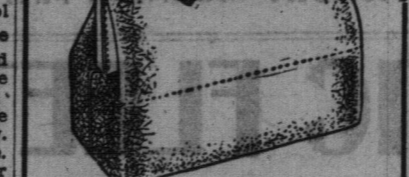

in the great towns is to teach science

as it has never been taught before and

also to proceed in the work of scientific

research. Mr. Chamberlain is of the

NEW YORK BEHIND THE TIMES SAYS DALRYMPLE OF GLASGOW

Men Who Is to Advise Chicago On Public Ownership and His First Impressions of American Enterprise.

New York, May 28.—James Dalrymple, general manager of the street railway lines of Glasgow, all of which are owned and operated by the city, said last night after a hurried inspection of the transportation facilities in New York City, that the city of Glasgow was behind the times.

"Central Park, which is owned and managed by the city, seems to me to be the best conducted of any of your public institutions," he said. "Why not place your transportation lines on the same basis? What we have accomplished in Glasgow in carrying passengers at a profit for less than a 2-cent fare proves that the end would justify the means."

Mr. Dalrymple reached New York yesterday morning on the Cunard Company's liner, the *Campania*, for Chicago, where he will give Mayor Dunne, who was recently elected on a platform of municipal ownership, the benefit of his experience in municipally owned and operated street railways. The Municipal Ownership League of Greater New York, with Mayor Dunne's permission, will give Mr. Dalrymple some weeks ago with a view of having the best of Chicago's transportation facilities in his way to receive a little of New York hospitality.

Met Down the Bay. By special permission from Washington representatives of the Municipal Ownership League, Mayor Dunne's special representative, met the *Campania* down the bay and accompanied the party to the Hoffman House. An automobile tour of the city was then taken.

Mr. Dalrymple was both surprised and pleased at the amount of public discussion of street railways in New York. He is a typical Scotchman, sturdy and rugged, and has a frankness that adds force to all that he says.

"The city of Glasgow owns the roads, collects the fares, and pays the wages and allows shorter hours of labor than private owners," he said. "Besides this, the roads pay the interest, and provide a sinking fund for indebtedness, and contribute to the public treasury more than \$1,000,000 annually. We give employment to 4500 men."

Asked as to what he attributed the success of the municipally owned street railways of Glasgow, Mr. Dalrymple replied: "To the simple and easily understood fact that the management of the roads is not taken over by a self-constituted inspector," he continued. "It is not a matter of learning to any defects in the service. In addition the employees work with a better will and are more efficient."

"The Glasgow lines cover an area of 100 square miles, and are paid by the passengers depends entirely on the distance they ride. The most recent figures show that one-third of the passengers pay but one cent, and that two-thirds pay two cents."

"The residents and business people of Glasgow have been very kind in their willingness to carry the Unionist party to a general election on a heated appeal for colonial preference, fortified by the fact that they have been in charge of the empire, and hence this week's unprecedented outburst of anger in the house of commons."

Mr. Dalrymple was greatly interested in what he saw of the city during the trip, on which he was accompanied by Mayor Dunne, James O'Shaughnessy and members of the local municipal ownership party. He was particularly struck by the fact that the surface cars looked dirty and poorly kept. He asked if it was possible that the city would stop here and have a few of the sky-scrapers, thinking that when a building went above ten stories in Glasgow it was a great curiosity.

Coaches Recalled London. As one of the antiquated Fifth-avenue coaches passed he remarked that they were a relic of the past. He recalled his arrival that reminded him of London. He requested that Mr. Rockefeller be invited to the city, and many inquiries concerning the millionaires' residences of the thoroughfare.

Prohman Gets New Piece Play. The first will be a modern society drama, and will be produced over here by George Alexander in January. Mr. Prohman will visit it in the spring. The other will be a comedy along the lines of "Trollop" and "Wells," which was so popular in America.

Busy European Railroads. Italian railroads are busy. The Adriatic Railway Company will expend \$3,250,000 for new locomotives (thirty-two) and passenger and freight cars. The Mediterranean Railway Company will expend \$2,600,000 for twenty locomotives and 200 passenger cars, and the Sicilian Railway \$550,000 for 450 cold storage cars.

Famous Regiment Disappears. Army reform in India has caused the disappearance of two historic regiments—the Sixty-fifth Carnatic Light Infantry, which was raised in 1753, and the Bombay Marine Battalion, dating from 1777.

Famous Industry Lost. Twenty years ago Watertown, Conn., was known widely because of the splendid cattle raised within its limits, but now few farmers raise cattle, and the quality is not up to the old standards.

