THE HON. TREASURER'S REPORT.

As Treasurer of the Women's Patriotic Association of Newfoundland, I submit the report of the Finance Committee for the year ending August 15th, 1916.

I append a balance sheet to the report showing total receipts and expenditures. It will be seen from this that we began the year on September 1st, 1915, with a balance in Bank of \$2,370.91. In addition to this we received in subscriptions from all sources \$32,588.66, giving us in all \$34,-959.57 for expenditure.

ces \$32,588.66, giving us in all \$34,-959.57 for expenditure.

Of these receipts, sales, concerts, teas, dances, lectures and other public performances accounted for \$12,-554.93, Money Boxes \$409.02, direct subscriptions from St. John's and Outports \$19,624.71. Of this latter amount \$4,000.00 was donated in four subscriptions of \$1,000.00 each, \$4,300.00 in subscriptions of \$100.00 and over, \$2,000.00 in donations of \$50.00 and over and \$1,000.00 in amounts of \$25.00 and over. Thus \$11,300.00 was donated by 123 subscribers, leaving only \$8,314.71 to be subscribed by the rest of the public.

Of the total amount subscribed \$6,-79.43 was earmarked for the Red

ross Branch.

The total expenditures was \$27,237.

The analysis of this account in the balance sheet shows sufficiently learly how the money was spent. The esult of the year's work leaves us a salance to go forward to next year of 7,722,44:





Consider the Hen.

(From the Milwaukee Journal.)

The scarcity of the food supply and the present high prices ought to stimulate the farmers to unusual efforts to improve agriculture. The burden of high-priced meat, one of the main essentials of the American diet, would be greatly relieved if eggs were lowpriced and abundant. The American production of eggs could be doubled in a year by the proper scientific feeding. Census statistics in Missouri show that in that State hens lay an average of sixty-three eggs a year. In these days when that lays 200 eggs a year is becoming common among expert breeders and feeders, the farm hen which probably supplies 90 per cent or more of our egg production, is still stolidly producing about one-half or one-third the number of eggs that she ought. Some hens have been bred which have produced more than 300 eggs each per year, or almost an egg a day. This is five times the Missour average.

A productive hen requires seventy to eighty pounds of food of the right kind per year, whereas the average farm hen which must scratch for most of her living does not get more than 40 or 50 pounds of food in a year Farmers in Missouri who practice scientific feeding doubled their egg production almost immediately. Could there be better evidence than this that every city and country poultryman can get results by scientific feeding? Fifty thousand poultrymen of the State might begin this wise feeding policy o-morrow, much to their own advantage in the way of profits and also to the great advantage of the consumer, who would thus be provided with one of the best substitutes for meat.

Experiments on fifteen hundred ba ies recently conducted at a New York Clinic seemed to prove that after six nonths a child thrives best on artificial food. Up to six months the heaviest babies are breast fed, but after that age the artificial fed youngsters gain more quickly.

At the end of one year from birth the heaviest babies were those which were breast fed until the supply gave out, usually in from twenty-seven to thirty-two weeks, when they were weaned in a fortnight and put on arificial food.

The next in weight were the babies artificially fed from birth, and the lowest in weight those that have been fed from the breast for the year; the low weight being caused by a mild form of starvation after the first six
