THE FOR CANADA'S DEFENCE

TRINITY MEDICAL STUDENT Removed From His Boarding House on Gerrard-Street to Isolation Hospital.

REPORTED TO HAVE SMALLPOX Authorities of Interested College Give Instructions for Immediate Compulsory Vaccination.

Ottawa, April 10.—Minister of Militia Borden outlined in the House this afternoon an important scheme of military reform. Many of the proposed improvements are on the lines of the suggestions made in the report of Maj.-General O'Grady-Hally, who sat in the Speakers gallery during the discussion, evidently enjoying the bouquets which came to him from the minister and the leading speakers on the Opposition side.

Increase of the militia to 100,000 men, the establishment of a rifle factory and the increase of staff and militia officers, with a higher standard of military education, are some of the projects which the Minister of Militia is bent on carrying out.

It was when the House went into committee and the militia estimates were taken up, and after Lieutenant-Colonel Tisdale had spoken upon the Canadian militia, its composition and requirements, that Dr. Borden announced his military reform program.

Live Up to Responsibilities.

He began by saying that the great gifts which this country enjoys carry with them their responsibilities, and we should be unworthy of our grand resources if we were not prepared to defend them. He believed that in our times of prosperity this country should devote some of its revenue to the matter of defence. As to the report of the Major-General, he agreed in the main with every suggestion it contained. The General had been given a free hand in making suggestions in regard to the militia as a professional soldier. Under the present law, the permanent force is limited to 10,000 men, and he himself thought it a wise proposal. He would not, however, this year ask for the necessary amendment to the Militia Act, but next session he would introduce a bill for that purpose and would have it submitted in advance to members who cared to offer suggestions upon it.

Longer Camps.

He was afraid it would not be possible to get men away from their occupations for 21 days every year. But it might be practicable once in three years to give the men a longer period of drill than twelve days.

He was quite in accord with the Major-General's proposal to form a body of reserves. At this moment, he said, the suggestion is being carried out, and it would be a good thing to have the extra men, sufficient of whom would be raised to increase the present force of 35,000 up to 100,000, and this would be done by bringing them into the rifle clubs, for which provision was made last session.

The force would thus consist of men who have experience in the art of rifle shooting. In order to give the militia vote and for utilizing the rifles as reserves. Dr. Borden said he was taking the year taking the rifle for musketry, clothing and stores all under the head of "annual drill."

He proposed in the future to take advantage of a discovery that had recently been made, a wood form of carrying the rifle ranges in which practice could be had at reduced distances without resorting to extensive and expensive rifle ranges. What was to be taken on as a recruit in the active militia unit he had been tried with the rifle to see that as far as reasonable probability of his becoming a practical soldier.

This would bring a grand class of men and exclude the useless men who he was sorry to say, were already a considerable part of the militia attending annual camps.

Another Arsenal.

The Major-General proposed another arsenal. Undoubtedly the day is near at hand, Dr. Borden said, when we should have at least one more arsenal in this country as a central part of Canada. But as to the present, he would say that the course of the year the output of ammunition from the present arsenal at Quebec would be increased two millions to six or seven million rounds. In order to give the arsenal working full time, what was really needed now, more than additional arsenals, were two or three additional arsenals. He would say that as this ammunition was turned out at Quebec it could be moved west. As the quantity of ammunition now on hand and where it is stored, as he had stated last year to the late Mr. Clarke Walker, it was not wise to make such private information public, but he would give it to any member who desired it. He would say there was a considerable quantity in Toronto, Kingston and London.

TRAMPS STOLE A FREIGHT ENGLISH PAPER ANNOUNCES BOER LEADERS ACCEPT BRITISH TERMS.

At the Point of a Revolver, Took Possession of One Coming to Hamilton.

Hamilton, April 10.—The necessity for arming the Hamilton policemen became more patent in connection with an incident that happened late this afternoon.

The local operator of the T. H. & R. Co. received a telegram from Smithville that three tramps at the point of a revolver took possession of a freight train coming to Hamilton. Word was sent to police headquarters, and Constable Barron and Officers Lenz and McDonald, who were appointed the other day, were sent to the depot. The trio and some railroad hands boarded an engine and were run out about a mile.

