

BONAR LAW. THE FALL OF WARSAW.

LONDON, Aug. 5. Warsaw has fallen and the Germans already are in occupation of the Polish capital. News of the fall-ing came by wireless to German headquarters, and was followed by cabled confirmation from Berlin, crediting the capture of the city to the forces commanded by Prince Leopold of Bavaria, after a stubborn fight with the Russian rearguard. With the admission in last night's official statement that the Russian forces defending the Blonie front had

Roche since his elevation to the Archieopiscopal See of St. John's. When the train arrived at Dunville every man, woman and child was at the station and showed their joy by hearty cheers for His Grace and accompanying clergy. The station was nicely decorated with fir boughs and wild flowers, strings of bunting spanned the track, and flew from every tr. top, while large mottoes of ferns and wild roses placed beside the track enhanced the beauty of the silvan scene. When His Grace and suite detrained at Jersey Side, the whole population including the Star of the Sea in tion including the Star of the Sea in full regalia were there to greet him. After three lusty cheers and a tiger had been given for His Crace and suite the great concourse of people, the largest ever seen in Placentia, wended its way to the Presbytery headed by the Star Band discoursing appropriate airs. To add to the splendid natural scenery an avenue of trees of a uniform size and height had been planted on either side of the had been planted on either side of the road from the station to the slip, and again from the ferry wharf on the town side almost to the Presbytery, thus testifying that the people thought nothing too much trouble to do. Innumerable flags floated from every house and flagstaff, and beautiful arches with appropriate mottoes spanned the streets in many places. Near His Grace's former home was a beautiful arch in the centre of which was a miniature house, and beneath it was the inscription: "We come to the old home," and on the opposite side of the arch: "Home, Sweet Home" in Latin was written.

On Sunday Pontifical High Mass was celebrated, the celebrant being Monsignor St. John with Fathers Maher and Elgherty as Descent and St.

Monsignor St. John with Fathers Ma-her and Flaherty, as Deacon and Sub-Deacon, respectively; Father Sheehan was Master of Ceremonies while

Fathers McGrath and Vereker assisted at the Throne.

After Mass the Citizens' Address with purse, and the address of the Star of the Sea were presented. The former was read by Magistrate O' Reilly and the latter by W. J Walsh, President of the Star of the Sea. His Grace replied in chaste and beautiful language thanking the people for the nagnificent reception accorded him and for their loyalty and devotion to the grand old Catholic Church. In his address which was remarkable for its purity of style, grandeur of diction and clear enunciation, he referred to the landing of the saintly Bishop of Quebec, St. Vallier, on the shores of Placentia over two hundred years ago, and establishing here the nucleus of that Church which has continued to flourish to the present day. A large Basque population then occupied the place, and though historical vicissitudes broke for a while the continuity of events, yet it may be said that the spark of faith then enkindled has never been extinguished. He then read the accompanying letter from Sir Spencer Ewart, the Commanding Officer of the forces in Scotland:—

Headquarters Scottish Command,

Edinburgh, 19th July, 1915. Dear Sir Walter Davidson,—
I am very much obliged for your
Excellency's kind letter of July 1st. I can assure you that it has been a very great pleasure and honour to me to have had the Newfoundland Regiment under my orders during its period of training in this country. When the Battalion first arrived it was quartered at Fort George, but as it seemed appropriate from an Imperial point of view that the soldiers of Newfoundland should garrison our ancient Castle for a time. The battalion is now at Stob's Camp, near Hawick, on the borders, where it has made good progress in its training, and I have lately recommended that

it shall be moved to England to be incorporated in a Brigade, prior to proceding upon active service.

The battalion has conducted itself o my entire satisfaction, and I have he authority of the Lord Prevost of Edinburgh for saying that its presence in our Scottish capital has been much appreciated by the people. The Lord Provost himself was present at the station to welcome your officers and men in the name of the City of

Edinburgh on their arrival here from Fort George. The Newfoundland Regiment is omposed of the best possible material, all ranks being of fine, sturdy physique. 
