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

Has wee Phil or Marjory been telling about the Supplemental Hymn: the words are almost too long nebbed for their unpractised tongues? Of course every one is anxious to know about it, and to help the bairnies learn it. There are two hymns a year, one each six months. They are part of the Supplemental Lesson, which includes also Scripture Memory Verses and other items. They are hymns which the children are set to learn when they are very young, because they are great hymns, which it is good to know and

which will go singing themselves in their hearts all their days: for what we learn when little we never forget.

Why not make the parlor ring with the children's Supplemental Hymn? The piano or organ was never put in happier or holier use. Before they are aware of it, even the wee ones who cannot read, know the hymn by repeating it with the others. They are happy ten times over if they can go to the Sunday School and say the hymn and sing it.

And such a hymn, for example, as the first for this year (Hymn 538, Book of Praise), how the singing of it hallows the place and the hour and the loving family circle, as step by step it leads from the wondering, trembling question—

"Who is He in yonder stall, At whose feet the shepherds fall?" all along the pathway of the Son of God on earth to the triumphant cry—

"Who is He that on yon throne

Howall hearts go out into the swelling chorus—

#### The Bedtime Hour By M. E. B. Thomson

The mother's great work is the building of character in her children. In every building, spiritual and material, details count enormously. Among the most important of the details in the mother's task I count her presence with the children at bedtime. Not that I found it a time with the little ones

for serious talk, or so called "personal dealing."
But they are either tired or excited, and they
do need then the mother's soothing hand
and feeling of restful love about them. To
little children, the end of the day is finality;
mother's presence, comfort;—a feeling closely
akin to the larger soul's need of God at the
last. So the true mother will let the occasions be few when she is not there.

Do not be betrayed into making these few moments a set occasion for anything but what is happy. Hear the evening prayer, whisper a word of God's love and your own into the small ear; then the bright eyes and busy brain sink to rest with a delightful sense of

> "God's in His heaven, All's right with the world!"

—a precious heritage, and one a child will never lose through all the changes of a changing world.

To me the chief feature of the bedtime hour is the importance to the child of one hour in the day when he is sure of seeing mother, and all to himself. Mother may say little to him, he may say little to her, six nights out of the seven, but on the seventh she may receive a confidence she might never get again—a fatal loss.

When your absence is necessary, make the deprivation to yourself felt and make it an important occasion. Leave a special message for each little heart. If this seems all very trifling, remind yourself that in building, every trifle counts. Trifles make perfection, but as the world's greatest sculptor said, "Perfection is no trifle."

She speaks English with a pretty accent.

On cold or stormy days, after the school hours are over and household tasks are done, Lucy turns with a happy heart to the playroom, where she amuses herself by making moccasins for her funny babies or making dresses for them from bits of bright calico, which perhaps some child in the far-away East had put in the missionary bale.

When tired of the babies, she gets her pebble tops, of which she has a number hidden away in the pocket of her dress, tucked away in a corner of her pigeonhole in the row of boxes in the playroom, or buried safely under the steps. It is only a common pebble with smooth sides, and a little white child would never call it a top; but Lucy drops it with a little whirl of the fingers which sends it spinning away with a dizzy rush, and she follows it up with her whip, lashing it until she is tired and out of breath, the pebble whirling faster and faster the longer the lashing continues. Sometimes she pastes bits of bright paper to its sides, and then the spinning pebble seems to be covered with rings of color. It is a pretty play, and never loses its fascination for the little brown children.

When at her own home, Lucy goes coasting sometimes, and what do you think she has for a sled? You would never guess, so I will tell you. A buffalo skin is spread on the snow at the top of the terrace which divides the prairie from the river bottom. Lucy and her sister find a nice warm seat on the soft fur, the child in front gathers the end over her feet and holds on tight and fast as those behind give a starting push, and away they go down the steep slopes and come to a quick stop at the foot, a screaming, laughing, squirming heap of tousled heads and twisted shawls.

