CHEAP POWER—WHAT IS IT?

Alderman Hayes said at yesterday's meeting of the common council that small users of electric power in this city now had to pay \$125 per horsepower.

A very striking observation touching this question is made in the book just published by the Macmillan Company of Canada, Ltd., written by Mr. James J. Harpell, who passed through St. John the other day on his way to the Old Country.

"One (Canadian) water power, which are among the finest in the world, and which should give our industry an advantage over that of other countries, are not being developed to give this result."

Compare \$7.45 with the \$125 and the \$216 mentioned at yesterday's council meeting. St. John, which has industrial ambitions, is away behind the times in this matter of generating electrical energy from water power for manufacturing purposes.

It has been the fashion for some years to say that New Brunswick had few power streams, and that all that were useful had already been taken up. This is a most unsatisfactory description of our position, for while we have alienated Grand Falls and the best cataract on the Nepisiguit, there are still many opportunities to develop power which will give the capitalist a fair return for his investment and still supply energy to the consumer at a rate far below that at which power is now marketed in New Brunswick.

THE INCOMING TIDE. The places neglected by the people in their first journey in search of a land of promise are now being filled up. Canada is receiving today, not only the largest numbers, but the best classes of that ever increasing number who answer the impulse to migrate.

Those who are coming today, at least the great majority of them, are immeasurably different from the men who founded our representative government. Some are men who are not used to liberty; many of them have been crushed down by the mailed hand of power and have felt the tyranny of both church and state.

As has been said, Canada is today receiving the best class of the immigrants from all nations. By attaching them to the soil she is doing much to increase the benefit they will confer upon the country. The policy of settling them in a body may be questioned, for in so doing they retain their language and habits, and are less likely to enter into the intelligent life of the country.

AWAIT MADERO BEFORE PEACE CAN BE ARRANGED

Efforts to Bring Him into Conference with the Mexican Government. El Paso, Tex., April 4.—(Canadian Press)—On the surface, proposed peace negotiations did not appear to make much progress yesterday between the insurgents and the Mexican federalists, but developments came to light that promise much in the next few days.

It is known that Francisco I. Madero, Jr., has not been heard from regarding the proposals of the Mexican government, and until he can be heard from, negotiations are impossible. All efforts now are bending towards arranging a meeting in this city between Francisco I. Madero, Jr., and others, with representatives of the Mexican government.

To make this possible, immunity from arrest must be granted, since by the United States, as a warrant is out for his arrest, a charge of violating the neutrality laws. An agreement to suspend this warrant probably will be made, if Senor Madero desires to come to El Paso. The next step will be to procure safe transportation for Madero to El Paso from the Mexican government.

MORE THAN \$20,000,000 YEARLY FOR THE NAVAL SCHEME IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, Aust., April 4.—It is announced that the annual charge of the entire naval scheme recommended by Admiral Sir Rosslyn Henderson will amount to \$4,784,000, including in addition to the cost of maintenance of the Australian navy, \$1,292,000 as a depreciation fund and \$3,232,000 for the personnel of the navy.

The importance of the defence scheme is thoroughly appreciated and in spite of the great cost of the undertaking the press, generally speaking, expresses its hearty support, pointing out the necessity of putting the proposals into practice.

