CANADIAN WOMAN WIDOWED. THE DEATH OF PRINCE ALFRED

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 7.—The wife of Rev. Peter Rihart has reached Tachelulu, in the Province of Szechuan, China, having escaped from Tibet, where her husband was murdered, and where her only child died of exposure. Mr. Rihart was a native of Holland. He spent some years in Toronto previous to going to China, as an independent missionary in 1881. In 1884, while on a visit to America, he married Miss Jennie Carson of Newberry, who had previously practiced medicine there for seven years. In company with Mr. Ferguson of Knox College, Toronto, the three again started for China as independent missionaries. Mr. and Mrs. Rihart went to Tibet, where, after many exciting experiences, the former was killed.

Radial Railways Will Run if the City Engineer Gets His Own Way.

The G. P. R. HITS THE CITY HARD.

Big Money Wanted for the Queen-Street Wharf—Chain Ferry Scheme is Killed by Them.

The Radial Railway city committee waited upon Manager Keating at noon yesterday. They were surprised at the very outset to hear the query, "What is this all about, anyway?" After Aid. Hallam had surveyed the carved and brazen words of the board room, and had mused "this is what we stand for," Chairman Saunders lightened the manager's apparent awkwardness. Contrary to custom and the past, Mr. Keating was treated with every deference, even with manifestations of obeisance, by the city representatives.

The chairman explained that the delegation came to ask mainly to ask what accommodation the company would require for the new market. But their chief mission was to learn what the company intended to do in the way of extending radial roads out into the country. He said it would not be advisable to go on with the new market until the company had decided upon a proposed road, and what the terms would be.

An Appeal to Peel. Mr. Keating told them he had been making inquiries as to the feasibility of the proposed routes surveyed to Highland Creek, as well as east to Ottawa and west to Woodcock. He had been eminently satisfied with the result, and although he was not in a position to commit the company to carrying out the extensions, yet he felt personally they would be in their interests to have them done. He could not say as yet just what amount of produce could be carried, yet he was satisfied the road would pay for itself. "I assure you," he concluded, "that the project is well supported, and I will advocate it before the Board of Council."

Further, he stated that there were no serious difficulties in the way of extension east or west, other than two of extension east to the Bobcock River. To cross it he had to get the consent of the former city council, and the clerk of the latter had not answered his letter.

Ald. Saunders preferred the services of his committee to help get consent, but Mr. Keating, who was present, had no objection.

The Local Express System. The manager, while agreeing to having a room in the market, seemed to see little in view of the fact that it was all under cover. He promised Aid. Hubbard's earnest consideration of the idea of establishing from Toronto stores, could be carried out by the city.

President Donaldson also expressed his interest in the matter, and he thought the system for the free delivery of the city express was a part of the plan. The franchise would be given to the city, and the company would have to build the lines.