THE LESSON RETOLD

For hundreds of years the Jews had been watching and waiting for the coming of the Saviour. But when He came, very few people knew anything about it, for, instead of appearing suddenly in Jerusalem as a great King and Deliverer, Christ, the Son of God, was born as a little Babe in the quiet village of Bethlehem.

At the time of Jesus' birth, Mary and Joseph were living in the village of Nazareth, where orders had been received from the Emperor, that on a certain day every family must return to its native town, to be taxed. Then Mary and her husband set out to go to Bethlehem, to enrol their names as descendants of their great ancestor, King David. But when they reached Bethlehem, it was late at night, the inn where they expected to stay was too

crowded to take them in, and they were obliged to seek shelter in an empty stable. Here Christ, the great Saviour of the world, was born a little Babe, and was laid by His mother to sleep upon the hay in one of the mangers.

Now the first people to know that the Saviour had come were some shepherds, who, as they kept watch over their flocks in the fields outside Bethlehem, suddenly saw the sky above them filled with heavenly light; and they were much afraid. But an angel appeared and spoke to them, saying, "Fear not: for, behold I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." And suddenly the air became filled with angels, all

Then, when they had found Him, the shepherds began to spread abroad the glad tidings of the Saviour's birth, until soon everyone in Bethlehem was talking of the wonderful thing that had come to pass in their midst; and the shepherds returned to their work, glorifying and praising God for all that they had seen and heard.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

Soon after Jesus was born in Bethlehem, King Herod, who ruled over Jerusalem and Judga, received a visit from three scholars who had traveled all the way to his palace from their homes in the far East, to ask him a certain question.

Herod's visitors were called Magi, or Wise Men. They had spent many years in studying the sacred books of their own and other countries. Like the Jews, they, too, were looking forward to the coming of a great King or Deliverer who should rule over the whole world.

At this time it was a common belief among Eastern people that, when any great man was born, a new star appeared in the sky; and the Wise Men now came to Herod, saying that they had seen such a star in their Eastern heavens, and asked him, saying, "Tell us where is He that is born King of the Jews, for we have come to worship Him."

Now Herod was a cruel and wicked ruler. and when he and his courtiers heard the Wise Men asking about a king who, they feared, might take away the kingdom, they were both angry and frightened. But the cunning Herod pretended to his visitors that he was much interested in their quest, and calling for the chief priests and scribes, he asked them if they knew anything of Christ, and where He should be born. "In Bethlehem of Judæa," they answered. "For thus it is written by the prophet, 'Out of Bethlehem shall come a Governor, that shall rule My people Israel."

Herod then took the Wise Men aside, and questioned them privately as to the exact time when they had seen the star; and directing them to Bethlehem, he said, "Go, search diligently for the young Child, and bring me word when you have found Him, that I may come and worship Him also." Herod did not mean to do as he said. His plan was to find out where Jesus was, and, if possible, put Him to death.

To their great joy, the star of which the Wise Men had spoken went before them, till at last it came and stood over the very house where the young Child lay; and upon going in they found Him with Mary, His mother, and fell down and worshipped Him.

So certain were the Wise Men of finding Jesus, that they had brought with them treasures of gold and frankincense and myrrh, which were the presents offered to kings, and when they had opened their bags they presented Him their gifts, and joyfully prepared to return again to their homes. 

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

When Herod knew that the Wise Men had returned to their own country without telling him where Jesus was, he was so angry that it was no longer safe for Mary and Joseph to remain in Bethlehem, and God warned them in a dream to flee with the Child Jesus into the land of Egypt. But when Herod was dead, they returned to Nazareth, the place where Jesus afterwards spent the greater part of His life.

The first great event in Jesus' life happened when He was twelve years old. At twelve a Jewish boy was considered of age, and Mary and Joseph now planned to take Jesus with them when they went to Jerusalem on their yearly visit to the Feast of the Passover, that He might make His first attendance upon the worship and service of the temple. At that season, the roads were crowded with travelers from all parts of the country, and it took

several days for Jesus and His parents to make their way on foot from Nazareth to Jerusalem. During the Passover Feast, a whole week was spent in worship and holiday making, for, besides the solemn services of the temple, there were feastings and family gatherings and all kinds of rejoicings, for this was the greatest of all festival times among the Jews.

