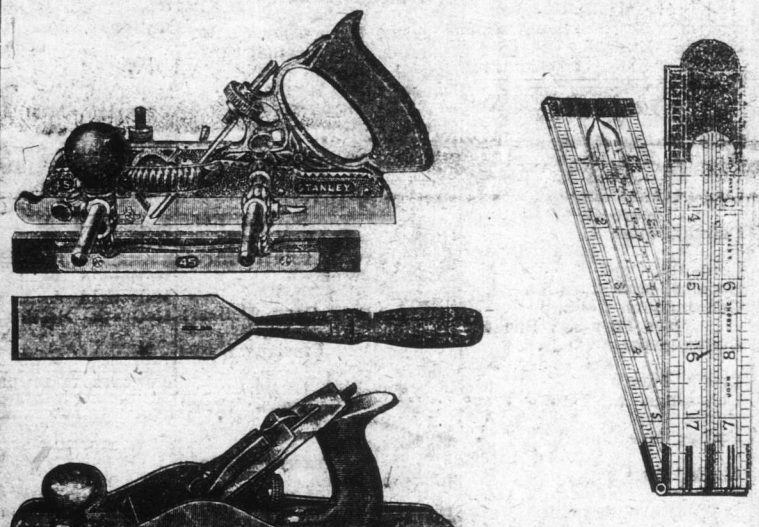

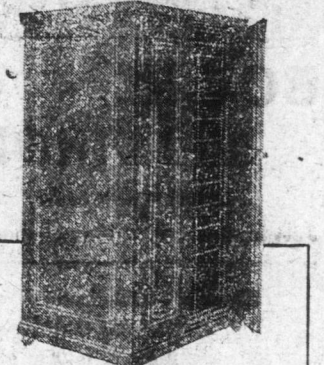

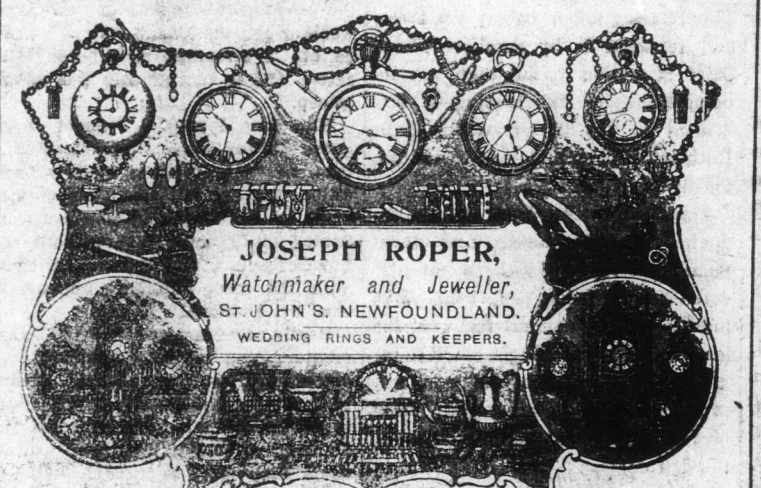

Isn't that worth considering?

In the second place, there is the question of quantity. Some packages inform us themselves that they contain a certain amount—a pound, a half pound, five pounds. Very well. We hope they do. But in a certain western city, a very energetic sealer of weights and measures turned the whole city upside down by really getting onto his job and discovering how very few shopkeepers were honest in their measurings.

How can we be sure that the big manufacturers are any more honest? And yet how many of us ever put the matter to a test, by actually weighing the contents of some of these packages?

Furthermore, some packages do not even pretend to enlighten us to the amount they contain. But the package or the jar looks so neat and tidy that we buy it, without having any idea how much we are getting for our money.

I have been told that it is a favorite trick of manufacturers to establish a package or jar something in the public mind, as a most advantageous purchase, and then to gradually decrease the size of that package.

The public goes on paying the same old price for the smaller package and congratulates itself that the price of this commodity, at least, has not gone up.

Now, mind you, this is not by any means intended as a wholesale condemnation of everything not sold in bulk.

It is simply and solely a little suggestion that we look into the matter and try to see if the reign of jar package and can may not have something to do with the skyrocketing tendencies of our grocery and provision bills.

