TEACHERS' PENSIONS.

The teachers' pension act is criticised because there are few who can qualify under it. Mr. Copp has heard that only two in the whole province will be entitled to pensions. This was too absurd a statement for even Mr. Copp to make on his own responsibility. As a matter of fact the age limit and the service limit are those proposed by the teachers themselves. Their dele-gates computed that on the basis of \$400 pension for men and \$250 for women the amount required to meet the claims would have been \$3,850 in 1909. This sup-posed that about twelve teachers would go on the pension list at the beginning. It was calculated that the amount required would, fifteen years hence, be \$12,250, which means a retiring allowance for some forty teachers. forty teachers.

But whether the number be large or small it will include all women over fifty-five, and all men over sixty who have been teaching thirty-five years. It will who have been teaching thirty-live years. It will not be considered a grievance by teachers that they are expected to continue in active service to these ages or for this length of time. Some will continue longer if they are permitted to do so. But it will relieve them of a great anxiety to know that age and retirement