The freight was flagged, but the tramps jumped about a hundred yards from the stopping place. They ran across fields, the officers in hot pursuit. One of them disappeared suddenly, but the other two were followed to a point near the Jockey Club, where they, too, disappeared. If the police had been armed things would have been different. J. Field was the name of the conductor. Pistols were put to his head and the tramps, when they were ordered off at Smithville.

PULP ON THE PACIFIC. Chicago Capitalists Will Build a \$750,000 Plant.

Vancouver, B.C., April 10.—Chicago capitalists will erect a \$750,000 pulp plant on Prince of Wales Island, near Queen Charlotte Sound, for the manufacture of pulp for the Orient.

The island is a square mile in area and thickly wooded with spruce. The Chicago capitalists purchased the island from the British Columbia government, who secured it without cost from the Provincial government. The government is to receive \$100,000 for the land, which will be taken up in three or four months they could be disposed of to American manufacturers.

The project is a year ago, and the only revenue exacted by the government is an annual tax of one cent an acre and 25 cents a cord for the wood cut.

ARSENIC BOUNTY OF \$150,000. Government Will Extend It Over a Period of Seven Years.

Ottawa, April 10.—The government has decided to grant a bounty of \$150,000 to the producer of arsenic mined in Hastings, this amount to be spread over a period of seven years, at a certain amount per ton. The grant is conditional, however, upon a bounty of \$50,000 to the government of \$100,000. The Ontario grant promised is \$50,000, but the promoters of the industry are confident that Premier Ross will double the amount.

SUPPRESS THE LEAGUE. Report That British Government Will Be Firm With Ireland.

Belfast, April 10.—The Evening Telegraph of this city says it believes Lord Londonderry, at a meeting of the Conservative Association of Belfast to-morrow, will announce that the government decided at Monday's cabinet meeting on a firmer policy in Ireland, including the suppression of the United Irish League.

RIOTS IN BRUSSELS. Thirty Persons Hurt, Including Women and Children.

Brussels, April 10.—A general strike is expected on Tuesday. Socialists tonight paraded the streets, smashing windows, firing revolvers and singing revolutionary songs. Thirty persons, including women and children, were injured. Over a hundred shots were fired on both sides.

SOLD 17,000 REVOLVERS. London, April 11.—The Brussels correspondent of The Daily Mail says in a despatch that the reservists, who were called out in consequence of the riots, arrived there yesterday singing revolutionary airs. One Antwerp firm alone, continuing the correspondent, sold 17,000 revolvers to the Socialists.

FORMER WOODSTOCK MAN FOR SPECIAL REFERENCE SCHEDULE OF THE LEAGUE

Detained Pending Investigation Into Female Music Pupil's Death at Detroit.

Detroit, April 11.—Prof. Joseph M. Miller, music teacher formerly of Woodstock, Ont., whose parents now reside, was arrested to-day in connection with one of the most brutal murders of recent years, which occurred on Thirtieth-street between Antoinette and McGraw streets, before midnight last night. Carrie M. Jensen, of 110 Wabash-street, daughter of James R. Jenette, a cabinet-maker, the victim of the tragedy, was a pupil of Miller. Blood was found on the professor's clothing, and when an explanation of it was asked Miller fainting. He was revived, but fainted again when being taken to the cell.

Her Throat Was Cut.

Miss Jensen was stabbed and pounded to death. Her throat was cut from ear to ear, a knife was thrust into her brain behind the ear and a dent in her forehead showed that she had been clubbed. Henry Jewell, a resident of the neighborhood, heard cries and screams, and looking out saw a man running in the direction of a falling her and running a short distance, Jewell says the assailant turned and renewed his attack on her as she lay prostrate. Jewell notified the police.

After listening to the story of the murder, which kept company with Miss Jensen, the detective thought it well to keep him under surveillance, and accordingly detained him pending further investigation.

BLOOD-STAINED HATCHET FOUND Young Woman Was Found to Death and Had Her Throat Cut By Murderer.