Pen Picture of Premier Stolypin.

Francis McCullagh, a correspondent of the New York "Evening Post" and a man well acquainted with the Douma, wrote of M. Stolypin:

"The flashing black eyes reminded one of wild beasts glaring from dark caverns. The luxuriance of the jet-black hair and beard conveyed an additional impression of masculinity and savage force. At times I found myself reminded of the hard, bearded stone faces of insouciant Babylonian kings. This impression became very strong when Stolypin, who rarely indulges in gestures, made with a brawny right arm a single, swift, decisive sweep. On could almost hear the whizz and see the gleam of an imaginary sabre. This may seem an exaggeration. It is not. For at that very period Stolypin's arm snote off its seven heads a day, and never once signed a reprieve. Ghengis Khan may have committed greater slaughter in his fits of passion; but I do not know of any dim Oriental potentate whose rage was so cold and so systematically deadly as that of the Czar's president of council.

"The blackness of the hair and beard, a blackness like that of the raven's wing, taken in conjunction with the high cheek bones and the colorless face, hinted at Tartar blood. The hint was emphasized rather than otherwise by the perfectly groomed figure; the invariable black frock coat with silk facings; the small, delicately-formed hand; the carefully trimmed beard and moustache, between which was visible sometimes a red line, sometimes an angry gleam of strong white teeth.

"The voice was deep, resonant and powerful. In moments of passion it roughened like that of a growling lion, and there was an angry infection in it at all times. Menace, contempt, defiance—these were the only chords that orator cared to touch.

"Such is the man who undoubtedly quelled in streams of blood the Russian Revolution of 1906-7. He is a man of stupendous strength, a Russian Bismarck, and it is no wonder that the weak-kneed Czar clings to him. But the present crisis (this was written in April of this year) shows the limitations of these professional strong men. These terror-stricken states. Their preference for violence in all places, and at all times, makes them smash constitutions and party machines which do not work exactly to their taste. Now, in such cases it is not violence that is wanted. It is infinite patience, tact, and delicacy. M. Stolypin's rough handling of the second Douma and Kadets has been praised, but it seems to me that less violent methods would have succeeded even better. The president of the council made the Czar change the whole law of elections, but even the Douma, which has been returned under the new law, is not satisfactory enough, and it is projected until the Premier can get as

Uncle Sam Uses Moving Pictures

Scenes of Navy, War and Other Activities Will Crowd Out Bad Shows.

Uncle Sam himself is going into the moving picture show business, says Thomas F. Logan in the Philadelphia Inquirer.

With the authority of President Taft a contract has been entered into by the government officials and a Chicago firm for the purpose of re-producing in moving pictures all of the various activities of the nation.

The pictures will be shown in hundreds of moving picture houses, theaters at work on board battleships, gunners at the bulk of an old battleship, cavalry drills, mine and rescue work, plant and animal industry, road building and every single activity of the government will be shown on the films.

The problem of educating the public to the work being done by its own government was carefully considered by the President and members of his cabinet before the contract was entered into. Each Cabinet officer was then authorized to make his own arrangements with the film concern, having the right to arrange for such pictures as he wished to have taken and reject those he does not care for.

In the United States office of public roads, for instance, the director, Logan Walter Fox, arranged to have pictures taken showing the effects of good and bad roads. In the case of the latter the films will show the farmer trying to carry loads of produce over a bad road; how he became sick; how the doctor is unable to reach him; and how, because of mud ruts, the undertaker finds it exceedingly difficult to get him to his grave. Another film will show another farmer carrying his produce—twice as much—over a model road constructed under the supervision of the government and the general improvement of the surrounding country.

The Department of Agriculture will be able to show, in entertaining as well as instructive style, the effects of pure food and impure food; the Secretary of War will be able to show the advantage of life on the bounding waves, while the Interior Department will be showing how forest fires are fought and entombed tinners are rescued.

The government will be killing two birds with one stone, improving the tone of the moving pictures and eliminating those that have a bad effect, while educating the public to the work being done by its government.

When the moving picture educational campaign is announced it will sound interesting and intellectual. It would be far more interesting, however, to have seen the high official who sat at a moving picture show one night and suddenly exclaimed to himself—

"By George the government ought to use this cruse for educational purposes."

