



When the mob arrived at the jail, they brought the jailer to the door with the ruse that they had a prisoner, overpowered him and took his keys. After securing the negro they locked the jailer in Morris' cell and soon accomplished their work. Sheriff Houston was in Georgia at the time.

Morris had been acting strangely, and it is believed that fear that the negro might escape the gallows by feigning insanity, prompted the act of the mob.



ASIA MINOR GREAT MEN AND SPEAK

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty core.

LONDON, June 5.—The most representative gathering of British newspaper men ever held occurred this evening at the Garden Club at Shepherd's Bush, when 1,000 journalists of the United Kingdom gave a banquet in honor of the fifty-seven colonial delegates to the Imperial press congress that is to open at the foreign office next Monday.



The municipality of Duesseldorf is also willing to subscribe a substantial sum toward the capital of the new company.

In some cases regular lines of airships wil libe established, while in other cases pleasure cruises will take place at regular intervals.

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


