



Re-organizing Queen's College.

It will be noted with pleasure by our Church of England friends and ers, that a definite and determined fort is being made to place Queen's heological College on a sound basis, proving it generally along lines of nodern requirement and usefulness, Rev. Dr. N. F. Facey, the present Principal, has outlined a scheme that 's finding favor with those to whom it has been presented, and a large meeting of representative Churchmen in the city has recently decided to push on the enterprise vigorously. In the past, the College has been cramped n various ways, though its existence has been more than justified, and more has been more than half the clergymen working in the Dominion to-day are Queen's College graduates. Newfoundland is not now regarded as a Missionary Dioese, and it will not be so easy in future to secure men from outside to fill the places of those who pass out. or to supplement the ranks. Besides ere is no scarcity of men within our orders who are anxious to enter the Ministry if opportunities for equipment and study are provided. At present missions and parisbes are without clergymen, while very many of the missions and parishes have become so unwielding as to render etficient clerical work practically impossible. The people are calling for clergymen, and the funds for their upkeep are guaranteed. Dr. Facey's plan to remodel the College, making prons for at least twelve students nd two or more lecturers. Having ompleted their college course at Queen's, students will have opportunity for a University post-graduate course in England or Canada, at their option. Matriculation at entrance to Queen's will be the same as for Durham University. The plan of those interested is to raise a sum of money sufficient to establish a competent en-dowment, and this, considering the seventy odd thousand Churchmen in the Dominion, should not be a difficult undertaking. A committee has been appointed to arrange the details for collecting and other important matters relating to the scheme, and this work will be commenced without delay. It will be of interest to many to know that Dr. Facey, whose energy and interest are largely responsible for this forward movement, is a native of the Dominion, owning Trinity Bay as his birth-place. His own college career began at St. Augustine's, Canterbury; subsequently obtaining degrees at Durham, Cambridge and Dublin. Following a distinguished scholastic career he has returned to his home land, where his education and experience are to be expended in the adement of his Church.

At last night's service the Rector eached the eighth of his series of ermons on the ten commandments. He prefaced his address on stealing by referring to the apparent justification there is always in evidence for any sin committed, instancing as examples intemperance, licentiousness, laziness, etc., each sin being argued for by its addicters and partakers as being either essential or at least beneficial to them in some way or other. But the preacher also demonstrated plainly that where there is even the widest justification the easons against the action or sin are far in excess of the temporary benefits, sin at the last always paying its wages-death. Touching on the theme of his sermon, the preacher stated that stealing had as much apparent justification as any other of the major sins, but likewise in common with the other sins, its dangers were greater than its apparent pleassures. Analyzing his subject more clearly he emphasised three points (1) Stealing of money; in this connection he included every kind of theft of money committed but more especially that theft by men and business corporations comprising possibly the highest in the Church or State, taking by unsuspected means the unlawful profits made by shrewd (?) business deals. The thief may he prompted and led by the most laudable motive but the suffering which he must of necessity inflict on others counteracts and annuls the good accomplished by the non-keeping of the eighth commandment. (2) There is the stealing of time. In those days of clamouring for higher wages, it is often said that the employee is intent on obtaining the highest price for his work—an action guite natural—but he often forgets or declines to remember punctuality and industry in his work, thus defrauding his employer and incident-ally building for himself an ill reputation, for no employer would care to engage one who proverbially shirked his duty. (3) Stealing of character. Of the social aspects of this commandment this is undoubtedly the most objectionable and yet possibly the commonest breach. More so than in the other two, it does more nischief, wreaks more damage and oes more irreparable harm than either of the foregoing. The theft of character was illustrated by the reacher declaring that were a scurrilous report of the most respected man in his congregation to be circulated the chances were that only a brief few of the whole would refuse to believe the same without positive proof, and fewer still would sympathise with the fallen, were the report true. 
