HOW TWELVE OF TORONTO'S FIREMEN HAVE MET DEATH

Comrades in the Department Will Observe To-morrow as Memorial Day.

The Toronto fire department will observe tomorrow as memorial day, and for the first time will decorate the graves of a dozen of their comrades who have fallen in the active discharge of their duty. At 2:30 hose wagon No. 5, of which company three of the five firemen who were killed a year ago were members, will leave Lombard street station, accompanied by Foreman W. J. Smith, W. J. Swift, George Ford and James McNeil and Firemen Frank Milligan, J. Taggart and S. Johnston, as a committee, and proceed to the Necropolis, St. James cemetery, St. Michael's cemetery and Mount Pleasant and place flowers on the graves of the late Chief Ardagh, Chief Fireman Albert, Everett, Bowery, Bravman, Deacon, Nolan, Clark, See, Kerr, Russell and Colliard.

Albert Gilbert was killed July 18, 1884, by the collapse of the roof of a burning stable at Parliament and Sydney streets, when several firemen had narrow escapes. Thomas Everett was killed by falling down an elevator shaft on April 24, 1880, at a fire in Pease's spice mill at Yonge and Alexander streets. Robert Bowery met instant death by the falling of the walls at the Globe fire, Jan. 6, 1880, and Chief Fireman Everett died three weeks later from injuries received at the same fire. John Bertrand was killed on Sunday, Dec. 13, 1886, by falling beneath the wheels of his engine while on the way to a small fire.

Thomas Deacon met death under a falling wall at the fire in the Hees factory on Davenport road in November, 1888. Dennis Nolan died June 8, 1902, from injuries received at a fire some weeks previous on Linden street. The other five, as will long be remembered, were crushed to death at the McIntosh fire on Thursday, July 10, last year.

WORK POINTS AND SUBURBS

No Mangle in Mexican Horses at the Toronto Junction Stock Yards.

ALL PASS GOVERNMENT INSPECTION

The Ponies Bring Fair Prices and Create an Exciting Time.

Toronto Junction, July 8.—There was an exciting time at the Union Stock Yards this morning, when the sale of Mexican horses commenced. These were buyers from all parts of the county and city, and fair prices were realized. Between three and four hundred people were present on the day, and at times only a narrow alleyway between the fences of the alleys into which the horses were turned. The fact that W. J. Cunningham, V.S., the local Dominion government officer, had examined the horses on Monday, and had pronounced that about 150 out of the 200 were suffering with mange, made buyers look a little askance early in the morning, but an assurance from Herbert Smith that such was not the case, led the buyers to look at the animals for themselves. They were not a bad looking lot of horses. Some of them were underzested and most of them were pretty well. They created lots of amusement all day, and when the time came for taking them home the buyers had lots of fun. Some had scraped a little hair of manginess. Others had been bitten by other horses, which made small scars on their backs. All had been 12 and 14 months old, and had been brought from a railway accident, in which they got scattered, and were being taken to the yards. Ever since their arrival on Canadian soil they have been under the special inspection of a government inspector, and had there been any disease he would have discovered it. Bidding was brisk, and prices ranged from \$16 to \$60 for good specimens. Mr. Peterson bought a nice team of greys for \$125. Mr. Hill got a pair of blacks for \$110 and another team was sold for \$82.50.

The editor of the Newmarket Express bought a little horse for less than a quarter of a hundred, and a committee of members of the Toronto Firemen's Association, who were present for the sale, were very much interested in the sale. About one-half of them were drawn out, the horse being sold for \$26. The balance will be sold in the morning, commencing at 10 o'clock, when it is quite likely that the horse will be sold for \$100. Lunch was served to the party of buyers at the stock yards, and the sale was a success.

An Italian, who purchased a broncho at the sale today, put a rope around its neck and then set the rope around its head. The slip-knot tightened on the broncho's neck and it died. The Italian ran to untie the knot, but the broncho kicked. He tried to tie the knot, and the poor beast died before his eyes.

The board will meet tomorrow night to deal with the report.

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CHARACTERISTICS OF LIFE OF POPE LEO XIII.

Unique in Habits, He Was for 25 Years Confined to Vatican Surroundings.

The Philadelphia North American says: There was no personality in the world during his reign, and no sovereign possessor of the Catholic Church that aroused more interest or commanded more sympathy than Pope Leo XIII.

In very many respects he was unique in his habits and surroundings. He lived in the largest palace in the world; his everyday life had for 25 years been confined to the Vatican, and he was the only sovereign without possessions wielding an immense power over millions.

And the man himself, a shrunken, small person, one would say, as a young man he was above the average in stature, with deep, penetrating eyes, a heavy brow and an asceticism such as was the last occupant of the chair of St. Peter.

Never Left the Vatican. Pope Leo XIII. passed the most of his life within the walls of the Vatican in the Vatican, the official residence of the pope. In fact, it used to be said that he never left the Vatican for fear of being seized by the Roman police. It is, however, a mistake to suppose that he was ever confined to the Vatican. He was free to go out for a walk in a closed carriage. A few years ago, when his brother was pope, he was seen in a garden in the Vatican, and he was seen to walk in the streets by night in a closed carriage.
