THE ISSUE GROWS PLAINER

The school question is becoming more and more of an open issue. In Quebec the candidates of both the parties are being pledged for Remedial Legislation in Ontario the bulk of the candidates of both parties will be pledged against it; and as a Winnipeg paper said last night, if the candidates from Manitoba, no matter of which party, are not pledged against it, it will be nothing short of a degradation of that province.

The Government is pledged to the measure, but no government can carry it through Parliament if Ontario, a Manitoba and Quebec are against it. And the safety of the Conservative party lies in this one fact, that notwithstanding the wishes of the Government, the Conservative electors in Ontario, Manitoba, the Territories and British Columbia, will instruct their members to oppose any and all Remedial Bills.

In the meantime the renegade Mail, the paper that spent seven years in attacking Quebec, is now assisting that province in placing a coercion bill over the necks of the people of the Northwest in regard to things educational. Mr. Coatsworth has a hard enough row to hoe in East Toronto on his own account; with The Mail, as his chief supporter, he finds the strain doubly hard. What Mr. Coatsworth ever did to have this undesirable support thrust upon him is one of those things no fellow can ever find out.

TORONTO AND GREAT RAILWAY FARES

We notice the people of Cobourg have petitioned the Grand Trunk Railway to inaugurate a system of cheap fares on Saturday to enable them to come to Toronto for the purpose of shopping. Not only the people of Cobourg, but the inhabitants of every town and village within a radius of 100 miles of this city should enjoy this privilege. Fortunately for Toronto, the city has communication by water with the western districts lying east of the western end of Lake Ontario. During the summer season our merchants do an extensive business with the residents of the Niagara peninsula, of Hamilton, Oakville and other near-by lake towns. We have daily communication by boat with all these points. The cheap fares that prevail by water have the effect of bringing thousands of people to Toronto who otherwise would not visit us. During the season of navigation Toronto profits to a very large extent from the inhabitants of the near-by cities, towns and villages. If we had to depend on the railways altogether, the large business that Toronto merchants do with these people would be secured. Not only should the merchants of Ontario be able to reach Toronto by water have the privilege of coming here to do their shopping, but every inland town should enjoy the same advantage. The railways should be induced to adopt the same plan that the Grand Trunk has adopted at least on one day in the week. The railways themselves would profit by the increased travel. The merchants of Toronto would certainly benefit largely by the change, while the people of the towns would have the privilege of reaching Toronto's superb shopping facilities. By all means let the Board of Trade take up this matter and urge its importance upon the Grand Trunk and the C.P.R.

THE STRIKE A MISTAKE

The strike of the builders' laborers appears to have been an ill-considered action. When the fifty-cent-hour law was passed by the City Council it was thought that that rate of wages was in excess of its intrinsic commercial value. The laborers who struck a short time ago were receiving eight cents an hour, and the demand they made was for twenty-one cents. A great many mechanics and skilled laborers are, we understand, working for less than eighteen cents an hour at the present time. Under these circumstances it is certainly a mistake for the laborers to demand twenty-one cents. The employers have had no difficulty in filling the places of the strikers. The latter have gained nothing by their hasty action. On the contrary, most of them now find themselves without employment and they will probably get little to do this summer, whereas if they had stuck to their work they would have been receiving decent wages and been sure of it for the season. Workmen are not able to benefit their condition by demanding high wages at a time when work is scarce. It would be better policy on their part to encourage better operations during this dull season by agreeing to accept lower wages, and certainly it is better for a man to be employed at a moderate rate of wages than to go without work altogether.

In the event of the present Government of Sir Charles Tupper for any other Conservative government, Remedial legislation a part of their Parliamentary policy, will you oppose such Government and continuously seek to have such Government removed from office so long as Remedial legislation remains a part of their policy?

My answer to the foregoing question is: I shall, if elected, oppose all efforts of any government to coerce the province of Manitoba by Remedial legislation on the school question, no matter what the result; but I shall not on that account withdraw my support from the general policy of any government of which I approve.

WHAT THE NORTHWEST WANTS

Preferential Trade With England Would Make Our Great West Producing Best Business Like a Race

Montreal, May 18.—(Special)—"I feel satisfied that the Dominion of Canada possesses two-thirds of the wheat-producing area of the North American continent, and if the statement of the country will give us preferential trade with England, the Northwest will blossom like the rose. We should set the ball rolling by offering to lower our tariff at least ten per cent. in favor of the Mother Country."

The above was observed by the World yesterday by Mr. Robert Melgen, president of the Lake of the Woods Milling Co., who returned from Winnipeg, gave his opinion as to the state of things in the prairie country.

"I have perfect confidence in the country," continued Mr. Melgen, "and we want it more people. He reports that the season is somewhat backward, and that the area which is being put under wheat will be about 20 per cent. less than last year."

"When will seeding be done?" the correspondent asked. "About 80 per cent. of the seed wheat was in on the 15th, and I expect the whole will be accomplished by the Queen's Birthday."

Proceeding, Mr. Melgen said that things in Manitoba were generally better than in the other provinces, but he believed, were in a prosperous condition, and it is understood that the reduction of their liabilities had been very marked during the past year.

He visited the different points where the company's elevators are located, and stated that the latter's capacity would be increased according to the requirements of the crop. "Our Keewatin mill," he added, "is now running the full 24 hours; this mill having a larger productive capacity than any other mill in the province, and is now producing 2500 barrels per day, and using 11,000 bushels of wheat every 24 hours."

Mr. Melgen would not discuss politics, but the satisfied look on his face indicated that the Government would make a successful fight in Manitoba and the Northwest.

NEW TRIAL FOR BRENNAN
