

Great Work of Ontario Government's Prison Farm at Guelph Featured Founding of Administration Building--Distinguished Gathering Attended Ceremony.

Humanitarian work never got a greater boost than that which has been and is being accomplished by the Ontario Government in the matter of prison reform.

Less than two years ago the experinent of a prison farm at Guelph was put into operation. It has been an unqualified success, and yesterday Sir James Whitney laid the corner-stone of a splendid new administration building, but of stone cut from the quarries on the farm by the prisoners themselves.

A great work has been done at the Central Prison Farm at Guelph, a great work is now being done, and a still greater work will be done there in fu-

Things are shaping that way now. The experiment stage has passed, and the worth of the institution which owes its existence in large part to the efforts of Hon. W. J. Hanna, the provincial secretary, has been proven.
