HOW IT IS DONE

Indifference of Ministers Responsible for Heavy Expenditures

Fredericton, N. B., March 20th, 1912. - But very few of the Auditor-General's reports have been distributed up to date. Each of the members has a copy and there are a few others to be found within the precincts of the Legislative chamber but the usual distribution of forty copies to each member will not be made until toward the end of the Session and consequently the people will have but a small opportunity of inspecting this wonderful document until after the House is closed. But what has appeared in the newspapers has led to requests from all over the province for more information concerning expenditures upon both small and large works and all at once it seems to have been discovered that only a few and very few of the Highway Boards have been filling a copy of their expenditures with the County Secretaries. It is a very bad thing for a Government or for a business concern when the people interested in it begin to feel or to fear that the officials are trying to keep information from them. The suspicion surely arises then that the money is not being properly spent, that the grafters are getting a large share of it and that what should be expended upon the roads and bridges particularly, is diverted into the pockets of those who are in charge of the work.

The people of every parish like to be informed fully on what is going on. The assessors every spring in order to give them information hang up several copies of their report or Parish assessment list, in different parts of the parish. These are eagerly examined by the electors and if there are any errors the assessors soon hear of it.

In the same way the Revisors when the time comes to revise the voters' lists, hang up their lists and if any mistakes have been made, they are quickly informed and as readily make the correction if they are fair and impartial.

The school trustees who assess for money and who collect it, call the people together once a year and show them how the money is spent. They are permitted an opportunity to investigate the accounts, even after their own auditor has certified that they are correct. What is the result? There is not a parish, it may be said, in the Province of New Brunswick, where there is a dollar of school money misappropriated; but the Highway Board which also collects money, through their officials, can do things with a bolder and higher hand. They do not ask any advice of the people. They spend as they please and where they please. They ignore the law which requires them to send in a copy of their report to the County Secretary. They do not account to any of the people. They simply send a report to the Chief Commissioner of Public Works and he, when he is asked about it, says that it is too much trouble and will take too much time to copy and bring down for the information of the people. Yet these highway boards get grants from the Government and they collect taxes from all of those people who do not perform statute labor and all those who own property but do not reside in the parish.

The Auditor-General has plenty of assistance or he should have if all of his clerks are busy. It is true that a good official was lost in Don Winslow, Secretary to the Board of Works. He attended to his business, he had no politics and he was a good official, too good for such a salary as he could command in a New Brunswick Government job. The west claimed this bright young man from right under the nose of Hubbard and his immigrant policy and H. M. Blair, a conservative healer, from St. Mary's, a young man who has been known principally for his activity in elections, who took a most prominent part in the Moore house-Burden contest while employed by the New Brunswick

SUDDEN DEATH

OF REV. C. W. TOWNSEND

Stricken With Paralysis at His Home in St. John.

The people of this town and all over the province heard with sincere regret of the death of Rev. Mr. Townsend on Wednesday morning.

For the past two years Rev. Mr. Townsend had been travelling evangelist for the Baptist Home Mission Board, an office which he filled with great acceptance, not sparing himself in any way, ever ready to travel at the call of the churches or the board. Last fall the Campbellton church being vacant, Rev. Mr. Townsend was asked to supply there till such time as the congregation should get a permanent pastor. He had been in Campbellton all winter applying himself to the work with his usual intensity of devotion.

In his work here he made many friends, his sincerity and devotion in his work, his clear vision, and his loving Christian character, making him a man among men, and one whom it was a delight to know. His congregation cannot yet realize the dreadful blow which has befallen them, in the loss of such a leader and pastor.

Last Monday he travelled to his home in St. John, accompanied from Moncton by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson. While on the train he complained of feeling slightly ill, saying he was afraid he was getting the La Grippe. On arrival in the city he went to his home in the North End and passed the evening, retiring sometime before 10 o'clock. About 10 o'clock, while in bed, he was seized with a paralytic stroke which affected his right side. Dr. Francis J. Hogan was called in at once, but in spite of all he could do the patient remained unconscious, and he died early this morning. Rev. Mr. Townsend was formerly a student at the Pastors College, London, an institution founded by Rev. C. H. Spurgeon. He came to New Brunswick in 1895 and has filled the pastorates at Cambridge, Hillsboro and St. Martins. He was looked upon as one of the ablest ministers of the Baptist denomination. Remarkably intelligent and highly cultured, his pulpit ministrations were always acceptable to the people wherever he was.

He came to Canada about twenty-two years ago going first to British Columbia, where he filled some important charges. It

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Concrete Dam Still Held up at Tuesday's Session.

