

#### Pithy Philatelic Points.

Sayings and Articles of Noted Writers Carefully Condensed.

BY GEO. W. STARNAMAN.

It is said by those who know, that in making a fortune the first thousand dollars comes the hardest and costs the most, no matter how large that fortune may afterwards become. The very reverse of this is true in making a collection of stamps. The first thousand stamps cost the least and are usually the most easily obtained of any in the collection.—Rev. Hobart Clark.

One of the ugliest, most inconvenient and most expensive of philatelic fads.—U. S. plate number collecting,—has by its sudden popularity shown what a hold on the interest of collectors a mere notion of some genius may gain, when once the contagion starts.—Chas. E. Jenney.

Philatelia does not require any secret organization to make us an order of brothers; but I do think we could enjoy many an hour of travel, a day's sojourn, or even a short ride on the street car, if some emblem were adopted by which one philatelist might know another light, without any formality.—C. K. Sturtevant.

Viewed from a censervative standpoint, errors in surcharges are very seldom desirable property, and the less attention they receive at the hands of philatelists, the better for the pursuit. Of all philatelic speculations the easiest of execution, and of all philatelic pretences the most trans-

parent, surcharge errors are at best, a delusion and a snare.—Lewis G.Quackenbush

Many collectors who have rearranged their collection once or twice upon the issuing of new editions of the catalog have given up at last in despair, thinking that there could be no permanent arrangement of a collection, and have henceforth added stamps without attempt at any arrangement beyond grouping the various issues together.—Crawford Capen.

Envelopes are very poor things to invest in, and many dealers have told me that they do not handle them. So many colletors make a specialty of entire envelopes now, that the market for cut squares will soon be similar to the cut rounds.—Geo. S. Seymour.

The philatelist who is exact and methodical about his collection, and who makes it a point to carefully collect and classify all legitimate issues and new varieties, on returning to his album after neglecting it all summer finds himself over burdened with work.—M. C. Spears.

Every collector who makes a practice of studying his stamps, must have been struck with the similarity which often exists between the emissions of countries widely separated geographically, and with no political or other ties to bind them.—F. Putney Jr.

If you intend to be an active philatelist you should take two or three stamp papers. This paper is Canada's leader, you should subscribe at once.—Geo. W. Starnaman.

#### United States Minutes.

CONDUCTED BY USONA.

The Postmaster General has issued an order to the effect that mail matter passing between the United States and Porto Rico shall be subject to domestic rates of postage and the United States postage stamps shall be valid for postage in either direction, in addition to those now used in Porto Rico. This will make the surcharged stamps for this colony a good thing for collectors.

The Ohio Centennial of 1902 is the last a lvertised; in the postmark of the Toledo office.

Putting up stamps for the public in conveniently sized books with waved paper between the leaves is a scheme now being considered by the P. O. Department, and quite a number of interesting items and points will probably be discussed at the meeting of Postmasters to be held here shortly. The department has granted one week's leave to every first class postmaster who may desire to attend this convention.

A letter with the following surcharged and a 5-cent Hawaiian stamp was received in the Chicago Postoffice the other day "Paquebot, U. S. charge to collect 10c." The person to whom it was directed upon being asked for the 10 cents, complained that the package was not overweight and therefore the 10 cents was not due. This was too much for the carrier, and it required an investigation to finally show that the charge was not for overweight, but was a private charge. The word Paquebot means that it was carried by a non-official boat, and the ten cents is collected by the captain from the postmaster at the land-

ing port, and is finally collected from the addressee.

Is the selling of stamps "by the pound" a straight scheme? There are many advertisements of stamps "gathered by a collector in exchange for packages of needles," "turned in by a missionary," "the result of an endless chain for the beaefit of" and many other alluring titles, all of which say that the stamps have not been sorted over. Sounds a little fishy that anyone should get them and then be willing to pass them along without examining for rarities. But I should like to have the experience of some one who has invested.

