TECHNICAL SCHOOL WAGES

Management Committee Made a Wholesale Recommendation For Increases of Salaries.

LAST MEETING OF THE OLD BOARD

Was Held in the New Building. A.D. Ferguson Objected to Secretary's Salary.

The last meeting of the old Technical School Board was held in the new building last night. The School Management Committee's report made the following recommendations:

That the secretary of the board take up his quarters in the new building, have full charge of the building and employ excess of the teaching staff, and that his salary be \$300 per year.

That John Dwyer be appointed janitor and George Bradley engineer, their salaries to be \$200 and \$170 per year respectively.

Increases Recommended. That the board recommend the incoming one to adopt the following recommendations of the principal that the salaries of Messrs. McLaughlin, McCulloch, McCulloch, Currie, Dr. O'Connor and Young be increased from \$200 to \$250, from \$150 to \$200, from \$100 to \$150, from \$100 to \$150, from \$100 to \$150, from \$100 to \$150.

Ald. Ferguson did not approve of the recommendation to increase the secretary's salary, or to allow him to have full charge of the building. He thought that the \$400 increase would in future deprive his whole time to the school.

There was considerable discussion over the clause recommending the new board to grant the increase in the teachers' salaries, and on motion it was decided to send the principal's report to the board for its consideration.

THE HULL MAIL BAG STOLEN.

Some One "Lifted" it While the Driver Stopped at Pooley's Bridge Postoffice.

Containing Jan. 17.—One of the mail bags containing the Hull mail was stolen from the mail stage, Wellington-street, last night. The driver, Mr. Pooley, left Hull with the 6.40 mail, which consisted of two bags, one being taken from the driver's mail, and the other locked, containing the Hull mail.

The latter mail was an unusually large one, and the contents were registered letters, held a large correspondence from the banks, the E. B. Eddy Company, the George Matthews Company and other firms.

Walls on his way to the general post office, Ottawa, he called at the small postoffice at Pooley's Bridge, after which he went directly to the general post office. He found one bag missing from the stage. He immediately drove back to Hull, and was escorted by the postmaster that he had received two bags of mail matter for delivery. The loss of the letters will inconvenience the merchants who had written to inquire whether the letters in the bag actually contained any money.