Pure Jealousy.

Apparently, nothing is so irritating to the Daily News as our success in booming the energy and enterprise of the Premier and his party. We hesitate to attribute the irritation to spoken at its own failure and to jealousy at our signal success in spreading the tidings of Government activity. We fear, however, we have no alternative. In spite of the risk of exciting dyspepsia and arousing the green-eyed monster, we must insist on our right to co-operate in making the Premier and his party better known to the people. We really have no desire to gloat over our contemporary's failure to exploit successfully the tidings of his party. But we cannot refrain from doing our duty in the premises. We claim to have made a specialty in publishing the hard work of the Premier and his party in these directions. These lines are not worked by the Daily News. Why then should the Daily News be disgruntled at us. We do not claim any exclusive right to work these lines. We shall be only too pleased if the Daily News will do justice to even if the Daily News severely ignores these forms of energy of our working Premier, we shall give them due publicity.

An Interesting Exhibit.

There are now on exhibition in Messrs. Sudden Death at Rigoulette.

A very sudden death, we learn from people who arrived from the Labrador recently, occurred at Rigoulette on the 12th September. The man so suddenly stricken was Mr. Alexander Chalk, better known as Sandy, a man who was extremely well liked in the place. He left his home early in the morning of the 12th apparently in the best of health and brought in some codfish from a place called Double Mere. After mooring his boat he stepped up on the wharf, when, without a moment's warning, he was attacked with heart failure and dropped dead. The suddenness of the taking off of such a well known man appalled those near him and his death cast a gloom over the place. The deceased was 45 years old, a native of Hamilton Inlet, and an honest, upright and hardworking man. He leaves a wife and an adopted son to mourn him.

An Appreciation.

Rev. D. O'Callaghan received through the mails yesterday a cheque for \$1,000 as a recognition of his zealous work in the cause of temperance. The day was the anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood and the writer evidently knew this and took advantage of the occasion. He signed himself a "Catholic Temperance Advocate," and expressed the hope that "he may be spared many years to continue the good work." Fr. O'Callaghan was, needless to say, surprised to receive such a large donation in this way. With his usual generosity he donated the money to the building of the new wing at Littledeale, sending it to his sister, who is one of the community there, with a request that it be handed over to the Rev. Mother for the building fund.

Stella Maris Coming.

The s.s. Stella Maris has finished her work on the Labrador and is now on the way south. Capt. Barbour has done good service the past season, going below Ryan's Bay every trip since July and one beyond Cape Childley, to Baffin Land, to bring up the missionary and his assistants. There were no "floaters" below Cape Childley and therefore the Stella Maris did not go there with freight and mails. The furthest point north where the floaters fished the past summer was McLean's Straits, where there were two or three schooners fishing, and this is many miles south of Cape Childley.

Yesterday afternoon the city fish buyers met and discussed the price of cod. Madeira was increased 20 cts. per qtl. in the local market but other kinds remain as they were. Madeira is now put down at \$5.20 per qtl., just 30 cts. less than merchantable. Oil, salmon, lobsters and herring remain as they were.

LADY TO REST.—The funeral of the late William Howlett, who was killed accidentally at the Power House, took place at Petty Harbor last evening and was largely attended. Rev. Fr. Tierney read the burial service.

Bombardment of Tripoli.

ITALIAN FLEET REDUCED
FORTS TO RUINS.

Special to Evening Telegram:
LONDON, To-day.
The news despatches from Rome give account of the bombardment of Tripoli. At 3 o'clock on Tuesday, Vice-Admiral Taravelli signalled to the battleships, Giuseppe Garibaldi and Francesco Ferruccio, that the bombardment was about to begin. These vessels with the flagship steamed up to within two kilometres, i.e. about a mile and a third of the town. The first shells were directed at the Governor's Palace and were well placed. Immediately the Pateca and Amelia Saltoni forts replied with a number of shots from 15-centimetre guns. The Turkish aim was bad. The Vavez and the Ferruccio directed their fire against the fortifications. The forts showed Turkish flags. After the bombardment had progressed for an hour, the shells from the Vavez destroyed the lighthouse, which collapsed in ruins. The Governor's Palace was riddled with shots and severely battered. The central forts ceased firing at 5 o'clock, but the outer forts Hamidieh and Sultanieh kept on the defence. Their shots were better directed. The quays were deserted. A number of fires broke out. The bombardment ceased at night. During the night the sky glowed with the reflection of the fires in the town. The bombardment was resumed yesterday, and was heavier than the day before. The outer forts had been reduced to ruins and were unable to reply. The Turks removed the guns to the heights beyond the town and reopened fire from there. They were however, dispersed by shrapnel from the fleet and fled in all directions.

