Attached to 60th Batt'n of Montreal. Fought with the 60th Batt'n in Ypres Salient, through the Somme and over Vimy Ridge. The 60th Batt'n was broken up and then he was transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles. Fought at Hill 70, Lens, and Passchendaele. Then transferred to the 9th Brigade Headquarters. Returned to the 5th C. M. R. on December 26th, 1917. Mortally wounded in raid on German trenches, March 15th, 1918, and died the following morning. Age 22 years.


PTE. HAROLD EVANS GILROY




MAJOR WILLIAM N. ASHPLANT, 1st BATT'N

CAPTAIN FREDERICK WILLIAM CAMPBELL, V.C., D.S.O., CROIX DE GUERRE, MOUNT FOREST

Captain Campbell, the first Canadian V.C. officer commanding the Machine Gun Section of the 1st Batt'n, 1st Brigade, went overseas with the 1st Contingent. His long military career had already won for him the complete confidence and love of his men. As both soldier and man he was admired and respected by all who knew him. The South African war proved him a hero. His "Campbell Wheel" in the Quebec Museum is evidence of his resources in action. Coming of a long line of soldiers, his great-grandfather was Captain Ames, who helped to repel the United States invaders from Canada in the war of 1812. On his forty-seventh birthday, he received a mortal wound in the hip during the battle of Givenchy, June 15th, 1915, after his immortal effort of that day. For maintaining his machine gun fire after nearly the whole of his detachment had been killed, for repulsing the German counter attack, almost single handed, for saving by his bravery a most critical situation, he was awarded the supreme honor of militarism, the Victoria Cross. Sir Max Aitken pays tribute in these words: "No man died that night with more glory: yet many died, and there was much glory."

Greater love than this hath no man, That he lay down his life for his friends.



Gunner Donaghy commenced his military career as a mere lad, having joined the Royal Canadian Dragoons, of Winnipeg, as bugler in 1899 and served as such with the 2nd Contingent in the South African War. On his return he joined Canada's regular army and was in barracks with the R. C. Corps in Toronto, Winnipeg, and Esquimalt, B.C. He left Esquimalt in November, 1915, as a member of the Royal Canadian Artillery. Went to France in April, 1917, and was serving as a member of the 43rd Howitzer Battery, of Guelph, when killed at Passchendaele. November 25th, 1917, and was buried in Brandhock Cemetery, near Poperinghee, Belgium.

CAPTAIN BRYAN ROBINSON

Adjutant in the Salvation Army, came from Hamilton, Bermuda, in 1904, and was stationed with various corps in Nova Scotia. Captain Robinson went through the great battle of Hill 70 on the Flanders Front in August, 1917, escaping without a scratch. For his gallant conduct in these operations, he was awarded the Military Cross. On September 2nd, 1918, while leading his company in an attack, Captain Robinson received a wound from machine gun bullet, under the right eye. He was taken to the First Aid Post and had his wound dressed. He was being carried out by four German prisoners when a shell fell near them, killing the whole party.
