PENALTIES CRITICIZED Mr. Magee claimed the penalties for violation of the present law were en-tirely too'small and declared that in view of the desire of man to have al-coholic stimulant made it practically impossible to enforce this Act. "I believe I voice the sentiment of the majority of the people of this pro-vince when I say the present Act is impossible of enforcement," said Mr. Magee. His claim that man desires alcoholic stimulant was met with a de-termined "no" from A. F. Bentley, M. L. A. for Saint John County and one of the pronounced prohibitionists of the House.

VOTE ON ISSUE URGED

Mr. Magee said the province needed today liquor legislation which allowed the decent citizen to secure a fair share of liquor without becoming a law-breaker.