Polished Sacramental Wine. The parish priest of Carpiolo, Italy, dropped dead in church after drinking the sacramental wine during the celebration of mass. The wine was found to be mixed with strychnine.

South American Cardinal. At the next consistory the Pope will make Braga, bishop of Petropolis, a cardinal, in accordance with Brasilia's special request. Braga will be the first South American cardinal.

Continual Snow in Tropics. Snow, even in the tropics, never melts but remains continuously all the year round above the height of 16,000 feet; in colder climes the "snow line" is much lower than this.

\$1,000,000 IN SEAL SKINS BUCCANEERING EXPEDITION UNDER STARS AND STRIPES TO LOOT RICH STOREHOUSE OFF SIBERIA.

San Francisco, May 27.—While the battles of the present war are being fought and won in the full limelight of the spotlights, the Russian Commercial Comrades are busy in the shadows of the night, and another little war is in full swing that has heretofore attracted no publicity. It is a sort of side show to the larger event.

The cause of this smaller war, which nevertheless bids fair to be bloody, is the Commandorski Islands, off the coast of Siberia. These skins are the property of the Russian Commercial Comrades. Before the war began there never had been such an accumulation of skins at the seal rookery at any one time.

There had been no difficulty in transportation. But with the outbreak of hostilities the Russian Commercial Comrades began to accumulate. As they accumulated they became the object of Japanese adventures, and a rich source of inspiration to the daring spirit of the hardy seafaring natives of the islands.

Realizing the danger of the situation the company has tried in several ways to get the seal skins away from the islands. In the first place it was intended that the *Mineola* should take them and bring them to this port. But that ship was wrecked. Her cargo, was, however, saved, and so it happened that the pile of valuable skins on the islands was not diminished and all the time continued to increase in amount and value.

All this time the company which owned the skins was not the only one who had eyes fixed on the rich storehouse. That craft of many nationalities, the schooner *Carmenita*, which is at the present time in the kindness of the authorities at Acapulco, flying the flag of Mexico, have to visit this harbor to long ago and are now on their way to the deck a Hotchkiss rapid-fire gun.

During the previous season the *Carmenita* had been in the Commandorski rookery and had a brush with the men who guard the skins. The crew of the *Carmenita* was only answered with a shrug of the shoulders when they were questioned about that event. Evidently the *Carmenita* had not been altogether satisfactory to them. But this time they planned more wisely, and incidentally there is a larger game at stake. The pile of skins has doubled.

But the little schooner with her rapid-fire gun was to hurry it to the prize. Others are on the trail. Some time ago two Japanese sealers sailed to for several days near the Parallonis, during which time they, too, were fitted out with guns and ammunition. They then sailed toward the islands, while the *Carmenita* is going by the northern island route and is at present in danger of being detained at Vancouver by the authorities.

Under the United States Flag. In the meantime the company which owns the prize is not inactive. Count von Bruagen, the secretary of the company, has been in the city, and the safest plan would be to get those seal skins under the protection of the American flag.

Voyages to the Russian Pacific possessions have not been remarkably successful. The *Montara*, a steamer of ancient date and rather antiquated machinery, has spent many years in bringing cargoes of coal to this port from the north. She was pronounced crossing the straits, and two weeks ago she sailed, with the count on board, bound for the Commandorski Islands, and making all the speed possible to reach the goal. From Point Bonita she steered a direct course toward the islands, and the race was on that may end in bloodshed.

Who then will win the million-dollar prize? The *Carmenita* is apparently the favorite of the running. But between the Japanese sealers and the count on the *Montara* the race is an even one. The pelts of two seasons will either be won by the Japanese privateers or will be landed in Vancouver by the count's crew.

The Irish language has only eighteen letters, and making all the vowels separately and not joined together, the chief difficulty in learning Irish lies in the innumerable abbreviations for words and phrases. The Irish language is nonphonetic, the words being a key to the correct pronunciation.

Typewriting Soon Pades. The register of deeds of Yorkshire, England, district writes that typewriting parchments are useless as memoranda. He has examined a large number of such documents, and he finds that typewriting on parchment deeds is not durable. He deems deposited so recently as 1902 many deeds have completely disappeared.

Queen House Lease. A house lease produced in Montreal court recently had a clause prohibiting the tenant from having relatives to visit him and also forbidding dancing. The judge refused to grant an injunction for breach of such a condition.

