

## Bombardment of Tripoli. ITALIAN FLEET REDUCED Rubber

FORTS TO RUINS.

Special to Evening Telegram: LONDON, To-day.

The news despatches from Rome give account of the bombardment of Tripoli. At 3 o'clock on Tuesday, Vice-Admiral Taravelli signalled to the battleships, Guiseppi Garibaldi and Francesco Ferruces, that the bomardment was about to begin. These ssels with the flagship steamed up within two kilometres, i.e., about a le and a third, of the town. irst shells were directed at the Gov ernor's Palace and were well placed nmediately the Paleca and Amelia Sultona forts replied with a number of shots from 15 centimetre guns. The Turkish aim was bad. The Vavez and the Ferrucio directed thei fire against the fortifications at the use on the mole, which replied with smaller guns. Flags were kep flying over all the Consulates. The orts showed Turkish flags. After the combardment had progressed for an cour, the shells from the Vavez denour, the snells from the vavez uestroyed the lighthouse, which collapsed in ruins. The Governor's Palace was riddled with shots and severely battered. The central forts ceased firing at 5 o'clock, but the outer forts Hamildieh and Sultania kept up the defence. Their shots were better directed. The quays were de-berted. A number of fires broke out he bombardment ceased at nigh hombardment was resumed yes rday, and was heavier than the day fore. The outer forts had been re ed to ruins and were unable to re . The Turks removed the guns to heights beyond the town and re opened fire from there. They wer however, dispersed by shrapnel from the fleet and fled in all directions.

## **Avoided Useless**

ROME, To-day Admiral Andrey, in command of alian fleet at Tripoli, reports that in ombarding the city, he spared the onsulates, the hospitals, the churches monasteries, and all the convents diming only at the fortifications.
