Salaries of Rulers.

Marked Difference Between Those in Republics and Monarchies.

The Czar Heads the List-Austria is Next-The Complete List. There is a marked disparity in the

salaries of executive officials paid in monarchical and under republican governments. In the former liberal payments for little actual service are the rule in the smaller kingdoms, whereas rulers is materially less, and in some the rate of compensation is frugal even to the verge of parsimony.

The United States pay, it is known,

550,000 a year to the President of a republic of 75,000,000 people. The King of Portugal, the ruler of a country having a population of only 4,500,000 receives each year \$635,000. The President of the Federal Council of Switzer land receives for his more or less yalliland receives for his more or less valuable services in that historic republic of 3,000,000 inhabitants, \$3,000 a year; whereas the King of Saxony, who is, in fact, a king in name only, the more important affairs of Saxony being con-trolled and directed from Berlin, gets a salary of \$735,000. The population of Saxony is not materially larger than that of Switzerland. In area, Saxony covers 5,700 square miles, and Switzerland nearly 16,000. The President of the Republic of France receives an annual allowance of 600,000 francs, which is equivalent to \$125,000, and he has, moreover, an additional allowance of \$125,000 for expenses. France is a nation of nearly 60,000,000 inhabitants, colonies included, and the President of the French Republic exercises legal jurisdiction over 3,600,000 square miles of territory. The Emperor of Austria, who rules over territory oneas large, receives in a year \$3,875,000. The King of Sweden and Norway, within whose domains 6,700,000 inhabitants reside, has \$575,000 a year salary. 

Dr. Nansen's first intention as to his calling in life was to study medicine g in life was to study medicine With the idea of taking the medical examination at Nordmarken, he began to study zoology, and at the suggestion of Prof. Collett, in 1881 or there abouts, he shipped aboard a sealing vessel—the Viking—to train himself for descriptive zoological research. During this trip the Viking was for some weeks caught in the ice off the eastern coast of Greenland, and Nansen be-came filled with the desire to cross that inhospitable country. Even then he wanted to go ashore and explore, but could not get permission. But he hunted seals and polar bears, and took note of everything. He brought back with him a settled purpose to return to Greenland and cross it to the wes-tern coast. Meanwhile, by the help of Prof. Collett, he got the place of curator of the Bergen Museum, which he held for four or five years, studying meanwhile in his favorite branches of science for his doctor's degree months in 1886 he spent in the zoological school at Naples. 




