





Day by day the Bolshevists grow more arrogant, more amazing, more impossible. Now it is Litvinoff who speaks. "The Allies, having lost their war with Russia," he says, "we are here to make peace. We have named our conditions. We must be paid for what Russia did for the Allies, and we must be paid for the damage the Allies did Russia through Kolchak, Denikine and Wrangel and by the blockade, for which America also is responsible. We claim 125, 000,000,000 gold francs. We cannot make peace and go back with less than 20,000,000,000 gold francs."

And the worst of it is that these fellows are in earnest. They have seen various European nations fishing for Russian business, and they have convinced themselves that Europe is really willing to go down on her knees. For this misapprehension LLOYD GEORGE is himself in some measure responsible. He has been foremost in urging some measure of intercourse with Russia, and has held out encouragements to Russian representatives. He knew, of course, that he was dealing with political Janatics, but he thought they were shrewd enough to know on which side their bread was buttered. If, as now seems highly probable, the conference is to be wrecked by Bolshevist misapprehension of Europe's attitude it will be hard punishment for the British prime minister, whose hopes were centred in the Genoa assembly. It will bring a cervain sardonic satisfaction to the Yrench who, while wishing LLOYD GEORGE well, never acknowledged any confidence in his ability to get results from a diplomatic pow-wow with the international outlaws.

The Russo-German treaty is a bit of impudence. It does not materially add to the gloom of the diplomatic outlook. That was already as gloomy as it could be. The Russians have not made themselves any more impossible by taking this astounding step, but the Germans have largely alienated the support of their advocates and well-wishers in the Allied Clearly, the RAPOLLO agreement tends to dispose of property on which the Allies have a lien. Till Germany pays her own obligations she has no moral right to cancel debts owed to her by Russia or any other state. Aside from this aspect of the agreement it is clearly a piece of bravado, designed to influence the Genoa decisions. In this it will signally fail. While it does





The vacuous space between the filament and plate is conductive in one direction only. The negative of both the plate and filament currents forms a common negative.

The grid is placed between the filament and the plate and acts as a controlling element of the electron currents between filament and plate Since the plate in the tube has only a positive potential, the electrons thrown off by the filament are strongly attracted through the vacuum and an increased current will flow. This acts as an accelerator of the current. By proper regulation of controlling
