ARMY FROM 212,034

Substantial Force of Americans Are Already in France, Says Secretary of War Baker-On the Fighting Fronts Infantry is Inactive, Except for Small Raiding Operations, But Artillery Duels Continue on Various Sectors.

IN NORTHERN ITALY SNOW HAS FALLEN TO DEPTH OF FROM THREE TO FIVE FT.

British Successfully Raid at Three Different Points Enemy's Trenches Southeast of Ypres, Inflicting Many Casualties-Heavy Artillery Fire Near Canadians' Position at Lens-Fighting in Russian Civil War Results in Bolsheviki Victory

The American army, which is to be sent into battle to make world safe for democracy, is rapidly being formed. In the nine onths since the United States declared that a state of war existed with Germany, the army has risen from 212,034 officers and men to 1,539,506 officers and men.

This statement has been made by Secretary of War Baker, who declared that no army in the history of the world had ever been raised, equipped or trained so quickly. The secretary added, that a "substantial" force of Americans already was in France and fit for active service and that full equipment is on hand for every man who will be sent to Europe during 1918.

On the fighting fronts the infantry is inactive, except for small raiding operations, but the artillery duels continue intense on various sectors. In northern Italy snow has fallen to a depth of from three to five feet, bringing the operations to a halt. Ship Losses and Crop Failures Abroad Bring About a Serious Food Situation for the Allies

Washington, Jan. 10-Ship losses and crop failures abroad have brought about such a serious food situation in the allied countries that the United States is planning to release for export an additional 90,000,000 bushels of wheat, although the country's export surplus had been shipped by mid-December.

The American people will be asked by the food administration to cut their consumption to make up the amount to be exported. Unless they do, the nation is threatened with a flour shortage in May before the new wheat crop is harvested in

The food administration is considering legislation to make the saving of wheat compulsory and has approved a bill drawn by Representative Lever, author, of the food control bill, to enforce wheatless day.

Proposals for mixed flours and for a form of war bread of mixed grains also are under consideration as possible measures to reduce the use of wheat flour.

In preparation for dealing with the situation, the food administration has decided to purchase from the mills thirty per cent. of their output. Out of the flour purchased, it will supply the allies, the army and the navy and will maintain reserve stores to meet any local shortages that may arise.

Some food administration officials think a slight flour shortage next spring, not only would not cause suffering here, but might have a wholesome effect in causing

The shortage of food abroad probably will bring an early determination of a policy respecting the balance to be maintained between food and troop shipments. A decision will be left largely to the allies, since they best can determine which will be the more useful to themselves in prosecuting the war.

London, Jan. 10.—Unofficial reports received here concerning the first session of the peace conference at Brest-Litovsk, which was resumed Tuesday with Leon Trotzky. the Bolsheviki minister, at the head of the Russian delegates, say that Trotzky in a speech insisted on a removal of the conference to Stockholm. Trotzky declared the Russians came to Brest-Litovsk not as the representatives of a conquered country and did not intend to ask for pity, but would continue to act as true revolutionists. He is reported to have told the German and Austrian delegates that if they did not accede to his request that they would feel the weight of arms of the Russian democracy.

The Evening Post asserts that the German replied that they did not defer in the carry on the peace negotiations but that they failed to specify where.

ACE MEETING

rn Sir Thomas White Will Arrange to Advance Any Needed Funds to Provincial

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—In order to relieve the congestion in the Canadian investment market by reason of large offerings of provinces and municipalities, which may come upon it during the remaining period of the war, Sir Thomas White will arrange to the extent that may be necessary to make advances to provincial governments to assist in meeting maturing obligations in United States which may not be renewable there, and for which the money must be found in Canada, and towards meeting, in part, their other necessary commitments.

This arrangement will, to extent it is available of, by the provincial government diminish the amount of their issues upon the Canadian market. By reducing the volume of these issues a better market will be provided for such provincial issues as will be offered, and also for the large volume of municipal securities which must be sold during the coming year. When, later on, market conditions improve and securities are more in demand, provincial issues may be made and the advances made by the Dominion repaid.

Jan. 10—Senator Kenyon of lowa, who recently returned from a visit to the French front and to England, today warraed the senate against Germany's peace offers and stories that the country was exhausted. "Nothing could assist Germany more." he declared. "Those who are trying to help in bringing about a patched-up peace and lend their influence in that direction are weakening the American forces, weakening American preparation, he said, "and they had best to remember that it will cost us more now to lose this war than to win it."

Senator Kenyon in relating his experiences, said that what he had seen in France had aroused him to such a pitch that he wished the Kaiser might be compelled to be at sea in an open boat that was being shelled, and that the palaces of the German ruler might be blown up.

"We must bring to the western front two million men and have a million in reserve." Senator Kenyon declared. "We must do it as quickly as possible. We must cut red tape; stop quarrelling about the guns and like things and carry, this thing through on business-like principles. There is too much grandstanding and limit lighting; too much patriotic posing and not enough sacrifice."
