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



The steamers had arrived at Falmouth on vairous dates, and had been released at the special request of the Dutch Government. No enquiry was made of the British authorities as to what was the best way of sailing or as to the proper precautions to take, as it was believed the ships were sailing under a safe conduct from Germany, and the cap-tains received special private instructions from the Dutch Government. An official of the Dutch Legation at London went to Falmouth and inter-viewed privately the captains of the seven ships so as to be sure that they understood the instructions.
