

The peculiar virtue of these ingredients is that no poisonous ingredient is used in their composition. Boil together linseed oil and rosin until the compound becomes thick, or boil three parts of rosin and four parts of rape seed oil together, until a sticky mass is produced oragain boil to a thick paste one pound of rosin, three and one-half ounces of molasses and the same quar tity of linseed oil. Any one of these compounds spread on thick sheets of prown paper and scattered over the tables and shelves will effectually exterminate flies.
