BARNETT IN TROUBLE AGAIN

The Charge Was Wrongful Appropriation of Funds.

NOTE GIVEN AS COLLATERAL

And Roland Gideon Israel Took the Proceeds for His Own Use.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Roland Gideon Israel Barnett, who served a seven years' sentence at Kingston for alleged frauds in connection with the Central Bank failure in Toronto, is again in a very bad way. Some weeks ago Barnett created a sensation by claiming to be the brother of the late Barney Barnett, who committed suicide on the way home from South Africa, and Mr. James Crankshaw was sent home to investigate the claim. The lawyer returned, however, and reported that Roland Gideon's pretension was a false one. Soon after he was arrested, charged by the Grand Jury with the misappropriation of the proceeds of a note for \$750. It appears that this note was given as collateral security, and the accused appropriated it to his own use.

The Court of Queen's Bench has been opened to-day and a true bill found against Barnett, his trial was at 10 o'clock, and he was returned to jail. He was proceeded with. There was very little defence to offer and the jury, after being out for a very short time, brought in a verdict of guilty. It now remains to be seen if Barnett's past record will be invoked against him in this instance.

News from the Nova Scotia Coal Trade—Mr. Henry Budden, President of the Intercolonial Coal Company of Pictou, N.S., who has returned from a visit to the mines, states that there has been a great revival in the coal trade of that province since the late summer. The Intercolonial is now shipping 1000 tons a day. From 400 to 500 tons were being shipped at work for four months, but one day being lost. It is expected that there will be a dropping of output in the winter, but even then Mr. Budden expects that the output will reach 600 tons a day. He declared that the Nova Scotia coal companies are feeling the effects of the revival in general business.

The Dismissal to La Canadiane.—Messrs. Gonin, Lemieux & Decarie have been retained by Mr. Robert Lindsay, the charterer of La Canadiane, damaged by the United States steamship Yantic. Mr. Rogitelle Lemieux, of the firm of Gonin, Lemieux & Decarie, stated this morning that he had communicated with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and had proposed securing Mr. Lindsay from any loss which he may have sustained, and that he would be glad to discuss the case as that of a British subject having suffered loss at the hands of the Canadian power, and to join the claim of the Government, the owners of La Canadiane.
