## Ship Losses and Crop Failures

 Abroad Bring About a SeriousFood Situation for the Allies
Washington, Jan. $10-$ Ship losses and crop failures abroad have brought about such a serious food situation in the allied countries that the United States is planning to release or export an additionai
try's export surplus had been shipped by mid-December.
The American people will be asked by the food administration to cut their consumption to make up the amount to be exported. Unless they do, the nation is threatened with a flour shortage in May before the new wheat crop is harvested in June.

The food administration is considering legislation to make the saving of wheat compulsory and has approved a bill drawn
food control bill, to enforce wheatless day
Proposals for mixed flours and for a form of war bread of mixed grains also are under consideration as possible measures to reduce the use of wheat flour.
In preparation for dealing with the situation, the food administration has decid-
ad to purchase from the mills thirty per cent. of their output. Out of the chased, it will supply the allies, the army and the navy and will maintain' reserve stores to meet any local shortages that may arise.

Some food administration officials think a slight flour shortage next spring, not only would not cause suffering here, but might have a wholesome effect in causing
