

SHOULD PRESTON BE FIRED? WHITBY PROUD; WHY NOT?

What is Meaning of Scandal Which Brought Lord Strathcons to Canada in Midwinter?

Between Ottawa and London there is a scandal that is like a boil on a man's neck—it is not very big, it feels bad to the sufferer, it interferes with his work, and if he does not get rid of it, it will permanently prevent him holding his head up.

Some of the zealous servants of the Dominion in the British capital are at loggerheads. Their duties may not be neglected but they are interfered with. The high commissioner and the commissioner for emigration have, in midwinter, journeyed to Canada to try to get rid of the boil. The trouble has to do with immigration It has been gathering for two or three years. No official account of it has been supplied to the public. They are indebted to a variety of newspaper reports for their knowledge of what seems like a partial break-down of an important de-

In sum, the scandal seems to amount to this: That the commissioner of emigration makes definite accusations of fraud against the secretary to the high commissioner, and certain of his own subordinates; which, if they were made in connection with any private business, would certainly lead to somebody or other receiving the key of the street and probably would produce an appeal to a court of summary jurisdiction. It is unseemly in the highest degree that such despatches as have been sent to The World and to other papers from Ottawa within the last

two or three weeks should be possible. Even if they were only concerned with some purely domestic affair this would be true; but when they affect, as they do, Canada's reputation for administrative efficiency. in the old country they are well nigh intolerable. In this case the first open intimation of trouble came thru the inspired organ of the government, which it is understood, is always sup-

What he does not know about the machine as it used to run before he went to England is not worth knowing. The World crossed lances with him in the old times, and would, no doubt, do so again if he returned from his isolation from party politics to his old haunts.

If he has failed to conduct his office wisely he deserves to be fired

with as little compunction as he was wont to show when he fought the Conservatives of this country with every device known to the political warrior. It is a serious thing to bring charges against an officer who is so near the centre of things as the secretary to an octogenarian high commissioner. Mr Preston has been long enough removed from party organization in Canada to appreciate the gravity of his accusations. There is reason to believe that in England he has been the faithful and zealous servant of the Dominion. He has devoted himself to a propaganda which, considering that there was no model to build upon, has been singularly free from mistakes. Possibly he thinks that the West is already pretty will filled up with people. The World is not afraid of an excessive tide of immigration, so long as people of the right sort come into the country. The business of this land is to grow more food than can be eaten within our borders and its power of absorption is greater than is often supposed. The people who are afraid of excessive inpouring would have predicted ten years ago that it was impossible for Canada to absorb the thousands who within a decade have come to us and have contributed very largely to the increase of prosperity which even the croakers share

The Minister of the Interior might be asked, as soon as possible after parliament reassembles, to state fully to the country the ideas of future development which he has gained during twelve months in office. Monetary Times: The notoriety which the York County Loan Company nas gained of recent days, and especially since its compulsory stoppage, has suspicion in the minds of many as to the safety of other loan companies using like methods. Nor is this all. It has caused murmurings as to the prudence of allowing mortgage loan companies to take deposits at all. This latter doctrine is not new; it was espoused many years ago by bankers more than one, and supported by arguments which have a certain weight if used with reference to speculative or arguments which have a certain weight if used with reference to speculative or loosely managed concerns of the kind. But these arguments have been heard and weighed before committees of parment in successive years, and while ey have had the effect of increasing the safeguards thrown around depositors, they have not convinced the lawtors, they have not convinced the law-makers that taking deposits is a thing which should be forbidden. 

FUNERAL OF MR. PREFONTAINE. Naval and Military Display at Halifax and Montreal.

Ottawa, Jan. 15.—The funeral of the late Raymond Prefontaine will be in charge of the Canadian navy. The Dominion is expected to arrive at Halifax on the 22nd. A naval salute of one-minute guns will be fired from the Dominion from the time the body leaves the ship until it reaches the wharf. Seventeen one-minute guns will be fired from the Canada will also join in firing a salute. Twenty men from the Canada will take charge of the remains at Halifax, and will remain in charge until the body is interred at Montreal.

There will be 100 men from the military at Halifax, and one hundred at Montreal. The two officers and 20 sail-ors from the Canada will haul the body on a gun carriage from the Dominion to the special train at Halifax, and will do the same thing at Montreal.

A guard of honor will meet the body at Montreal. There coffin will be transferred to the hearse, and conveyed to the city hall. En route men of the naval escort will walk on each side of the hearse. As soon as the city hall is reached the guard will be mounted and maintained while the body is lying in state.