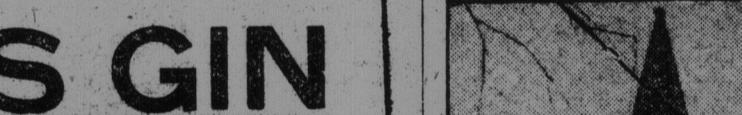

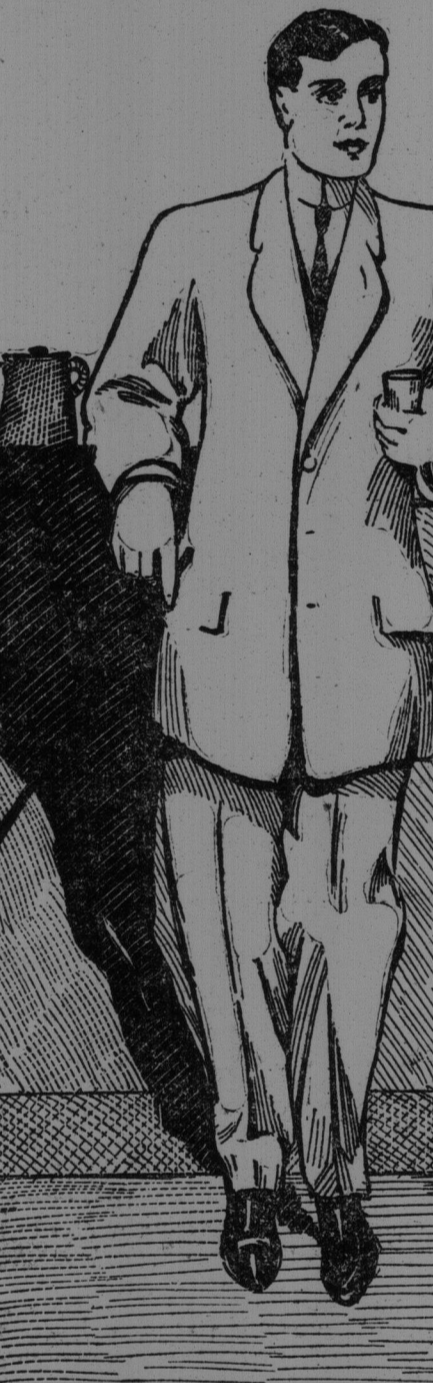

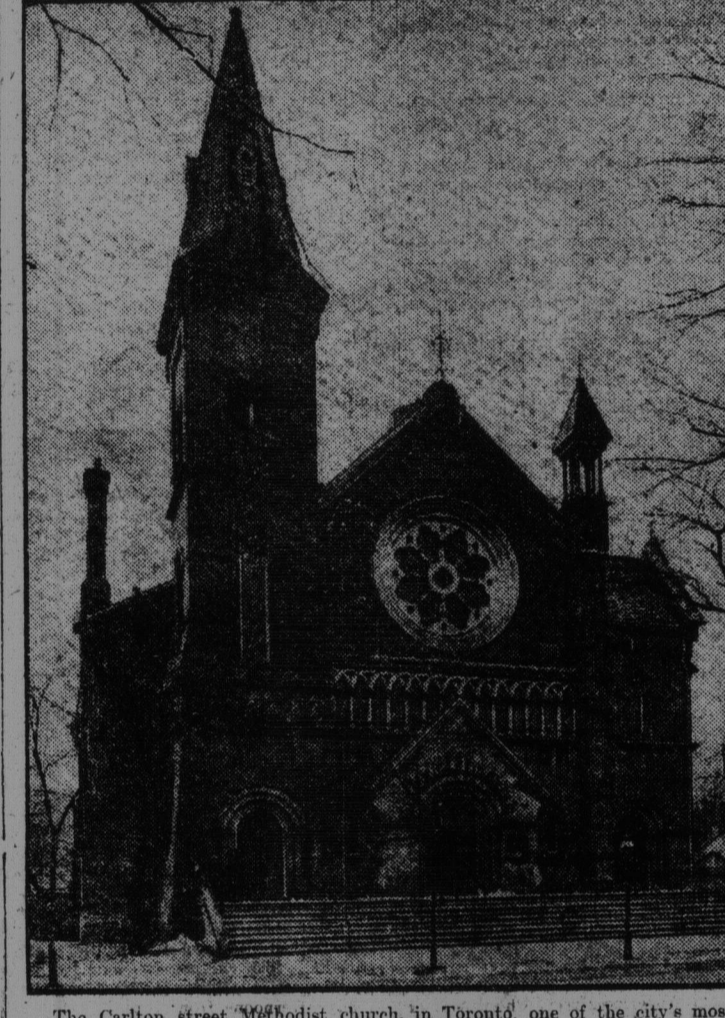

## LORD MINTO SPEAKS OF MATTERS IN INDIA

His Advice as to the Administration of Affairs in Country Where He Has Been Viceroy

In recognition of his distinguished services as viceroy of India, the Earl of Minto was recently presented the freedom of the city of London in the Guildhall, with all the customary formalities. Lord Minto has had a long and distinguished career in many lands, and the honor has seldom if ever been more justly conferred.

