EXTRAORDINARY CONDUCT.—A remarkable fact has transpired during the proceedings at the present Fall Assizes, and this is that not less than four prisoners have been allowed to escape from constables in the northern part of the county.

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WELLINGTON FALL ASSIZES.

BEFORE MR. JUSTICE GALT. Guelph, Nov. 8th.

SCHOOGIE VS. CORPORATION OF GUELPH. This was an action brought by Messrs. Scroggie & Newton, grocers, Wyndham street, Guelph, against the corporation of this town, to obtain compensation for damage caused by the flow of water from the streets into the cellar of their premises in March last.

The following evidence was taken: Mr. Scroggie said that on the 7th and 14th of March this year the cellar of the premises occupied by him on Wyndham street was overflowed by water that came from Cork and Wyndham streets, also from the cellar of Mr. Petrie, who occupied the premises next door.

The goods in the cellar were greatly damaged in consequence of the water, which was a mixture of liquor, beer, vinegar, syrup, whitening, sal-soda, soap, currants and raisins, paper bags, bottled ale and porter, and case goods. The water got into the liquor barrels, and some of the ale bottles were broken.

Estimated the loss at \$317 old. The cause of the overflow was that the drain on the corner of Cork and Wyndham streets had become choked up, causing the water to flow into the cellars.

Witness was cross-examined by Mr. Guthrie as to the manner in which the water got in, and as to the nature of the damage.

The New Government.

The members of the newly formed Administration have been sworn in. The only change in the list of members of the Government, which we gave yesterday, is that Mr. Ross, of Victoria, holds the appointment of Minister of Militia, the Presidency of the Council being still vacant. The Hon. Mr. Scott, late Commissioner of Crown Lands for Ontario, has resigned that office, and has accepted a seat in the new Dominion Cabinet, without a portfolio and without emolument.

The House was prorogued on Friday, in order to give the members of the new Government time for re-election, and to arrange the programme of work for the next session, which will most probably not open till February.

Sir John Macdonald began to show his teeth on Friday, when in the course of his speech in the House he left the subject on which he had risen to make a motion, and began to abuse all and sundry who could not be coerced to vote in favour of his Government on the Pacific Scandal case. He was proceeding to abuse them and the new Government in a furious style when he was called to order by Mr. Holton. A good deal of skirmishing followed, which was kept up till the members were summoned, to the Senate to hear the prorogation. It is quite evident that Sir John is savage over his defeat and loss of office, and that he is making desperate attempts to rally his scattered forces.

The Late Appointments.

The utmost indignation is felt and expressed at the appointments made by the late Ministry, while they were on the point of dissolution. Tilley, Hugh Macdonald, and Crawford were in their places in the House when Sir John announced his resignation. They must have been illegally in the House, or their appointments are illegal. The Governor-General, by sanctioning such barefaced nepotism, is no longer worthy of the confidence of the people of Canada. A despatch from Toronto says that the appointment of John Crawford as Lieutenant-Governor as the last act of the dying Ministry, is looked on there as indefensible, and prominent Conservatives express their disapproval of it. A prominent John A. supporter and Queen's Counsel gives it as his opinion that we must be bidding farewell to responsible Government if such a course were to be countenanced. It is considered not improbable that he will not be permitted to enjoy that office, and that His Excellency will reconsider his appointment. All the appointments in Prince Edward Island have been given to Pope's Tory friends. Carter, of Broome, has a Judgeship in Manitoba, and a number of other appointments, said to embrace a hundred, have been made on the very threshold of the retirement of the Government. It will be seen if such disgraceful proceedings will be tolerated. The Government elect have the power to cancel all the appointments except those of the Lieut.-Governors, and if their duty to do so.

Much satisfaction appears to be felt at the fair distribution of Ministers among the different Provinces, and with the ability and honour of those secured.

A deputation of members of Parliament headed by Col. Hignbotham and A. N. Richards, waited upon the Hon. Mr. Dorion on Friday morning, to ascertain if provision would be made in the Cabinet for the representative of the Irish Catholics of Ontario. Mr. Dorion replied that provision would be made.

Sir John Macdonald will probably sail for England after prorogation. By providing for his friends when in the last gasp of power, he acknowledged the utter ruin of his party. Complete demoralization has set in among them, and nearly all his followers are trying to make terms with the party in power.

The Ontario Reformers, by yielding one of their seats to Mr. Laird, of P. E. I., have completely killed the cry of sectionalism.

London, Nov. 8.—The withdrawal of £750,000 in specie, from the Liverpool branch of the Bank of England, for shipment to New York by to-day's steamer, is understood to have been the determining cause of the rise in the bank rate.

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—A severe shock of earthquake was felt at Unionville, Nevada, and two shocks felt in Virginia City, Nevada, at about seven o'clock this evening.

New York, Nov. 8.—It is asserted that the bricklayers' strike has ended successfully to the men.

A despatch from Allentown, Pa., says that quite a number of furnaces in the Lehigh Valley have been blown out, and in the larger proportion of iron mills they have reduced wages from 10 to 15 per cent. It is expected there will be a general suspension of iron manufacturers at an early day. Work will probably be stopped in nearly all the coal mines of the middle Schuylkill.

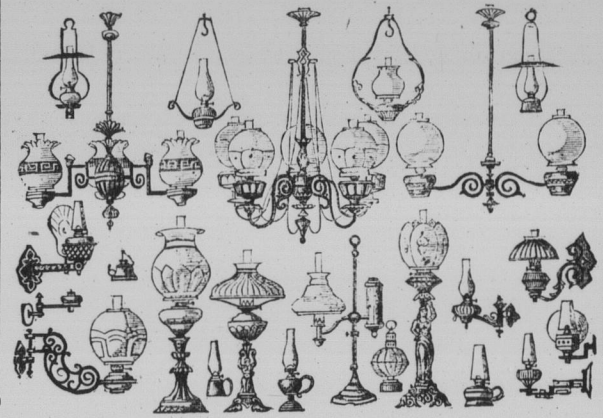
