On the 11th of July, the Admiralty yacht *Electra*, having on board the body of the Prince Imperial, arrived off Chislehurst this morning, after a rapid passage from Spithead. She remained in the stream till four o'clock this afternoon, a large number of distinguished Frenchmen and English gentlemen, accompanied by the French ambassador, the British minister, and the British military attaché, were on board to receive the remains. The funeral took place in accordance with the arrangements already announced. The Russian, German and Danish ambassadors were present. A body of Prussian workmen viewed the coffin before the funeral. It is estimated that the various sympathizers brought together for the funeral numbered over 200,000.