After the presentation Lord Minto made an interesting speech in which he briefly reviewed the period of his viceregal life in India. He began by expressing his gratitude to Lord Curzon for the part which he had personally supervised, and for the part on the frontiers which was largely the result of the policy fostered by his predecessor.

But before he had been in India many months it became evident to him that there would be long and continued with a mass of popular discontent. As far as they could judge, the discontent was justifiable and was due to a growing belief that further opportunities must be afforded for the official representation of Indian public opinion, and a greater share be granted to Indians in the government of their own country.

We were called upon to recognize the rights of western education we had ourselves introduced into India.

an era in which they must expect to hear the expression of Indian opinion increase in volume and in force, but during which he believed the government of India in India would be steadily and sympathetically supported, but in which its relations with the central government of the empire would need to be directed with a very light hand.

## SPEED OF AUTO LIMITED TO 20 MILES AN HOUR

N. B. Legislature Fixes it at Fifteen Miles in Villages and Eight in Towns and Cities

Fredericton, April 3.—For more than an hour this afternoon and for three hours tonight the house assembled in committee with the bill in respect to the use of motor vehicles, a measure which had been before the committee at a previous sitting. It was finally agreed to amend the bill so as to provide a limit of twenty miles an hour in the country fifteen in villages and eight in towns and cities, adopting at the same time the idea prevailing in the Massachusetts motor law that speed in excess of the limit be regarded as prima facie evidence of carelessness.

The hydro-electric power bill will also have some further consideration and P. W. Thomson, one of the promoters, is here looking after the interests of the company. Mr. Sproul introduced a bill respecting the water supply of Sussex.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill to incorporate Frasers, Limited.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the act incorporating the Imperial Dry Dock Company.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the New Brunswick dental act.

Hon. Mr. Hazen presented a petition in favor of a bill to incorporate the Life Chiropractors Association in New Brunswick.

Mr. Hatheway presented a petition in favor of a bill to increase the salary of the police magistrates of that city.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the act respecting compulsory attendance at school. The bill is along the lines of legislation in force in Maine and is to provide that children between fourteen and sixteen years of age who have not received a preliminary education will not come under the provisions of the act when it is shown to be necessary that they be employed for the livelihood of their family.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the towns incorporation act.

Mr. Byrnes introduced a bill respecting the Caracraft & Gulf Shore Railway Company.

Mr. Prescott presented a petition in favor of a bill to incorporate the village of Albert for fire and water purposes, and a bill to incorporate the Southern Boon and Driving Company.

Mr. Hatheway introduced a bill to amend the general public hospitals act. Hon. Mr. Hazen asked for ruling as to what committee that bill would be referred to. The speaker promised to give a ruling at an early date.

Mr. Dickson in the chair and continued consideration of the bill to fix the assessment of James Pender Ltd., St. John, which was agreed to with an amendment to make the bill applicable only to the company's property used for manufacturing purposes.

The bill authorizing the town of Woodstock to borrow \$10,000 for the permanent improvement of streets was also agreed to.

The house went into committee with Mr. Sproul in the chair and agreed to the bill for the prevention of accidents by fire in hotels. The factory inspector will be the inspector and will be paid an additional \$200 a year, commencing August 1.

The bill providing for guaranteeing the bonds of Campbellton, to the extent of \$100,000, was agreed to with amendments to provide for a sinking fund.