Now, when the Feast was over, Mary and Joseph, with a large party of their relatives and neighbors, set out to return to Nazareth, and thinking that Jesus had gone on ahead with some of the company, they traveled a whole day without missing Him. But when at night they found that Jesus was not with them, as they supposed, Mary and Joseph were in great trouble, and turned back to Jerusalem immediately to look for Him.

After searching for three days, Jesus' par-

ents at last found Him in the temple, where to their great amazement they saw Him sitting among the learned teachers of God's law, both hearing them and asking them questions, so that all who heard Him were astonished at His understanding and answers. "But, my Child," exclaimed Mary, "why hast Thou treated us so? Thy father and I have been seeking Thee with troubled hearts!" But Jesus answered, "Why is it that ye were seeking Me? "Did ye not know that I must be in My Father's house?"

From this time Mary knew that her Son was no ordinary boy. And He went home with them to Nazareth and obeyed His earthly parents in all things, growing every day taller and wiser, and more pleasing to His Heavenly Father, so that all who knew Him loved Him.





#### THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus was about thirty years old, the time came for Him to begin His public work of preaching and teaching. So far, very few people knew who or what He was, and His first introduction to the people took place beside the river Jordan, where John the Baptist was preaching and baptizing.

While Jesus was growing up in Nazareth, John the Baptist was being trained by God as the last of the great prophets or teachers, whose work had been to point forward to the coming of the promised Messiah. Much of John's life had been spent in the wild country of the Jordan, where his food and clothing had been of the simplest and coarsest kind. Like the peasants of the desert, he wore a rough coat of camel's hair, fastened about the waist by a leathern belt, his food being locusts and wild honey.

When this strange looking man appeared at Jordan, people flocked to hear him from all the cities round about, and to all who heard him his message was the same, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Before long, John and his preaching became so famous that many people thought he must be the Messiah; but John said "No, there is One coming, who is so much greater than I, that I am unworthy to stoop down and unfasten His shoes." So little did John think of himself in comparison with Jesus, that he said, "I am but a voice crying in the wilderness, 'Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make His paths straight.'" Because John's work for Jesus was something like that of a runner or messenger, whose business it was to clear the way before the chariot of an Eastern king, he is often called the forerunner or herald of

Now John earnestly invited all who were willing to give up sin, to come to him and be baptized as a sign of repentance; and one day as he was teaching beside the river, Jesus Himself suddenly came and stood beside him, asking to be baptized also. At first John was surprised that Jesus should ask such a thing,

and said, "I have need to be baptized of Thee, and comest Thou to me?" For John had said to the people, "I have baptized you with water as a sign of repentance, but my Master, when He comes, shall baptize you with the Holy Spirit." John meant that only Jesus Himself, through the gift of His Holy Spirit, could give power to men to live pure and holy lives.

But Jesus insisted that John should baptize Him as a sign of His belonging to God, and when He was coming up out of the water, He saw the heavens opened and the Spirit of God descending upon Him like a dove. And there came a voice from heaven saying, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." By this, John, and all those who stood by, knew for certain that Jesus was indeed the Messiah.

the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve.

11 Then the devil leaveth him, and, behold, angels came and ministered unto him.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

Immediately after Jesus had been baptized by John the Baptist, the Spirit led Him far away into the lonely wilderness, where He lived alone for forty days and forty nights, with no other companions than the wild beasts of the desert. During this time Jesus the Son of God was put to a great test, to prove once for all whether He or Satan were the stronger.