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding. There were also present Councillors White, McKenzie, Alexander, Miller, Moore, Lunan and Pinaut. Meetings of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Petitions for license to conduct general stores from J. F. Gallagher St. John and A. Bertrand, Caussapical, were referred to Police and License committee.

The proposed bill for the Legislature as drafted by the Town Solicitors was then read.

After discussion, some amendments were made in its provisions and the bill will come up again for consideration at Friday's meeting.

A lease was submitted from the Intercolonial Railway for the privilege of laying a six inch sewer on their property, and was referred to the town solicitors.

This is the Crawford sewer from Paterson street extension.

The chairman of the various standing committees submitted reports of accounts, which were ordered paid.

Councillor Alexander submitted further information with reference to fees of consulting engineers re Smith Lake dam. After discussion the matter was laid over till Friday evening's meeting when it was expected that Mr. Underhill would be present to give information re construction of wooden dam, Councillor White brought up the matter of an old account of Jas. Alexander for \$195. This account was for a horse commanded at the time of the fire July 1910. The account was ordered to be paid.

Council then adjourned.

The militia department at Ottawa has purchased twelve Ford cars for the use of the department. Mr. A. C. Belle-Isle the representative of these cars here.

It has been his intention to return here on Saturday to resume his work in Campbellton. Rev. Mr. Townsend was married to Miss Eleanor Rowland of London, England. Besides his wife he is survived by one son, Mr. Charles T. Townsend, and two daughters, the Misses Salome and Alice, all at home. Services were held at the home of the deceased Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. The body will be taken on the early morning train today to the Narrows, Queens county, for interment alongside the remains of a deceased daughter.

IN DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, March 13.—The salient features of the budget speech are: The largest surplus on record, namely, \$39,000,000, being the difference between a total estimated revenue for the current year of \$136,000,000 and an expenditure on revenue account amounting to \$97,000,000.

Capital expenditure for the year including an extra outlay of \$5,000,000 to implement the Grand Trunk Pacific bond guarantee, more out of revenue, with a balance left for debt reduction amounting to \$1,150,000.

No tariff changes and no bounty renewals, pending investigations by the new Tariff Commission.

The Manitoba boundary bill was read a third time, Manitoba gets her extra territory unconditionally.

The Lacombe-Morden amendment in favor of separate schools for New Manitoba was defeated, 160 to 24. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. R. L. Borden voted together against separate schools. Of the 24 who favored the amendment 17 were Liberals (all French Canadians but two from Ontario) and 7 were Conservative-Nationalists of Quebec.

Dr. Beland's amendment, that a conference take place between the Dominion and Manitoba to ascertain what vested rights separate school had in Keewatin and, if so, how they could be safeguarded, was supported by the Liberals and defeated 107 to 52.



FAITHFUL IMITATORS

When the Flag-Flappers came into office, we were told that a new order of things was to be established at Ottawa. That may be, but the fact is that the Borden Government, in most things, has been slavishly following their predecessors. Mr. Borden adopted Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy of no coercion for Manitoba, modified it to be a secret deal with Premier Roblin. Mr. Borden, for the present at least, has adopted Sir Wilfrid Laurier's naval policy. He has adopted the Laurier Government's policy with regard to the Musquodocoy Railway. The Ministers have followed out the policies of their Liberal predecessors in the administration of their departments, in practically all details, and now Mr. White, the new Minister of Finance, is compelled to follow Mr. Fielding's final policy. When Mr. Fielding made his first Budget speech in 1897, he introduced a radical departure from the old Tory fiscal policy. Mr. White has found things so satisfactory that he cannot change the Fielding policy to the extent of one iota. The Fielding tariff stands intact and the Fielding financial policy is being carried out without change of any sort. Apart from their carcass of spoils, the Flag-Flappers are faithful imitators.

One of the features of the British Admiralty's naval policy for the year as announced by the First Lord to Parliament yesterday, is the decision to build smaller cruisers. Another tribute to the wisdom of the Laurier naval policy. Canada started to lay the foundation of a naval defence force by providing for a class of smaller ships which the King-Flappers called tin-pots, but which, Admiral Kingsmill says, met requirements, and the experts of the Admiralty are going to build more of them.

The Westminster Gazette, the great Liberal newspaper of London, rejoices over the announcement that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is to remain as the head of the Liberal party. Canadian politics, it says, will gain greatly in interest by Sir Wilfrid Laurier's continued participation in them.

