From New York to London by Rail. Prom The Portland Oregonian. of an Atlantic trip and the horrors of mal de

People will, instead of risking the dangers of an Atlantic trip and the horrors of mal demor, as well as for the purpose of saving time, leave New York for London, via Portland and St. Petersburg, and thus will, be examplified more fully the great speech of Senator Benton, when, in pointing from Washington toward the Pacific, he exclaimed: "There lies the East; there lies India.!"

There are now two lines of railway running eastward from St. Petersburg toward the Ural mountains, one serminating at Orenburg and the other at Ekaterinburg, and the Caar has lately approved of a plan to build a railway continuing from the Ural mountains to the Pacific ocean, a distance of about 7000 miles including the 1500 miles already constructed from St. Petersburg to the Ural This road will have its eastern terminus at Vladifectock, which is situated at the furthest southern extensity of Russian territory lying on the Pacific coast on that side. This, of itself, will much shorten the trip from St. Petersburg to American Pacific coast ports, superindicing, as it will a line of steamers from Vincivostock to American ports, across a much narrower portion of the Pacific ocean than that of the course of the atenmers now plying between Vancouver and Vokohama.



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

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

And since an attempt is now made to represent Sir Morell as obstinately disbelieving in the existence of cancer to the last, I may refer you to the dispatch cabled the same day—March 14—printed probably on the 16th. I have not looked at it since, but I will venture to say that the existence of cancer was plainly signified. I had not a doubt of it after my talk.

Strangely unlike the real Mackenzie, as I then saw him, is the caricature of him drawn by his enemies. What they make him out you know. The man with whom I talked was like a soldier on a forlorn hope, perhaps still more like one of those singular beings of the middle ages, whose ideal of devotion to duty was monatic. The stern plainness of the rooms, the lean ascetic face and figure, the fire in the gray eyes, the simplicity and a succeity of his manner and talk, all lent themselves to his mainer and talk, all lent themselves to his hands; knew he himself would be held by his enemies responsible for the failure to save a life which no human power could save. The Germans themselves, I believe, will some day see that this is a truer account of the matter than that which their disappointed doctors have chosen to give, and will render to Sir Morell Mackenzie some of the honor which is fairly his due.

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
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