In comparing the United States pages of the 59th catalogue with the 55th, it is striking to note the increase in the number of sub-varieties catalogued. The most conspicuous, and to my mind, the most instructive, are the cap varieties of the 2c adhesive of 1890. Two of them are cheap, 3 and 5 cents respectively, so they must be fairly common, and yet they only appear in a catalogue six years after they became Probably every collector, and obsolete certainly every dealer, must have often unwittingly thrown them aside with a grunt of disgust at the consignor who sent such trash. Undoubtedly the preconceived idea as to the sameness of this issue and their abundance, kept them from being closely scrutinized for variations and discouraged close examination. But preconceived notions and weariness are precisely the two things the variation hunter must avoid. Using a good glass, he must train his mind to become automatic in recognizing variations from the usual form, however slight. At first it requires fatiguing concentration of attention, but gradually the slides into the grooves required, the type is automatically registered and any var-

iation from the regular picture detected without conscious thought. And a variety hunter doesn't necessarily imply a variety collector. The pleasure is largely in hunting and finding (anticipation exceeds realization) and anything found can be readily disposed of if not wanted for yourself. Even on dealers approval sheets, finds may sometimes be made, unless philatelic writers prevaricate. Some varieties are glaringly apparent, as for instance the Die A of the present 2 cent envelope; others again are hard to describe even with a specimen in hand. The American, National and Continental Prints of the 1870-79 stamps are regular cryptograms, and the penalty attached to publishing cuts, combined with the studious avoidance of lucid description on the part of cataloguers. renders it next to impossible for the average collector to identify each print. But some one finds out these sub-varieties, and usually with profit to himself, and every collector when turning away from a batch of common stamps should feel sure that he hasn't left anything good therein, to be found by some more painstaking observer. The above has been in my mind since hearing of a succession of finds by a collectordealer in Washington while looking over what were supposed to be the veriest of trash. The 3 cent of 1861 in rose is worth about 1c, the 3c "premier gravure" of the same year is worth \$60; this collector found one of these latter in a search for shade varieties of the common stamp, and many more may be drifting around in 100 bunch. es of the one cent type. He also unearthed (so to speak) some of the "double paper" stamps of the 1882 1 and 3 cent values, These were devised to prevent washing, and consisted of an upper thinner layer of paper upon a thicker, the thin layer having for each stamp a circle of small perforations, through which the ink would pass to the layer beneath. A considerable number of these were issued, but they are rare. Ribbed paper specimens are also worth looking out for. So the collector should always have his eyes open, and never become set in the idea that because a stamp is common, there may not be undiscovered rare variations from one general type.

#### Argentine Republic.

Its Rule and Rulers, 1860-1880.

BY APEMANTUS.

Bartolome Mitre was born in Buenos Ayres June 26th 1821. He was banished by Rosas, but took part in the overthrow of Rosas in 1852. He held sevreal important offices until in 1861 his army defeated Urguiza's, which put an end to the Federalist System. In 1862, Mitre was elected to the presidency of the Argentine Confederation. In 1865, a few months after the breaking out of war between Brazil and Paraguay, Mitre refused the request of Pres ident Lopez to permit the Paraguayan army passing through one of the Argentine Provinces, neutrality having been previously declared. Upon this refusal, Lopez captured two vessels of the Argentine Navy and took possession of one of the ports, afterward marching his army across Argentine territory. The Argentines were so indignant at this proceeding on the part of the Paraguayans that on May 1st the Triple Alliance was formed. Mitre took the field at the head of the Argentine troops (afterwards made commander-inchief of the allied forces) through this cam-

paign, 1865-1870. The Paraguayans were defeated and President Lopez killed in March, 1870. Mitre's term of office expired in 1868 and his successor elect was Sarmiento. Mitre probably averted war between Argentine and Brazil, being sent as special envoy on the occasion of settlement of the Paraguay boundries. In 1874 he was again a candidate for president, and on being defeated, tried to gain the position by force of arms. Sarmiento, whose term of office was just expiring, assisted in putting down the rebellion, and the insurgent forces were defeated and made prisoners. The new President was In 1892, Mitre was again can-Avillanda. didate for the presidency, but withdrew. He was a celebrated author and publisher. He published two important historical works, the "Historia de Belgrano" and the "Historia de San Martin," besides many poems and essays, His portrait appears on the 50-cent blue, 1888, and 50c orange, 1890.

