TROUBLE IN THE Q.O.R.

The Sergeant-Major said to have Resigned Owing to a Dispute With the Sergeants.

The sergeant-major of the Queen's Own Rifles again has a grievance; in fact, for the past year he has been playing a kind of a game with his superiors. This time the trouble arises over a sergeant-major, Captain Gunther, acting adjutant, as to which has the authority to appoint a hand sergeant, a position not called for in the regulations governing a rifle regiment, but is usually filled by one of the staff sergeants.

At a recent parade Staff Sergeant Creighton was in charge of the band, in accordance with the wishes of the sergeant-major, but at the next parade Staff Sergeant Ashall was also on hand in order to act as band sergeant from that date. This led to the dispute between the sergeant-major and the sergeant-major, and it culminated in the latter asking Col. Hamilton for his ruling on the subject.

The colonel's views were evidently not satisfactory to the sergeant-major, and it is said that he sent his resignation to the colonel at the same time making certain charges against the non-commissioned officers who resigned and that they would not turn out at the next parade on Monday-morrow, thus crippling the regiment.

This rumor no doubt reached the ears of the Colonel at the hour of a meeting of the sergeants after parade last Wednesday night and assured them that the charges made by the sergeant-major would receive the fullest investigation and would not doubt be decided in favor of the sergeant-major's resignation of both parties. In the meantime the resignation of the sergeant-major is not successful.

Several aldermen had proposals in regard to the street naming report, but Aid. Lamb explained that he had asked that all petitions for changes should come before next Monday's meeting of the council, when the report is to be ratified.

Ald. Jolliffe has been conversing about effect on the subject of the old contract for six months back, yesterday when the solicitor's and engineer's report came up advising that Messrs. Elias Rogers & Co.'s account be paid according to the agreement with the firm last June, he attempted to have the matter sent back to the committee with a view of having the firm's creditors to sue the account.

The report of the Property Committee on the Islander was read and approved with the exception of the clause relative to Mr. John T. Small's lease, which, at the request of the chairman of the committee, Aid. Dunn, was referred back.

The Cobban and the Lease. Mr. J. A. Worrell, Q.C., appeared before the committee on behalf of the Cobban Manufacturing Company in connection with the decision of the Property Committee to drop all negotiations with them in regard to their lease. Aid. Dunn pointed out at the whole delay of the Cobban Manufacturing Company in signing its lease had been with a view to escaping taxation until next year. Mr. Worrell pointed out that there had been no useful delay, but if there had been it was on the part of the city.

This statement was refuted and Aid. Lamb asked Mr. Worrell if his clients were prepared to sign their lease and pay their taxes and end the matter. Mr. Worrell parried and said that if most of the buildings had been valued at \$40,000 instead of \$45,000 there would have been no delay.

A discussion ensued, and Aid. Dunn moved that if the lease was valued at the \$45,000 terms by 12 o'clock today the city would not pay for it. Mr. Worrell said that they would consent unless the sum was reduced to \$40,000.

"Very well," said Aid. Dunn, "the matter is dropped, and Messrs. Worrell and Phillips retired. It is understood that they will make endeavor to open negotiations at Monday's meeting of the council."

Hallam's Plan Again Sent Back. Ald. Hallam's amended proposal to expend \$13,000 on Island Park High Park came up. Aid. Lamb moved the occasion to taunt Aid. Hallam on his swans. 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ROME TREMBLED.

The Eternal City's Inhabitants Tortured by an Earthquake Shock—Great Damage to Property.

Rome, Nov. 1.—This city was visited by a violent earthquake on the morning of the 30th inst. At 5.40 o'clock this morning, people were roused from their slumbers and fled to the open squares and the greatest consternation prevailed.

The convent of Santa Maria Maggiore was greatly damaged. A portion of the outer wall was overthrown and part of the ceiling has fallen. One of the inmates, a monk, was injured.

The shocks were confined to the Province of Rome. They were felt very strongly at the Castellani Romani, but the damage done there was not serious. Two clocks in the observatory stopped. The moment the tremblings began, each indicating the hour 5.33.

The shocks created a great panic among the inmates of the prison and a mutiny was attempted. Troops were quickly called to the assistance of the keepers and in a short time the mutiny was suppressed and order restored.

The Pope was awakened by the shocks. He was perfectly calm, and after rising made haste to enquire the news from the city.

Investigation discloses the fact that the damage done by the quakes is much greater than was at first supposed. Four palaces and the Bank of Italy were so shaken that they are rendered unsafe for occupancy.

The Palazzo Alessandri, one of the finest palaces in Rome, and five other structures of that character, are seriously damaged.

The building of the Ministry of Finance was slightly damaged. The quakes ran up all the bells in the city, and doors were shaken and windows smashed everywhere.
