enforcing of same. The above law will be strictly enforced by the Department and all supervisors and other employees of the Department are ordered to report any violations and to see that those guilty of same are prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Casement Caught Between Devil and the Deep Sea

Says the Princess Blucher

An interesting sidelight on the wartime activities of Sir Roger Casement is thrown by Princess Blucher in her diary, published under the title "An English Wife in Berlin." People who like to follow the comings and goings of title folk will remember that Evelyn, Princess Blucher, was an English woman who married Prince (then Count) Blucher in 1907. The prince, who was the great-grandson of Waterloo fame, lived with his wife in London a good deal of the time, and they were well known in English society before the war. After 1914 they made their home at the Esplanade Hotel in Berlin, the headquarters of a colony of recognized "internationalists," and two other Englishwomen in the same plight as herself, Princess Munster and Princess Pils, aided Princess Blucher in her efforts to assist the British prisoners and wounded.

Her version of many historical events will accordingly have considerable value in the making of history, and what she tells of the position of Casement indicates that the Irishman got himself into a strange predicament when he went into Germany. Sir Roger was not returned with open arms. The latter type of German, the aristocrats among them, probably hoped to be a rebel, and others laughed at him as a mad who was peevish because he had failed. Princess Blucher told Casement that he had made a mistake when he entered Germany. In due time he found out that she was right. The military party, who suspected him of being a spy, bit upon a scheme to test him, and it was one that practically put him between the devil and the deep sea. If he had refused to do as they suggested he would probably have been shot sooner or later for being a spy, and as the plan was one which he knew would not work, he had to face the alternative of being hanged in England as a traitor. Sir Roger's predicament may seem to some people almost like cruel comedy, and to others like crystal poetic justice. We know the choice that he made, and the sequel.

There was something like a medieval sense of humor in the German test of Casement. It suggests those trials of witches and others that proved fatal whether they convicted or acquitted the accused. That he realized how disastrous was his mistake is indicated by the account which Princess Blucher gives of their final interview before he started on the expedition to the west coast of Ireland that brought him to the gallows:

"The poor man came into the room like one demented, talked in a husky whisper, rushed round examining all the doors, and then said: 'I have something to say to you, are you sure no one is listening?' 'For one moment I was frightened. I felt I was in the presence of a madman, and worked my way round to sit near the telephone so as to be able to call for help. And then he began. You were right to own you were right, and I did not like to tell you when you kept on urging me to get out of the country, that I realized from the moment I landed here what a terrific mistake I had made. I did not want to tell you that in reality I was a prisoner here. I could not get away. My wife will not let me out of the country.

"The German Foreign Office have had me abandoned, believing I was a spy in the pay of England, and England has had men spying on me all the time as well.

"Now the German Admiralty have asked me to go on an errand which all my being revolts against, and I am going mad at the thought of it, for will make me appear a traitor to the Irish cause.

"And at these words he sat down and burst into a cold, bitter, and man was beside himself with terror and grief, and so I tried to get a few more definite facts out of him, and told him there is a way out of every difficulty if he would only tell me the truth.

"But he said, 'If I told you more, it would endanger the lives of many, and as it is, it is only my life that has to be sacrificed.' I made all sorts of suggestions, but all he would say was: 'They are holding a pistol to my head here if I refuse, and they have a hangman's rope ready for me in England; and so the only thing for me to do is to go out and kill myself!'

"Well," remarked Tommy Stubbs, "you can say what you like, but I reckon your father's about the meanest man who ever lived. Think of his telling you walk about in them old shoes, and him a shoemaker, too!" "That's not so," replied Bobby Roberts. "My father ain't near so mean as yours, any way. Why, just think of him being a dentist and your baby only got one tooth!"