At the end of the forty days, during which time Jesus had eaten little or no food, and when He was weak and exhausted after His long fast, Satan found Him. Knowing exactly how hungry and weary He was, the devil began his work of trying to force the Saviour to obey him. Pointing to some round stones on the ground, which were shaped something like loaves of bread, he began to speak in a taunting voice, saying, "If Thou be the Son of God, command that these stones be changed into bread." But Jesus was not to be caught by cunning, and answered Satan with a verse from the Bible, saying, "Man shall not

live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

Finding the Saviour could not be tempted to sin by any appeal to His feelings or appetite, Satan now tried to entrap Jesus by another plan, seeking if possible to break down His faith and trust in His heavenly Father. Taking Jesus to the top of the highest tower of the temple, the devil suggested that Jesus throw himself down to the ground, to see whether or not God would allow Him to be killed on the stones below. "For," said Satan, mocking Jesus' last answer, "is it not written in the Bible, 'God shall give His angels charge over thee; and in their hands they shall bear thee up, lest at any time thou dash thy foot against a stone?'" Jesus answered, "It is also written, 'Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God," meaning that we should not expect His protection when rushing into unnecessary danger." So Satan failed the second time in tempting Jesus to sin.

Now, Jesus was so poor that He had almost

nothing in this world to call His own, and Satan next appeared to Him in the guise of a powerful prince, and from the top of a high mountain showed Him all the kingdoms of the world, saying, "I will give Thee all these things if Thou wilt only once bow down and worship me." But almost before he spoke came Jesus' refusal in these words, "Get thee behind Me, Satan; for it is written, "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and Him only shalt thou serve.'" After this the devil went away, and angels from heaven came and fed and comforted Jesus.

Jesus was now fully prepared to enter upon His work of teaching and preaching. So far, He was known as the Messiah only to John and some few who had seen Him on the day of His baptism. The time had now come when He must declare Himself as the Saviour.



#### THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus began His work as a Preacher and Teacher, He used many strange pulpits. Sometimes He was invited to preach in synagogues or churches, but more often He would gather the people around Him out of doors, where, upon some country road or hillside, He would teach them of His Father and His kingdom.

One day, as Jesus was walking along the shore of Lake Galilee, He was followed by such an anxious, pushing crowd of people, gathered to listen to His words, that it was impossible for any but those near Him to hear what He said. Near by, two empty fishing boats were drawn up on the sand, and beside these, some little distance off, the owners were washing the mud and weeds from their nets.

As Jesus was acquainted with the fishermen, He called one whose name was Simon, and asked him to lend Him his boat, and getting in, they pushed off together a short distance from land, where Jesus, seated in the boat, began to speak to the people as they sat on the shore. Simon was glad to allow Jesus to use his boat, and the Saviour did not forget this favor, for, when he had finished speaking, He told Simon to push out into deep water and let down his net for a catch.

At first Simon was not willing, saying it was not a good time for fishing; in fact he had worked all the night before and had taken nothing. But something in Jesus' voice persuaded him to try, and immediately Simon's net was filled with such a large catch of fish that he could not draw it in alone, but was obliged to call his partners, James and John, who were near by in another boat, to help him. Simon's net was so full that the fish now filled both his own and his friends' boat, until they were ready to sink, but, to the amazement of all, there was not a mesh broken in the net.

Seeing that a miracle had been done, Simon now fell on his knees before Jesus, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." Simon felt he was not worthy to be near Jesus, and yet he wanted to stay. Jesus could see Simon's heart, and knew that he was the kind of man who would make a useful worker in His kingdom, so He gave him this invitation to become His friend and disciple, "Fear not: follow me, from henceforth thou shalt catch not fish, but men."

The three fishermen were now so certain that Jesus was the Saviour, that as soon as they came to land they all left their boats, their fishing and their nets, and from this time followed Jesus wherever He went, and became His faithful disciples or pupils, learning from Him and helping Him in His work.

25 And Je'sus rebuked him, saying, Hold thy peace, and come out of him.

26 And when the unclean spirit had torn him, and cried with a loud voice, he came out of him.

27 And they were all amazed, insomuch that they questioned among themselves, saying, What thing is this? what new doctrine is this? for with authority commandeth he even the unclean spirits, and they do obey him.
28 And immediately his fame spread

abroad throughout all the region round about

Gal'ilee. 29 And forthwith, when they were come out of the synagogue, they entered into the house of Si'mon and An'drew, with James and John.

30 But Si'mon's wife's mother lay sick of a fever, and anon they tell him of her.
31 And he came and took her by the hand, and lifted her up; and immediately the fever left her, and she ministered unto them.

