VIOLENT ARTILLERY DUELS.

PARIS, July 30.

Last night there were violent artillery duels in the Aisne and Verdun regions of the French front. Not more than 50 concerns in St. John's are making over \$2,000.00, yearly, about the same number may be found outside the city, as Fishermen who make \$2,000.00 do not come under the act. This leaves the entire contribution of one quarter of a million dollars which the Government expect to raise by the tax to be paid by 50 City and 50 Outport people. This I would submit is most unjust-let all feel the burden of raising this money, let every man in the Colony pay his share. The Fisherman earning \$500.00 has as much right to pay say \$10.00 or \$20.00 as the Merchant making \$2,100 has to pay 25 per cent. or \$525.00. If everyone does his part and fairness and equality is meted out to all, then no one will kick, but to feltch the "pound of flesh" from a class of earners numbering about one hundred, and allowing 49,900 to go free is a crime. 





Compensation Board Will Look After Day, Miss M., Water Street Dependents of Miners Killed at Dawe, Miss Mary,


Every woman and child dependent pon the miners who lost their lives n the disaster at New Waterford, on Wednesday, will be provided for under the Nova Scotia Workmen's Compensation Act, and every man who was injured will also be paid. It is estimated that the amount of money required to look after these people will be in the vicinity of \$200,000, but officials of the Workmen's Compensation Board state that the funds belonging to the coal mining class coming under the Act will be quite sufficient for this

purpose. The total number killed was 70, and the injured nine. Of the killed some Farrell, R. were single. Had all been married. with families, the total amount required to look after them would be about \$350,000. Under the Act the Flynn, Mrs. Patrick, 42 widow of every miner who loses his life at work, receives \$20 per month or life, unless she remarries, in which case she gets \$480. The children receive \$5 per month apiece, up to four children. If there are more the sum

In the case of single men who have een killed, the Act provides that their dependents, such as aged parents, oung brothers or sisters, otherwise nprovided for, shall receive a monthy payment of 55 per cent. of their dendency, as long as that dependency