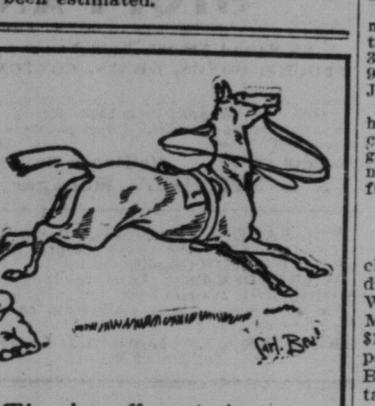

STATE OF CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WOPPED UP ELECTIONS

La Nationalista Fears Result—If Hyman is Defeated, Terror Will Strike Ministry.

Montreal, May 28.—(Special.)—The Nationalists, in the course of its regular article, asks the reason of the delay in the debate on the educational clauses. The wicked ones, the writer states, declare that there is trouble in the cabinet. According to information received from members of the cabinet, the seasons of the cabinet are lively in the extreme. It appears that the Quebec members of the cabinet wish to improve on the Sifton amendment so as to safeguard some sort of proviso for the rights of the Catholic minority. On the other hand, the English-speaking members, on the principle of "What we have we hold," do not let go easily and resist all attempts at a compromise. This is why the debate is suspended. What will be the outcome of this ministerial dissension very little is known, but little that we may get will be due to the position which the English-speaking members have vigorously denounced the Sifton amendment. As a matter of fact, had it not been for the member for LaSalle, the proposition replacing the primitive clause would have passed without hindrance.

Another of the reasons for delaying the debate is the rather serious illness of Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick. The minister of justice is the champion of the Catholics at the council table and he fights for all our rights. It is now three weeks since the discussion of the burning question has been deferred from day to day, and it is quite probable that it will still further be delayed for the result of the elections in North Oxford and London. These contests will not take place before the middle of June and it is reported that the fate of the Catholic schools is wrapped up in the result. If the Conservatives are beaten in London, the Sifton amendment will be voted and the inquiry will be fully consummated. It will not, however, take place without Mr. Bourassa's protestations, as he has himself announced that he would denounce this amendment and unjust legislation. There is also rumor to the effect that the Tories of Quebec who at first were throwing fire and flame at Mr. Wilfrid Laurier have become absolutely quiet. The statement is made that they have become more liberal than the Liberals in the right, and for Jacques Cartier, with long hair and full hand he is said to have expressed the wish that they would leave Bourassa and Lavergne to get it alone. There may be some truth in this, but the rumor is yet too vague to be given as a certainty.

Is it not time to draw the curtain? The French-Canadian Liberals who are sacrificing—that is the proper word—their brothers at the altar of the sad excuse that they expose themselves to a little pap in displeasing the minister. But the Conservatives, who have not this cynical justification to offer, act out of fear of their Orange cohorts. If, therefore, humiliation has its degrading effect on the Canadians certainly occupy the lowest.

FIRST AND GREATEST OF ENDEAVORS International Congress on Agriculture is Convened at Rome.

Rome, May 28.—In the historic hall of the capitol to-day King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena, surrounded by members of the cabinet and other high state dignitaries, inaugurated the international conference of agriculturists in the presence of the diplomatic corps and 150 delegates.

Minister of Agriculture Riva delivered the address of greeting to the illustrious representatives of the civilized nations, convoked in a parliament of knowledge, justice and economic concord in favor of the welfare and rest of human endeavors, agriculture.

COUNTING ON A LONG STRIKE. Demonstration Planned for July—7000 Police on Duty.

Chicago, May 28.—Nothing developed to-day to indicate an early settlement of the teamsters' strike, which has been in progress for nearly two months. That the unions are of the belief that the strike will be long is demonstrated to-day at the meeting of the Chicago Federation of Labor, when arrangements were made for holding a strike demonstration on July 10.

With over 7000 policemen and deputy sheriffs detailed on strike duty, the employers declare that they will be able to demonstrate to the strikers that any further continuation of the strike will be suicidal to the Teamsters' Union. To-day was one of the quietest since the strike began.

Within another 200 yards are houses of Dr. Noble, Mr. Auk, Mr. Eckart, and Col. Pezzatti, and a short distance away are the homes of Deputy Police Chief Stark, Mr. Ley and Mr. Lennox. 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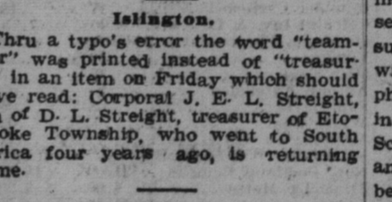