32 And at even, when the sun did set, they brought unto him all that were diseased, and them that were possessed with devils.

33 And all the city was gathered together at the door.

34 And he healed many that were sick of divers diseases, and cast out many devils; and suffered not the devils to speak, because they knew him.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

Ever since Jesus was a boy, His custom had been to attend the services of His Father's house upon the Sabbath day. When He was in Jerusalem, He went to worship in the temple. If He were in some town or village, He attended the synagogue, where He was often invited to speak.

The Sabbath after the miracle of the fishes, Jesus and His newly chosen disciples went from the seashore into the city of Capernaum, to be present at the service of the synagogue, where, as soon as Jesus entered, He was invited by the minister to preach to the people. As always, everyone was delighted to listen to Jesus, because His teaching was so different from that of the scribes and Pharisees, who only repeated and repeated the sayings and opinions of others, while Jesus always spoke with authority, as one who knew and understood the exact meaning of God's Word.

While Jesus was speaking, and the people were listening and wondering at His gracious words, a man who was troubled with an evil spirit, a sickness which no one could cure, came in and began to cry out in a loud voice against Jesus and what He was saying, so that the service was interrupted and everyone was greatly disturbed.

In the midst of the confusion Jesus turned quietly, and speaking to the evil spirit, He said, "Hold thy peace, and come out of him"; and with a great struggle, in which the sick man was thrown violently on the floor, the evil spirit obeyed, and the man was left well and quiet, so that everyone in the synagogue was astonished, saying, "What thing is this? Who can this Man be, that even the evil spirits should obey Him?"

From the synagogue Jesus went the same day with James and John to the home of Simon and Andrew, where Simon's mother-in-law lay very ill with fever. As soon as Jesus knew about her, He went and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and suddenly she became so well and strong that she was able to wait upon them as they sat at table.

By this time the Sabbath was almost over, and the story of the wonders that Jesus had done had spread throughout Capernaum, so that, when evening came, almost the whole city gathered at Simon's door, bringing with them all their friends who were lame or sick, to see if Jesus would heal them. And though they were so many, Jesus healed all who came, and cast out many evil spirits, and sent everyone back to his home strong and happy.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

The next time Jesus came to Capernaum, after the Sabbath upon which He had cured so many sick people, news passed quickly from one to another that the great Teacher was again in Simon's house, and immediately the people came flocking in hundreds to see Him. Besides the common people and those who had been healed by Jesus on His last visit, there were present also a number of the proud scribes and Pharisees, as well as many strangers and travelers; for the fame of Jesus had now spread far and wide, and Simon's house, and even the door and yardway, were soon so blocked that it was impossible for anyone else to enter.

While everyone was running and hurrying to catch a sight of the Master, there was one poor man who could not go, for he was paralyzed and unable to leave his bed. Hearing from the neighbors of the miracles that Jesus had done, and desiring greatly to see Him,

he at last persuaded four of his friends to carry him on a mattress to Simon's house, to see if Jesus would help him. But what was their disappointment upon coming to the place, to find the crowd greater than ever, so that there was not room for them to come near the door. They would either have to go away with their sick friend, or find some place of entering the house other than the ordinary way.

In a few moments the people inside the house heard a sound on the roof, as if someone were loosening the tiles, and before they had time to think what it could be, to their amazement they saw the strange sight of a sick man being lowered into the room by ropes tied to the four corners of a mattress, for by this plan the paralytic had at last succeeded in reaching the exact spot where Jesus stood.

Jesus was pleased that anyone should take so much trouble to find Him, and seeing the faith of the sick man and his four friends, He said, "Son, thy sins are forgiven." But immediately the scribes and Pharisees began to find fault with Jesus' words, saying angrily among themselves, "This Man has no right to speak so. No one can forgive sins but God Himself."

Knowing what they thought, Jesus now turned to them and said, "Which is greater, to forgive sins, or to heal a sick man?" And to prove that He could do both, He said to the paralytic, "Arise, take up thy bed, and walk." And immediately he got up, and swinging his mattress over his shoulder, walked out before them all, so that everyone made way for him with astonishment, and glorified God, saying, "We have seen strange things to-day."