To-night a bloodstained hatchet was found by the police in the kitchen of a house in Miller's kitchen. A towel was found in the kitchen also with blood on it, and it is supposed to be blood stains on it.

The Miller declares that he did not leave the house until 11 o'clock, several persons who were there say he left between 10 and 10:20 o'clock. The murder was committed five minutes after 11 o'clock, as near as the officers can learn.

To-night Miller is sleeping like a child in his bed, and he says he knows nothing of the murder. The blade and handle of the hatchet had been washed, but there were yet stains on the claw-hammer end of it and on the handle close to the hatchet proper. The hatchet was shown to Miller this evening, but he made no comment on it.

TALMAGE GROWS WORSE. Evidences of Cerebral Inflammation Have Now Appeared.

Washington, April 10.—A change for the worse has again occurred in the condition of Rev. T. De Witt Talmage, the physicians are again very apprehensive of his recovery. To-night's bulletin issued at 9 o'clock said: "There has been a marked change for the worse in Dr. Talmage's condition. Evidences of cerebral inflammation have appeared." (Signed) G. L. Marquand, A. Fever complications have developed, which the physicians believe that recovery is entirely improbable.

TO ABANDON FREE TRADE. Import Duty on Grain and Flour to Be Imposed.

London, April 11.—Persistent rumors are current here that the forthcoming budget proposals will include an import duty of 3 pence per hundred weight on grain and 6 pence per hundred weight on flour.

EXPORTERS HAVE NO COMBINE. Montreal, April 10.—Montreal live stock exporters do not appear to be greatly impressed by the sensational stories which have been current, to the effect that the exporters of the United States had combined to force up the price of meat in England by curtailing the shipments. Mr. D. Munroe, a local exporter this morning said: "There is no combine existing for such a purpose either in the United States or in Canada. Any one can get to Chicago market and buy there at market prices and ship to the other side."

LOWER ST. LAWRENCE SHIPPING. Montreal, April 10.—Yes, the government has now made arrangements to have an 800-foot wharf completed at Father Point, and this will result in enormous advantages to shipping in the lower St. Lawrence. Such was the statement made by J. S. Williams of Father Point.

BOTH BLAME AND PRAISE. Trades Council Pleased With In- crease in Civic Wage Rate.

The Municipal Committee in their report to the Trades and Labor Council last night, took the City Council to task for granting \$500 to the Horse Show. The City Council was, however, complimented in the next clause of the report for increasing the wages of civic laborers.

In the report of the Legislation Committee it was noted that Mr. Latchford, Minister of Public Works, had stated that only union painters would hereafter be engaged on government jobs. LOWERED INTO THE ROCK Ceel Rhodes Now Sleeps on the Top of the Matoppo Hills.

The British Empire League met in St. George's Hall last night and passed a number of resolutions in favor of closer relationship with the Mother Country.

Dr. Parkin, president of Upper Canada College, occupied the chair, and the audience was not quite as large as it would have been but for several counter attractions. The importance of the meeting, however, was not to be judged by its size, according to Dr. Parkin in his opening remarks, but rather on the merits of the questions discussed, and the earnestness of purpose with which they were promulgated. The purpose of their meeting was to deliberate upon one of the most important questions which could interest any country, chiefly because it touched upon a turning point in our national existence. England was to face with one of the greatest dangers she ever met and in her position she found herself isolated and met with a distinct hostility which threatened her national strength. She had passed through a great struggle, which showed her history among the nations of the world in the evolution of our national history. We had come practically to the parting of the ways, when we had to go either with the empire or not. It would perhaps be said that the question would well be left open for consideration. FUNERAL PROCESSION OF FIVE MILES Buluwayo, Matabeland, April 10.—To- a new trial is granted the defendants day, amid an immense throng of soldiers, civilians and natives, the body of Ceel Rhodes was committed to its rock tomb in the Matoppo Hills.

The coffin was shrouded in a Union Jack, and the wreath sent by Queen Alexandra was laid upon it as it was lowered into the grave.

Five Miles Long.

The funeral party started from Fuller's Hotel early this morning. The procession was five miles long as it wound thru the hills and gorges. Every sort of conveyance was made use of; some were on foot, others were on horseback or on bicycles, while still others were in wagons and carriages.

