Natural processes do not suffice of themselves to destroy the germs of infectious disease. Epidemics have been traced back in various notable

instances and their breedingplace discovered in the cemetery. In 1880, the year before his death, the late Lord Beaconsfield described "God's Acre" as not adapted to the times, and as an institution prejudicial to the public health

Cremation has been offered as a substitute and admittedly satisfies the demands of sanitary science. But destruction of the bodies of the loved and lost by the action of intense heat is repugnant to religious conviction and personal sentiment and affection. The advocates of this method of solving the problem presented by the abandonment of earth burial, have not succeeded in altering public opinion to any marked extent, nor does there appear any prospect of accomplishing this for generations. Reform must come otherwise and indeed can be secured only by entombment above ground carried out by methods that fulfil the requirements of advanced sanitary sciences. Modern mausoleums meet all the demands of religion, sentiment and policy. They have inspired architectural features that create an atmosphere of consecration and reverence, and their growing, popularity in the United States warrants the anticipation that they are destined to ing expenses of management and all supersede earth burial at no distant date

CITY PLAYGROUNDS.

An account of its stewadship has been given by the Toronto Playground's Association in the attractive report of the past year's work. The association is incorporated and since 1908 has been active in providing and supervising open spaces for children in the crowded parts of the city. Eighteen months ago St. Andrew's playground way opened on West Adelaide-street, and the average daily attendance was 641 girls and 568 boys. A year ago Mr. E. B. Osler provided a playground at Dundas and Argyle-streets. Another was opened on Cottingham-street, but this is likely to be acquired by the railways. Seven school playgrounds have been opened during the year, and many acres have been set aside in the parks for sports and games. Money is required to carry on this useful work, the cost of which has been argely borne by such generous citizens

This requires what is now called a wheat line from the Georgian Bay to Montreal, and such a wheat line to be effective must be standard built, and especially built with regard to grades. The Canadian Pacific has the elevators at Port Arthur and the elevators at Victoria Harbor on the Georgian Bay, but at present has only a single-track line of indifferent grade from the Georgian Bay to Montreal. But it is working at the proposition in a very earnest way, and the contracts are now let for the first section from Victoria Harbor to Bethany, near Peterboro. Two years will see this big line completed, and then for the first time will the Province of Ontario be properly served as far as one railway is concerned in the direction of a genuine transcontinental service.

But what about the Grand Trunk? It will be twenty months yet before its all-rail line will have reached Cochrane, where it will get connection with the east over the rails of the Timiskamnig & Northern Ontario line. But it, too. has a wheat line if view, and it has not ye even a good working arrangement of its railway from Winnipeg to Port Arthur by way of Superior Junction. This, however, will soon be put in good shape, and on the opening of navigation the Grand Trunk will be able to store western wheat in its elevators at Midland and Parry Sound. - From Midland it will have some kind of wheat line to Mont-real, and, like the Canadian Pacific, it will gradually improve it.

But what about the Canadian Northern? It is now at Port Arthur, but it will be some two years set before it can hope to get an all-rail line from Port Arthur to Post Lake, which is its present end of steel north of Sudbury. It has a harber on Georgian Bay at Key Inlet, but it has no line from Key Inlet to Montreal across the penin-Its requirement therefore, is a wheat line like what the sula. Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific have and are likely soon to have, and that is a high-class road from Key Inlet to Montreal. t has also an immense amount of fine timber, and it has agricultural lands, and especially that portion known as the clay belt, which promise enormous yields to the settler who will go in there and clear the bush. It may be discouraging these days to think about clearing a bush farm but we have our own view of the matter, that eventually the busil farmer is going to fare better than some of the others farther to the west; who have only to scratch the prairie to get a crop of wheat.

But we do not intend to encourage rivalry of this kind so much as to direct the public attention to the large amount of work that remains to be done in this province to complete our transcontinental railway outfits.

Eight Great Centres.

With these greater projects in Northern Ontario in connection with three transcontinental roads, there suddenly comes a great advance to a number of places that are now important points, but which are immediately destined to become places of much greater standing in Ontario, namely: Port Arthur, Sudbury, Cochrane, North Bay, Farry Sound, Key Inlet, Midland, Victoria Harbor-eight new centres of an enormous and growing trade. All of these places are fired with a new zeal. Take another look at the map and you will see what is to make these new centres of trade. Of course Port Arthur has already arrived, but it is to be much greater.

Mr. Beck outlined a project which will make hydro-electric power available to Ontario farmers for farming purposes. The possibilities of the employment of electricity on the farm were marvelous in view of the results obtained from experimental work in the agricultural districts of Germany and the United States.

Fertilization by electricity, where tried, has improved wheat by 45 per cent., and strawberries as high as 128 per cent. 


