BRITISH MAKE SUCCESSFUL RAIDS IN FRANCE -PETROGRAD ADMITS TEUTON VICTORY IN NORTHERN ROUMANIA—FRENCH CARRY OUT SURPRISE ATTACK ON GERMAN LINE IN DIREC-TION OF SENONES.

London, Jan. 21.—The report from British headquarters in France Issued tonight says:

"A successful daylight raid was made this morning against enemy thes southeast of Loos. Dugouts full of Germans were bombed and destroyed. Many casualties were inflicted on the enemy with small

We also entered the enemy's lines last night, north of Neuve Chapelle. The enemy's artillery was active at intervals during the day in the neighborhood of Rancourt and Serre and in the Ypres section. We effectively bombarded the enemy positions in St. Pierre Vaast wood and the neighborhood of Gommecourt, Arras and Armentieres."

Russians Routed.

Berlin, Jan. 21, via Sayville.—The entire bridgehead position at Nanesti, on the Sereth line, in Northern Roumania, fell into Field Marshal Von Mackensen's hands with the town, the far office announced today. The Russians suffered severe losses in retreating across the Sereth bridges, and 556 prisoners were taken.

An attempted attack by the Russians in the Putna Valley, on the western Moidavian front, was broken up) and minor attacks elsewhere along this line were repulsed.

Only fininor operations in the other war areas are reported in the official statement:

"Front of Field Marshal Von Mackensen: Together with Nanesti, on January 19, the entire bridgehead there, still tenaciously defended by the Russians stormed several hostife lines which had strongly entrenched points of support. The town itself was taken in a violent struggle from house-to-house. The Russians, streaming back across the Sereth bridges, were caught by our outfanking batteries and machine guns and suffered severe losses. One officer, 555 men, two machine guns and four minethrowers fell into our hands."







The sole nesd of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saakatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Bub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—81x months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead can farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—81x months residence in each of three years after earning homestead painty, also observe a second conditions.
