crimson tide of intemperance sweeps away ever-increasing thousands to ruin. Only a few days ago I had a conversation with Dr. Dawson Burns, the veteran temperance reformer. He has just published his annual survey of the expenditure on strong drink in Great Britain. No less than £142,250,000 were aquandered in 1891 on alcoholic liquors, of which £78,000,600 were spent on beer; that is a gross expenditure of £3 15s. (or about \$18s) per head of the population. The English are, I am sorry to say, greater consumers of stimulants than the Scotch, the Welsh, or the Irish. It is also sad to note that the expenditure for 1891 is an increase of £1. 750,000 on 1890, notwithstanding the arnest efforts of vast temperance organizations. Yet I am glad to be able to report that the temperance cause is gaining ground in the Legislature, and amongst judges and magnistrates, there is a growing feeling in favor of more strigently regulating this dangerous traffic. The triumphant success of the "Progressive" party at the recent elections for the London County Council proves that browers and publicans are no longer going "to rule the roost." Our medical men, too, are becoming more chary in prescribing alcohol. Indeed a doctor who customarily tells his patients to take port wine, brandy or whisky, loses aste amongst his professional brethren, and is regarded as indolent, unstudious, and lacking in resource. The late Cardinal Manning is reported to have said, "Get thee behind me Satan," in answer to a physician who had urged him to take some alcoholic liquor. Well would it be for humanity if all persons would be as resolute in refusal as was the aged Cardinal!

Macmillan's Maga-zine for March says that in Russia and in zine for March says that in Russia and in Germany English has taken the place of French as the indispensable foreign tongue. Russians prefer English to their own ianguage for use in telegrams, as it conveys more meaning in a given number of words. At the recent conference respecting Samoa the deliberations were conducted, not in French but in English, for the sake of the Augustican, commissioners, the German American commissioners, the German representatives being all able to speak our tongue. In uncivilized lands English is spreading marvelously. Dr. Blyden, a Liberian himself, states that it has driven Liberian himself, states that it has driven out every other foreign tongue on the west coast of Africa, where Portuguese was so long the dominant language. The progress of English in India is rapid, and so it is even in Japan. Meanwhile the population is growing in the United States and Canada at a rate which in 100 years will give them as many inhabitants as China. Then think of a British empire in Australasia and South Africa, and it is evident that English will one day be the universal language.

HORSE POINTS.

Now is the time to watch the horses' shoulders. Be sure that collar and hames are a good fit, but not too tight. Don't forget to let cut the back strap and lazy strap, so the traces will be in line when hitched to the plow.

It is a good plan to have some white oak bark boiled and annoint the shoulders of your horses after unharnessing



Horticulture. THE APPLE SCAB. The apple scab is a parasitic fungus growing upon the leaf and fruit and flourishing west Territories and British Columbia, in the hope of being able to set that territory apart as a separate jurisdiction. With this in view, Mr. John Milne, past grand workman, of Essex, was lately solicited to visit that country and establish lodges. He consented to do so, and will shortly start for Manitoba. The arrangements were finally concluded at a meeting held in St. Thomas Wednesday, in the office of Grand Recorder Carder. There were present: G. M., W. Inwood, of Toronto; G. M. Examiner Colton, of Lambton Mills; Col. Dawson, London; T. C. Irving, Toronto; H. B. Taylor, Whitby, the finance committee and Mr. Milne. varieties which escape the scab, but in some seasons, however, it respects neither condition of soil, mode of culture, nor variety of fruit. So also varieties notably free from disease in one section may scab badly in some other locality more or less remote.

It has been demonstrated by experiments made by and under the direction of the Ohio station, that the growth of scab fungus may be checked by spraying the tree at proper times during the spring with several of the copper compounds commonly used as fungicides. So far as tested the most satisfactory compound is dilute Bordeaux mixture containing 4 pounds of lime, 4 pounds of copper sulphate and 50 gallons of water.

As directed by Mr. Green, the horticulturist of the station, the first application should be made before or about the time the leaves open, the Bordeaux mixture being used alone. The second spraying should be made immediately after the blossoms fall. In this paris green or London purple may be combined with the dilute Bordeaux mixture to destroy the apple worm. The third application may be made a week or ten days from the time of the second and with the same materials. The fourth and last application for the season should be made in about two weeks from the time of the third, and dilute Bordeaux mixture alone used. For early ripening varieties the fourth application may be

It appears that spraying greatly increases the market value of all the varieties experimented upon, and in the case of Newtown pippin the value was more than doubled. The difference was also quite marked with Beilflower and Smith's cider, but less so with Baldwin and Greening. The effect of judicious spraying with fungicides is to check the dropping of immature fruit in the spring, to cause it to grow to larger size and more free from blemishes, to cause it to hang better to the tree while ripening and take on higher color and to improve its keeping quality.

A CHEAP GRAITING WAX.

Take equal parts good clay and fresh cow manure. Mix thoroughly and it will be ready for use. Tie a cloth or rag around the wax when applied to prevent rain from washing it off. I experimented with the above last spring with good success. I will use it again this spring. Try it.

KEEF CLOVER OUT OF ORCHARDS.
The orchard is one little field that nearly every farmer has that helps to increase or decrease the income of the farm. It cannot be rotated many years as other fields.
There is no kind of grass seed when sown that will do the trees much good. Clover is the one special grass to enrich land, but when sown in orchards with fruit trees the clover takes up the saltpetre and other floating ingredients from the atmosphere that are so essential to the growth of the growing trees, so much so that if kept continually in clover four or five years without feeding the ground with manure or fertilizer the trees will not only cease growing but will become blighted and soon die for want of nourishment.