Avoided Useless Bloodshed

Special to Evening Telegram:
ROME, To-day.
Admiral Andrea, in command of the Italian fleet at Tripoli, reports that in bombarding the city, he spared the consulates, the hospitals, the churches, the monasteries, and all the convents, aiming only at the fortifications. Discrimination was made with relative ease as the range of the Turkish cannon was so short that the ships were able to approach the city closely and take accurate aim. The bombardment was protracted because of the extreme care taken to avoid useless bloodshed by not respecting the homes of non-combatants and the Mosques. The fire from the Turks was absolutely harmless, none of their shots reaching the ships.

TOLL OF THE SEA

SAD DAY
At Goodridge's.
Two Vessels Lying at Wharf With Flags at Half-Mast -- Seaman Drowned, Another Killed.

"Men must work and women must weep. Though the harbor bar be moaning."

An atmosphere of sorrow and gloom hangs over A. Goodridge & Sons today and one could tell by the sorrowful expression on the faces of the employees in office, store and on the wharf that the great reaper death had been busy amongst them having "got down to the sea in ships and do business in deep waters." The toll of two brave lives have been paid to the sea. From the Schr. Olive, Capt. T. Doyle, William Brien, 45 years old, Pleasant St., was washed overboard off Cape Spear last Tuesday night in the storm and never seen again alive or dead. The Olive, Capt. Thos. Doyle, left Nipper's Harbor Saturday last with codfish and herring, etc., bound to St. John's. He put into Herring Neck Saturday night and remained there till the storm of Sunday had subsided. Leaving that port at 9 Monday morning after having a hard time all that day and the following morning. Tuesday afternoon the wind blew a fierce gale with snow so thick that when the skipper reckoned he was off the Narrows, he could not risk making in as the weather was too thick and the land could not be picked up without going in so close that it might be impossible to get off again under the small canvas the Olive was carrying in case a mistral wind made. He decided to run up off Cape Spear and lay to all night. Capt. Doyle ran her out under a skirt of the forswall and was waiting a chance to bring her to when a heavy sea swept in over the quarter and filled up level with the tops of the house over the cabin. Poor Brien was swept away and others of the crew, Haggard and Newhook to lash five spars together that were on the deck, to prevent them from being swept away. He fastened a piece of rope to them near the after end of the "companion" and was going forr'd when the sea came on board. His back was turned to it and one of the crew thinks that he was sitting on the fore end of the "companion" when he was swept away, otherwise he might have seen the sea coming and would have time to rise and grasp the main rigging. Newhook and Haggard were covered over with sea, but they lay down flat when they were tying the spars and held on to the rope. This saved them from being swept over the side. The mate, Wm. Doyle, was on the cabin house and held on to a rope of the mainsail. The Skipper, T. Doyle, who was at the wheel, was thrown forr'd on his face against the bows. The sea swept away the steering gear and wheel and all but he held the spokes in his hand, the binoculars with the compass was swept out of place, the cabin doors burst open, and the glass top roof of the companion carried away forr'd. The Skipper fell on his face with the spokes of the wheel gripped in his hands and could see nothing but foaming water when he looked up. When the sea had passed out over the side he got to his feet, and seeing the mate on the house asked if it was right. Newhook and Haggard were seen to be all right, but then the mate cried out that there was no sign of "Billy." He ran to the forecastle thinking that he might have got there to escape the sea. Soe Harden, the cook, who was below saying out that Billy was not there. They knew then that the sea had swept him overboard. The lost gear was replaced and the wheel repaired while the vessel ran along under bare poles. Capt. Doyle says that in all his experience at sea he never was in such a storm. He dove her too all night and drifted 30 miles off to the S. E. of Cape Spear, working the Olive back to the Cape at 3 o'clock this morning. Acting on the advice of Mr. Goodridge he procured a carriage and drove to the Deservy and requested Rev. Fr. McDermott to go with him to Pleasant Street to break the news to the wife and family of the deceased. The scene was a heartbreaking one which he says he would not like to witness again. O'Brien was a first class seaman and was for some time mate in the Aureolis. He has two sons and two daughters. One of the former is in the Minnie. The Telegram extends sincere sympathy to them.