When the procession was a mile from the grave everybody dismounted and concluded the journey on foot. Twelve oxen hauled the coffin to the almost inaccessible summit of the kopje, where the Chiefs Shombi, Fakusani and Singula and two thousand natives had assembled to witness the Christian burial rites, which afterwards supplemented in their own fashion, by the sacrifice of 15 oxen to the shade of the great dead chief.

IMPRESSIVE INTERMENT. Thousands of Whites Congregated around the wind-swept hill. The grave was encircled by six bound- aries, the interment was extremely im- pressive. The "dead march" re-echoed thru the hills, and the natives stood in the shade of the great dead chief.

Lord Roberts over twenty years ago had made up his mind that, if he was to rise to his highest, and do the best that was in him, it was necessary for him to lead the abstemious life.

PROHIBITION IN KENT.

Ridgeway, April 10.—About fifty delegates from all parts of Kent attended the temperance convention here to-day, which was called at 2 p.m. After two hours' talking, and as it was nearing train time and some delegates had left, a resolution that a prohibition candidate be placed in the field was voted on. The resolution was voted down by 16 to 22.

AGAIN BEATTY IN LEEDS.

Leeds, April 10.—A Conservative convention for South Leeds was held to-day to select a candidate to represent the riding in the Ontario legislature. Walter Beatty of Leeds, the present member, Dr. Frank M.L.A., of Newboro, and W. B. Carroll, barrister of Gannorque, were put in nomination. Dr. Beatty was elected by 146 to Beatty, 95 for Preston, 74 for Carroll.

N. WENTWORTH PROHIBITIONISTS.

Dundas, April 10.—The prohibitionists of North Wentworth met to-day and organized with Rev. A. H. McDonald as president. The executive committee was organized at the view of the candidates for the legislature and report in the evening a public meeting was addressed by John A. Nicholls, Rev. A. T. Moore and Rev. T. J. Wilkins.

WELLINGTON PROHIBITIONISTS.

Drayton, April 10.—The prohibitionists of East and West Wellington met to-day. It was agreed to prepare to vote for the referendum by organizing every municipality. A resolution passed that we cannot too strongly

stood to have under consideration some kind of air line between Toronto and Montreal, leaving either from Napanea or Kingston straight to Ottawa, giving Western Ontario the benefit of a second direct route to the Capital, and making connection with all express trains now running between Toronto and Montreal.

This province needs both these services in connection with the Capital. One reason why Ontario is not so influential as she ought to be at Ottawa is largely because of the inconvenience of travelling between Toronto and Ottawa. It is always a journey of eight or nine hours, and taking two days or two nights, and one day at least. Montreal, on the contrary, was only till a short time ago within two hours of the Capital. Now the time has been lengthened somewhat, but there is no reason why the two-hour service should not be resumed. Toronto should certainly have a five-hour service between here and the Capital, and a person should be able to leave here at 7 in the morning, be in Ottawa by noon, spend seven or eight hours there on business and be back here about midnight; and contravise, the people of Ottawa should be able to do the same thing as regards Toronto.

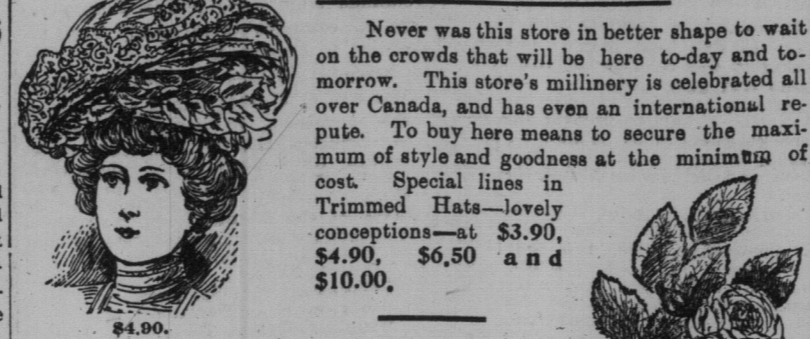