Domingo Faustino Sarmiento, is best known as an educator and journalist but during the term of his ministry to the United States he was elected president of Argentine, which office he fill, 1868-1874. His portrait may be found on the 6-cent, 1888; 6-cent 1890.

Nicholal Avillanda whose picture may be found on the 10-cent, 1888; 10-cent, 1890, was a journalist, author, and statesman.

For many years he was professor of political economy in the University of Buenos Ayres. He succeeded Sarmiento as president of Argentine 1874-1880. He died Dec. 26, 1885.

### Collecting Post Cards.

The Perils of the Philatelic Sea are many and great, and we the poor Philatelists, launched in boats of paper succumb to all the storms that rage thereon, yet perhaps our boats are of more than paper for to-day we resist some of the many storms manfully and often successfully. But to make a long story short let us here try to remedy something that, to some, may be one of the "Perils."

The collecting of Post Cards, unless carried on properly is dangerous; sometimes I have known collectors to collect post cards in the same album with their stamps. This is a very risky thing to do and should be avoided by collectors, for some of their stamps on the same page will, most likely, get spoiled by the cards. Cards should never be in the same book with stamps for damage will always come of it.

Some collectors put a hinge on the top corners of the card and paste it on the opposite page to the stamps and every time they open or close their album the consequence is this card flapping about tears off half a dozen stamps and often damages some.

To insure against damage, if a collector intends collecting post cards and stamps together he should have a separate album for each, and in this way none of his stamps will be hurt and he will have a much more picturesque collection.

Post cards do make a very pretty array especially unused and often a very valuable one as also do envelopes, and arranged in design they would catch the eye of many a non-philatelist and perhaps add one more to our ranks. But please don't discourage him by opening your album to show your collection and exhibit several stamps pulled off and hurt by the card on the opposite page.

It is an evil which should have been overcome before this, but no person has, as yet, offered a phrase which would indicate whether they are reprints or not. If the dealer wishes to be honest with his customers, he should write underneath the stamp "Reprint," and of course the price should be far lower than catalog price of the original. If the dealer does not mention the stamp as a reprint, and marks it at full value of a genuine specimen, he is liable to be arrested for attempted fraud. No responsible dealer would do this knowingly, and unless his clerks did it, the dealer is only a mere bey who perhaps does not know that it really is a reprint.

Fellow Members: I regret very much that

this report has to be a fault-finding one. An error in my last report is causing no end of trouble and I want to correct same now. The amount of insurance we are retaining when retiring books is 1% not 10%

as incorrectly stated last month.

Another thing is that members are sending books of their own manufacture filled with stamps. Of course these cannot be circulated (read Rule 1 of the dept.); other members are sending in books containing stamps marked at catalog instead of net prices, and all these have to go back to their owners.

I am also having some trouble with members who send in books valued at \$1. 82 and \$3. I have sent out a few of these, but find it does not pay, as there is but little demand for stamps worth only a cent or two each and the princip a patrons of the dept. object to paying postage on trush. From date, therefore, I must respectfully refuse to receive any book whose value is less than \$4.00, as per rule 2 of the dept.

Please bear in mind the following and you will save me a lot of trouble:

Blank books for use in the department are 5c each, 6 for 25c.

Value of each book must be at least

Prices must be net cash and not cata-

log value.

Bear in mind the discounts offered by dealers and mark your stamps as low or lower than their price if you expect them to be sold.

Since my last report, I have retired 7 books, from which sales were very satisfactory. Always glad to add a buyer to my list, so if you want to go on a circuit and receive stamps from the department,

just say so.

If there are any of the members who have any of the old style books, like were used in the dept. last year (rubber stamp printing on the cover) I wish they would return same to me and receive in exchange an equal number of the new ones which are much nicer and far more convenient to use on account of their size.

Please remember this and do not send in any stamps mounted in the old style books, but use the new ones instead.