The second fatality out of Goodridge's, occurred on the barqt. Rosinia. Capt. Dillon, coming here from

Barbados, when Lorenzo Hisecock, a fine, smart young seaman, 20 years old, from the royal yard farm, received injuries that resulted in death a few hours afterwards. The Rosinia made three attempts last month to get to Sydney but the captain had to give it up. At 2.30 a.m. last Friday the Rosinia was 50 miles S.E. of Scoterie. Capt. Dillon had given orders to take in the light sails, and Hisecock was sent aloft to take in the royal. He was seen leaning over the yard stowing the slack, canvas and sang out to the mate to square the yard a bit. This was done, and a few minutes after the mate heard a crash. He told the captain that there was something wrong, and the latter going forward found poor Hisecock leaning over the rail not a fudge in him. He had fallen over the yard a distance of 50 feet. He must have fallen on his feet as an inch and a half plank on the top gallant forecastle was broken right through. He must have rebounded from this to the rail, and his forehead struck either the rail or the anchor stock. He was taken up and tenderly borne to the cabin. He lingered till 1 p.m. yesterday. His breathing was quite normal and easy but he did not speak or show any signs of consciousness. There was one wound on his temple from which blood flowed, and his brain was evidently confused. There was also a wound on his right eye. Neither of these indicated that he had struck on his head when he fell. He would have gone overboard in the rebound. Captain Dillon thinks only for the job sheet. Deceased lived off Adelaide Street, this city, and was unmarried, and his people are formerly of Cadiz. The body was taken ashore this morning and will be interred to-morrow. Capt. Dillon and the crew are very much cut up over the sad affair.

FLOOD DID DAMAGE.—The flood Tuesday night last did much damage at Carbonear, especially at the fire break near Mr. W. Soper's house, the basement of which was flooded.

SOLWAY FOR LABRADOR.—The s.s. Solway will sail for Labrador at 10 a.m. today, going as far north as Ford's Harbor in Davis's Inlet. She takes passengers for Battle Harbor and Iliak.

GONE INSPECTING STATIONS.—Mr. Grimes, Superintendent of the Police Force, left this morning to inspect the police stations north of Battle Harbor.

T. A. HALL ENGAGED.—Mr. Geo. Coughlan received word to-day from abroad which enables him to say that the T. A. Hall has been engaged for a season of four or five weeks to the Klark-Urban Co. of New York. The will open here on the 23rd.

HIT WITH WINCH HANDLE.—John Edwards, of Casey Street, while helping to hoist up a cask of oil from a lighter this morning, let the hammer of the winch he was working at slip. It hit him a glancing blow in the eye which became quickly discolored.

OF GREAT UTILITY.—The Commercial Cable Co.'s station at Cuck hold's Cove is enabling the Postal Telegraphs to give this side of Com by Chance.

HAD HARD TIME.—The little boat St. Joseph, Skipper Rd. Wyse, arrived here this morning fish laden. Dr. Balne Johnson says that the hammer coming down the shore this morning in a squall which struck her in the Narrows her main boom was broken.

DAMAGED AT GRATE'S COVE.—The schr. Seafower, which arrived here yesterday evening from Grate's Cove reports that several boats were driven ashore from the collar in Tuesday's storm and were smashed in places.

FISH WORTH 45 MILRAES.—Minister Piccott this morning had a wire from the British Consul at Bahia, Brazil, saying that fish there to-day is worth 45 milraes per drum, an advancing. The milrae at Brazil to-day is worth 16 pence sterling, or 3 cents Newfoundland currency.

POLICE COURT.—In the police court to-day two drunken men were charged. Five boys were summoned by Park Constable Smith for damaging the trees in Bannerhill Park on the 29th ult. The boys were getting dog berries from the branches and broke some of them. They were let off on paying costs.
