

Manitoba Census.

Ottawa, Aug. 28:—(Special.)—Complete returns of the Manitoba census Itaken last spring have been received. The total population of the province is now 193,425, or an increase of 34,785 in population in ten years. The increase for the first five years, from 1891 to 1896, it was 40,919. The increase in ten years was 78.04 per cent. The census was taken so as to ascertain the proper subsidy due to the province. At 86c per head the increase in the subsidy to the province on 40,919 population, which was the increase in the last five years, will be about \$32.735. 





DEAVOR MOVEMENT the President-Founder of It, Rev. Francis E. Clark, Writes of the Recent Great

I have been asked to write concerning the result and significance of the recent Christian Endeavor convention at Washington. THE SNAKE'S VENOM.

ANTIDOTE FOR THE DEADLY

Showing Exactly How a Serpen

A new antidate for snake venous has been discovered. The inventor is Professor Phisalis, a French solentist.

The great merit and novelty of this antidote is the simplicity of its preparation. The process by which it saves a person from the effects of snake bite is the same as in the antidoxins of Dr. Fraser and M. Calmetta, which have been recently made public.

M. Phisalix prepared his antidots by passing venom through a Pasteur



muscle which raises under jaw; it, obtained an amber-like powder, which it is necessary to keep away from the light in order to preserve its virulence. This method of dessication enabled the professor to weigh infinitesimal quantities of venom with great exactitude. The method of measuring venom by counting the liquid drops is necessarily uncertain. A small difference in the quantity of snake venom may be of great importance.

sarily uncertain. A small difference in the quantity of snake venom may be of great importance.

Publessor Phiess made a solution of one part of dry venom to 1000 of water, which immediately before filtration was further diluted to 1 in 5000. This liquid was passed through a Pasteur filter, the most effective instrument of its kind in existence.

The quantity of this solution before filtration needed to kill a guinea pig of seventeen ounces was about one-third of a grain. After filtration Professor Phisalix found that the solution did not kill the animal. It was therefore proved that the filter retained the poisonous part of the venom, and that the solution remaining possessed a power of immunizing the blood against the poison.

Forty-eight hours after an injection of the solution in a guinea pig, it was able to resist an inoculation of venom which would have killed two or three unprepared animals of its kind. Further
