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Debs Has Learned His Lesson. Debs has announced that he will never again advise workmen to strike. He is convinced that the sentiment of the American people is opposed to strikes.

It cost the railway a fabulous sum to teach Debs his salutary lesson. The interruption of business and consequent loss of rolling stock will aggregate in losses a stupendous sum. The Government, or better perhaps the taxpayers, will be called upon to pay millions of dollars for the expense of maintenance of troops called out to suppress disorder and to make restitution for property destroyed.

The Gold Export and Its Meaning. The continued firmness of sterling exchange indicates further large exports of gold to Europe, and one foreign banking house has already broken open one and a quarter millions for shipment.

Sanitary Withdrawals Will Probably Bring the Reserve Below Fifty Millions. This means that the Treasury holds only about seven cents in gold for every paper dollar it has outstanding.

Washington intimates that Mr. Carlisle is striving to an early settlement of the tariff struggle to increase the gold receipts, and hopes that a considerable portion of them will be paid in the yellow metal.

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MUST GO TO THE GUILLOTINE.

SANTO THE MURDERER OF CARNOT TO BE BEHEADED.

At Mention of His Mother's Name the Assassin Wept, and When the Jury Sealed His Doom His Bravado Disappeared—Calls Eccentrically on His Adversaries to Close His Address.

LYONS, Aug. 3.—The second day of the trial of the anarchist assassin, Santo Caserio, opened with the testimony of the soldier Labiano, who, while under arrest for desertion, was confined in the hospital at Olette at the same time Caserio was a patient in that institution.

Labiano related the purport of his chats with Caserio while in the hospital, and persisted in his statement that Caserio had declared the anarchists would next kill a president or a king, and also in his statement that Caserio had said that the lots had been drawn and that he had in this way been assigned to go to Lyons and kill M. Carnot.

Caserio denied that he had said these things to Labiano, though he admitted he had preached anarchist doctrine to him. Concerning the drawing of lots Caserio said anarchists retained absolute individual liberty of action and would not create a party merely because they happened to have been selected by hazard or for any other particular reason than that of their own will.

A Citizen of No Nation. At 9.30 o'clock Attorney-General Folchier began his address to the jury. He declared that Caserio was a citizen of no nation, and that he was a French citizen.

M. Folchier then reviewed the details of the murder of President Carnot, and other wise showed the pleasure he felt at this appeal to his intense egotism. All the time he declared that the indictment upon the prisoner of the extreme penalty of the law was imperative.

The Defense Was by Comparison. M. Folchier concluded his argument at 10.15, when M. Debruhl, counsel for the prisoner, arose. He appeared as the defender of Caserio, he said, because he was a citizen of the same country as the man whose death he was called upon to defend.

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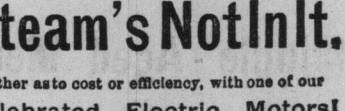
