



The Difficulties of Travel, Owing to the Prevalence of the Epidemic Disease.

A visitor from a distance, who is registered at the Walker House, is George Adams of "The Albany Banner," Albany, N.S.W., Australia.

Mr. Adams consented to see a World man last night and told an interesting story of the quarantine difficulties which were encountered since leaving Sydney on Friday, April 11. The Alameda, on which he took passage, intended to touch at all ports, but as the harbor quarantine was so strict, the east they found themselves regarded as an unwelcome visitor. Before leaving Sydney the much greater was furnished with sulphur, which precaution was thought to be sufficient to escape detention at San Francisco.

Scene in New Zealand.


