THE WOODSTOCK BRIDGE.

It is scarcely worth while to take notice of the opposition slanders regarding this work, but when a newspaper makes the temporary stoppage in the construction of the bridge the excuse for an unwarranted attack on EngineerWetmore, it is time that somebody should be heard in his defence. A local publication in this city has proclaimed to the public that it is now found that by the Engineer's mistake the superstructure for the bridge is a span short, and much more such rubbish is put forth to mislead the public and manufacture political capital. Of course there is no There is no doubt that work for the present on the superstructure is at a standstill but that is the fault of the contracting company, not of the government or its engineer. But stop, it is to a certain extent the result of the Engineer's action early in the construction. So careful has Mr. Wetmore been that the company shall meet all the requirements of his plans and specifications, that he has placed in the bridge company's shops at Montreal, a most competent engineer, and all work for the bridge must pass his inspection before it is shipped to Woodstock. No doubt this has delayed somewhat the progress of the work, for the Government, through Mr. Wetmore, are insisting on the materials and workmanship being right up to specification.