#### THE LESSON RETOLD

One morning, after Jesus had spent a whole night out upon the mountain side in prayer with His Heavenly Father, He was coming down the hill path with His disciples, when He met a great crowd of people coming towards Him. Finding Himself in a large grassy place, Jesus sat down, and as the people gathered around Him, He began to preach.

On this particular morning, Jesus' sermon was intended specially for His newly chosen disciples, and the Master now explained to them more clearly than He had yet done how they must live, if they were to be His true servants and lead others into the kingdom of God.

As Jesus looked about among the people, He saw very few who were really happy, and the first part of His sermon told of eight ways, each beginning with the word "Blessed," by which men could learn to be truly satisfied and happy. The first happy people of whom the Saviour spoke, were the humble, whom He called "the poor in spirit," promising that they should be among the first to inherit His kingdom.

"Blessed are they that mourn," said the Saviour, "for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are

persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." Jesus told His friends plainly that they would be hated in this world for His sake, but that, if they proved faithful, a great reward was awaiting them in heaven.

To show how important the work of His people should be, Jesus compared them to salt and light. As salt preserves and purifies, so Christ's people must always stand for what is good and right. As a city that is set on a hill, or a lighted candle in a room, the good works of Christ's people must show clearly where they are, and so glorify their Heavenly Father.



#### THE LESSON RETOLD

In the last part of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, He explained the difference between His laws and the false teachings of the scribes and Pharisees, who were always quarreling among themselves as to the exact meaning of the rules which had been handed down to them from one generation to another.

One of the questions about which the false teachers of Jesus' time constantly disagreed was the question of a man's keeping his word. Which was the most binding promise or oath, they disputed, one made and sworn to by the temple, the world, the sky, a man's life, or one made in the name of God Himself.

Christ's answer to all these difficulties was very simple. He said, "I say unto you, Swear not at all, neither by heaven: for it is

God's throne; nor by thy head: for thou canst not make one hair white or black. But let your 'yes' mean 'yes,' and your 'no,' mean 'no.' Anything else cometh of evil."

At this time it was the common custom, that when one man injured another man in a dispute, he should expect to receive the same injury in return, so that the words, "An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth," were known everywhere as a common saying. But Jesus said, "I say unto you, resist not evil: but whoseever shall smite thee on thy right cheek turn to him the other also. If a man take away thy coat, let him have thy cloak also. Whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twice as far. Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would

borrow of thee turn not thou away." In all these ways Jesus taught His disciples that the best way to get the better of an enemy, was to make friends with him and treat him kindly.

Speaking of another common saying, which was, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor, and hate thine enemy," Jesus changed it for His followers to this: "Love your enemies, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that treat you badly, that you may be like your Father in heaven, who makes all to share the same good gifts, sending His rain and sun alike upon the evil and the good."

Jesus taught that His servants should obey a higher and better law than others. "For," said the Saviour, "if you show kindness only to those who are kind to you, what do you more than sinners? Do not even the despised publicans the same? But ye shall be perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect."

#### "Jesus" Hymns

What beautiful Lesson Hymns we have had this Quarter! Each one has told us something about Jesus, the Wonderful Saviour.

I. The Babe—The first two Hymns, 520 and 31, speak of the little Babe who was born at Bethlehem. They recall the story of how the angels came from heaven and sang their sweet song of praise to God for sending Jesus into the world; and how the Wise Men from the East were guided by the star to the place where the Babe was.

II. THE BOY—The Hymn for Lesson III. (Hymn 304, v. 3) gives us a glimpse into that home in Nazareth, where Jesus lived as a boy, obeying His parents with a willing heart and showing Himself kind and helpful to all about Him.

III. The Dove—It is the blessed Holy Spirit to whom the Hymns (103, v. 1 and 71, vs. 1, 2) for Lessons IV. and V. point us. He come down, we remember, in the form of a pure and gentle dove, upon Jesus when He was being baptized. And the Spirit was strong, too, for in His power Jesus gained the victory over Satan in the wilderness.