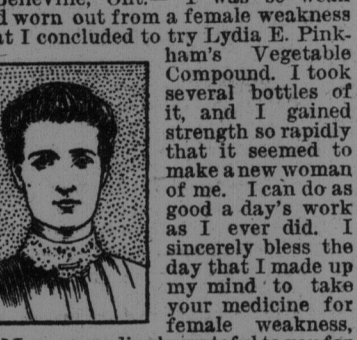
Mr. Hazen said he had prepared a bill to provide for the inspection of sinking funds by an official of the government and also to provide for the registration of sinking funds with that official.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill to incorporate the St. John River Electrical Power Company.

The bill relating to the Albitrite, Olite & Campbell Coal Company, Limited, and for the development of shale areas was considered. Hon. Mr. Grimmer explained that the bill was introduced for the purpose of developing shale areas in New Brunswick.

## DEAD BABY IN TRUNK IN CELLAR

**Evidence Points to Infanticide in Horsefield Street House—Authorities Have Young Girl Under Surveillance Pending Result of Post Mortem**

The finding of the lifeless body of a male infant last evening in the cellar of a house occupied by a prominent citizen in 19 Horsefield street, is surrounded by peculiar circumstances and is believed to have brought to light a case of infanticide. The discovery was made by the head of the house, who was horrified at what he saw. He had the little body removed with the consent of Coroner Berryman, who was summoned, and was soon on hand in company with Detective Killen. The little child was placed in the morgue and it is probable that a post-mortem examination will this afternoon be made to determine what is expected to be shown that the baby was born alive.

The mother of the child is at present in the General Public Hospital, and has been for about a month. She was sent there after having declined medical treatment at the hands of a physician whose services were secured by her employer, and also because it was seen that she was very ill. She was employed as a servant and had been in the family only about three weeks when she took ill. She refused all proffered medical assistance, though being kindly treated by her employer and his wife. She told them she came here from Fredericton, and was a native of Scotland, having been in Canada but five months, and her story was looked upon as being true.

About a month ago her employer and his wife went to Montreal and it is believed that it was then that the birth of the little one occurred. Last evening the householder referred to had occasion to go down to the cellar and open an old trunk which had long been out of use. On lifting the cover there was revealed the body of the child, wrapped up in a few old clothes. It was well preserved, as the cellar was cold, in spite of the fact that the little body had been there for a month at least.

## RED STAR LINERS TO THIS PORT

**It Means Much Immigration Business and Some See in it The Passing of American Ports, in Favor of Canadian, in Continental Immigration**

The recently reported transfer of big liners from the New York to the Canadian route means much to St. John as the winter ports of the Dominion are to get their share of the extra business resulting from this move.

During the present season two Red Star liners, the Barcelona and Sanland, will be here. The former is now on her way from Rotterdam with 1000 passengers. She is a steamer of 3,200 tons. The Sanland, which will follow her, is a big steamer of about 10,000 tons and she will bring a large passenger list. Next year there will be more of the line, and as these craft are taken from the New York to the Canadian route, they will make Montreal their summer and St. John their winter terminus. While on this route they will fly the flag of the Canada flag. Messrs. Wm. Thomson & Co. are the agents of the line here.

The Sanland and Gothland, which will in future sail under the flag of the Canada flag, and will be an acquisition to the immigrant traffic of the continent. The Gothland, another of the Red Star line, will be coming here next season.

Discussing the transfer of these two vessels from the New York route, where they have been running for many years, James Thom, general manager for the White Star, Thomson and Canadian lines, said that while the advent of these two ships would, no doubt, assist in no small measure the enormous immigrant traffic which Canada is at the present time doing with the Continent of Europe, there was also another standpoint from which the matter might be viewed. This was, he said, from the point of view of the American authorities, and the fact that these two ships, which had been doing such good work in the immigration trade for many years, had been found by their owners to be superfluous on the New York run and had therefore been transferred to the Canadian route, might give valuable food for reflection among some of the egoists on the other side of the line.

Perhaps, he said, this might at last wake them up to the fact that the Canadian route, which they have for so many years despised, is actually in process of becoming the chief factor in the immigrant trade of the whole of the North American continent.
