

A majority of the child-ren in the schools in Saint John will suffer from the nervous and economic strain of the war. This suffering will doubtless be due more largely to what is technically called "reflex action," rather than to direct influence but science has shown how seriously the physical conditions are influence ed by the mental. To-day no one can afford to neglect whatever will

New Regulations Will Stop All Importations of Liquor for Beverage Purposes, and the Manufacture will also be Stopped


