Neither of the reports are official. From a Russian source it is stated that the Vladivostock fleet has sailed to the attack of Jap cities on the Island of Yezzo. The occupation of the Korean towns of Anju and Ping Yang is confirmed, the Russians retiring from these points in accordance with preconceived o plans. Russia, in view of an expected early attack upon New Chwang, is endeavoring to have that port declared neutral. St. Petersburg fears that a succession of Jap successes by land would bring out the

Chinese as active allies of the Mikado. The Russians are slowly retreating across the Yalu, only 1,500 men remaining on the south bank. Duke of Cambridge, who died Thursday, was removed yesterday from Gloucester House in Park Lane to Westminster Abbey, preparatory to the funeral service today. The casket was draped with the Union Jack and was placed on a gun carriage, drawn THE WORLD'S FAMOUS REMEDY by six horses, and escorted by a squadron of the Royal Horse Guards. The gun carriage was followed to the abbey by the members of the duke's family, and his suite in carriages. Thousands of persons lined the street from Gloucester House to the abbey. At the abbey, the coffin was received by the Dean of Westminster and the clergy, and placed in St. Faith's chapel, where a detachment of the Guards will remain on duty during the P. Q. night. Prior to the removal of the body, a brief service was held in the state dining-room at Gloucester House, which was attended by King Edward, Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of the royal family.