IV. THE FOUR FISHERMEN—We all remember the four fishermen whom Jesus called to follow Him. Hymn 534 (Lesson VI.) teaches us that Jesus wants us, also, to be His followers—to listen to His teachings and obey His commands day by day.

V. The Sick Healed—Two very beautiful pictures they are which Hymns 366, v. 1 and 123, v. 1 (Lesson VII. and VIII.) bring before us. First, there is Jesus healing the crowds of sick people and then the same loving Saviour forgiving sins. And it is sweet to remember that Jesus is still able and oh! so willing, to make us well when we are sick, and freely to pardon all our sins.

VI. How to BE HAPPY—Our blessed Lord, in His wonderful Sermon on the Mount, tells us how to be happy. We must, He says, have only good and loving thoughts in our

lives and be very watchful over our tongues and tempers. Hymns 587, vs. 1, 2 and 529, vs. 1, 2, bring back to our minds these teachings of Jesus.

VII. THE SWEETEST HYMN OF ALL—None of the Quarter's Hymns is sweeter than the last. For does it not tell us that Jesus came from heaven just that He might save and bless each one of us? The very littlest ones have a special place in His love and care. He has very kind and tender words for them, and His strong, loving arms are always round about them. Yes, a very precious hymn is 558, the hymn for to-day.

#### TEMPERANCE LESSON

Proverbs 23: 29-35-Memory Verse, 31.

**Golden Text**—At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder.—Proverbs 23: 32.



- 29 Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes?
- 30 They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine.
- 31 Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright.
- 32 At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder.
- 33 Thine eyes shall behold strange women, and thine heart shall utter perverse things.
- 34 Yea, thou shalt be as he that lieth down in the midst of the sea, or as he that lieth upon the top of a mast.
- 35 They have stricken me, shall thou say, and I was not sick; they have beaten me, and I felt it not: when shall I awake? I will seek it yet again.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

Two of the most dreaded reptiles in Eastern lands are the snake and the adder, the bite of both being poisonous and deadly. The chief danger from these creatures, which at first glance may often appear harmless and even beautiful, lies in the fact that they are not easily seen and always attack people by stealth and when they are least expecting it.

King Solomon, one of the wisest men who ever lived, when he wanted to warn people against the sin and danger of drunkenness, compared wine and such strong drinks to both of these poisonous animals, saying, "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth its color in the cup, when it moveth itself aright; for at the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Solomon meant that, like the deadly bite of a poisonous and cunning reptile, the constant drinking of wine and such like drinks, would bring a man, even before he was aware of it, to certain ruin and destruction.

Now a person bitten by a poisonous snake is sometimes thrown into a deep and pleasant sleep, from which it is impossible to awaken him, and in the same way, the first effect of whisky poison is to make one happy; but the pleasure lasts only for a short time and turns quickly into sickness and disgust.

In his Proverbs or Wise Book, which King Solomon wrote especially for the instruction and warning of young people, and which is now part of the Old Testament, he gives a terrible description of a drunkard returning to his home after a night spent in feasting and drinking with evil companions. While the pleasure lasted, everything went merrily, but when morning came, no one would know him for the same man. While in a drunken state someone has kicked and wounded him, so that he is covered with blood and bruises, of which he can give no account. His eyes are swollen and red, he is quarrelsome, foolish, and altogether unhappy. But for all this, he is not

warned against his evil ways, and the next opportunity finds him drinking again, until drunkenness has become such a habit that he cannot leave off.

Not only does drunkenness take away a man's health and happiness, but it leads him into other sins as well, and especially the sin of lying, so that it is almost impossible to believe a drunkard's word. After a time nobody respects him, and he loses faith even in himself.

To allow oneself to come to such a state through strong drink, Solomon said, is as dangerous and senseless as to try to lie down on the crest of a wave, or on top of a high ship's mast, for in the end it is certain ruin and destruction: not only to the body, but to the mind and soul as well.

Drunkenness is as much an evil to-day as it was in Solomon's time, for it breaks up home, destroys business, and does more harm and causes more unhappiness than almost any other sin in the world.
