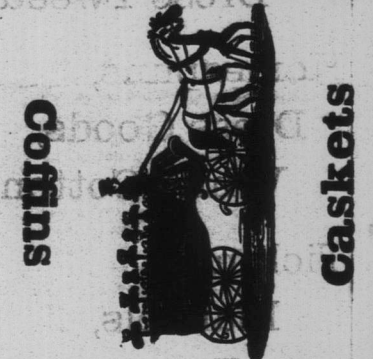

Reminiscences of the Farmers' Association.

Resuming our remarks on the re-

presentative character of the Farmers' Association

as assembled at its last Annual Meeting, and having already

noted the representatives from Car-

leton, York and Sanbury, Queen's

will be next in order. The repre-

sentatives from this County were

Thos. O. Donnell, Geo. L. Colwell,

John Slipp, Isaac Fox, Israel Slipp,

Fraser Fox, Charles Slipp, Amasa

Merritt, and S. L. Peters, represent-

ing the Agricultural Societies of

Cambridge Union and Queen's Cen-

tral, and the County Farmers' League.

Queen's has always taken a warm inter-

est in the Association and the interest

which it fosters, and at every session

its delegates have given proof of their

attachment to agricultural pursuits

and their sincere desire for the gen-

eral prosperity of the Province.

The gentleman whose name is first

on the list of delegates, resides in the

Parish of Johnston, and claimed to be

the representative of the small farm-

ers. He might well have added the

successful member also. Mr. O. Donnell

is always listened to with interest, and

his plain matter of fact argument

always tells in the interest of the

subject under discussion. Messrs. G.

Colwell, Israel Slipp, and Charles

Slipp reside in the Parish of Cam-

bridge, are extensive farmers, as are

Messrs. Israel and Fraser Fox, who

reside in the Parish of Gagetown.

Messrs. John Slipp, Amasa Merritt,

and S. L. Peters reside in the Parish

of Hammonds. Mr. Slipp has prob-

ably the largest herd of Short Horns

in the Province and takes a great

interest in breeding good stock. Mr.

Merritt is an extensive farmer, and

has the honor of representing his

Parish at the Municipal Board, as does

Mr. Charles Slipp, of Cambridge.

Of Mr. Peters, who, for the past three

years has filled the position of Sec-

retary of the Association, we have only

to say that, from the manner in which

his reports have been received, he

may feel assured that his efforts were

appreciated.

The delegates from Westmorland

were, Mr. F. George, Mr. Humphrey,

Howard Treman, Thos. Pickett and

O. E. Flewelling, representing the

Agricultural Societies of the County.

Mr. George is largely engaged in the

dairy interest, manufacturing mostly

cheese. In a recent visit to his farm-

stead, we were much pleased with the

arrangement of his farm buildings

and his system of cooking food for his

stock, which he claims pays well.

He is a pleasing speaker and well

poised on all matters connected with

agriculture. Mr. Humphrey is re-

cognized as the champion of the Model

Farm and Agricultural School Move-

ment, is largely engaged in fat-

tening cattle for the English Mar-

ket, having 40 head now feeding, and

which he proposes shipping at an

early day. Mr. Treman may be

said to be the essayist of the Associa-

tion, and his contributions have re-

ceived the kindly notice of the press

as well as the thanks of the Associa-

tion for the writer. The position of

Secretary of the Association, which

he now holds, will give him additional

opportunities for the use of his ready

pen.

Mr. Pickett is well informed and

takes a deep interest in agricultural

pursuits. His criticisms are accompa-

nied by an air of calmness and

humor are always enjoyable and

well poised on all matters connected