We are glad to note that we are able to supply the editor of the Tribune with a little matter to fill up an otherwise empty local sheet. We are not having any controversy with the editor of the Tribune and can only say in his statements he seems to draw largely on a fevered imagination, or as a disciple of Ananias he bids fair to rival his master.

MATINEE FOR MRS. MEAD

The matinee that was held in the Opera House for Mrs. Mead on March 9th proved to be only a fair success on account of the terrible storm which made the streets almost impassable. The receipt of same amounted to \$14.65. Since that time more money has been handed in to Manager Dimock which raised the amount to \$19. Mr. Dimock has paid this amount of \$19 on the debt which is on the back that Mrs. Mead is now living in. There still remains a debt of \$34 on shack.

Government, was advanced to Winslow's position. Then the scramble began for Blair's job. Walter E. Dixon, M. P. for Albert had a niece in the St. John Street Railway office and he was on the scene at once promoting her claims for appointment. Miss Estabrooks resigned her position in St. John and came to Fredericton. But the President of the Council, Hon. Robt. Maxwell, had a son who wanted a job. There was need for two people to take Blair's place less than one would have answered but the influence of this member of the Government was all powerful and J. Herbert Maxwell, his son, was given a temporary appointment in November last. That has since been made permanent.

If one thing has been more apparent than any other with this government it has been their itching desire to surround themselves with their relatives. They believe undoubtedly in the maxim that "charity begins at home". Never mind about the people who voted for them. Never mind about the heaped up applications, "my brother Seth" (the poultry expert), "my son Herb" (the successor J. Blair), "My Uncle Harry," as to Douglas knew his appointees, must have the first chance.

And these relatives of the members have been "feeding at the public trough"—to use a Tory phrase—ever since this Government came in. The Valley survey has proved a perfect bonanza for them. Fred Sproul's son is King's County, W. E. Dixon's relatives, George Jones brothers and his cousins, Maxwells nearest and dearest—but why go over the list? If there is one Government member or supporter from the Premier down and not excluding J. Douglas himself who haven't placed a relative some where let him stand out and take credit.

Why in King's and Queens' counties Jones and Woods hand out the road and bridge favors through their relatives. Eib of King's county is a cousin of Jones who had hardly warmed his seat in the legislature before he had one brother as a bridge inspector and would have had another only some of his principal followers in Roschvil e bucked. That is not all. The people along the mill-stream and in other parts of Kings say that whenever possible the lumber required for repairs to bridges is taken from Jones' mill at Aponaqu. The car loads of lumber sent to the Central Railway is an old story. But the latest piece of nepotism or grafting of his relatives upon the public plum tree is the appointment of his brother Seth Jones—a Sussex barber—as poultry expert. He gets \$900 a year now, Dr. Landry says, and no doubt find it easier to trim and shave the province than his rough bearded customers. Just to pass the time between hair cuts he took to hens—first plain common hens, then fancy hens and now poultry—as a poultry expert. But in all seriousness there are a lot of people in the province who under the present circumstances think we need many things more than a poultry expert. If his expenses are anything in proportion to Secretary Hubbard's he is quite a bill of expense to New Brunswick.

In Queen's, the Howes' relatives of Harry Woods, are in command of the road and bridge forces. When John Morrison was getting sore throat reading over the Queen's county expenditures the other day it was "William Howe," "Frank Howe" and "Howe" with initials until one wondered if the roads and bridges in Queen's were controlled by a family compact.

BOB FITZ THE MOST REMARKABLE FIGHTER. Who was the most remarkable heavy-weight fighter who ever put up his gloves under the Marquis of Queensbury rules? Answer: Bob Fitzsimmons. The freckled faced Cornishman, maker of horse shoes, and built like a reversed pyramid, was the most extraordinary fighter of his time. He won the championship of the world from Jim Corbett at Carson City. He was thirty-seven when he lost the title to Jeffries and thirty-nine when beaten by the Californian the second time.

Age is a big factor in this story. It serves to show that the ruddy produce of the antipodes was more vigorous than Jeffries, who up to the recent disaster at Reno was generally conceded the distinction. Likewise it proves that care of a body can combat the advance of age to a certain extent. Jeffries was twenty-four years old when he beat Fitzsimmons at Coney Island. He was thirty-five years, two months and nine days old when Johnson whipped him in the "battle of the century," July 4. At thirty-five he is an old man. At this same age Fitz was in the zenith of his great power.

At twenty-nine Jeff retired from the ring and resorted to his old profession of hunting and fishing. He became his principal occupation for six years. And when he was induced to train and knock the packing out of Johnson, his punch-bagged-out like a submarine boat. He reduced to his old weight after much effort. In training he looked as good as when he had made "mice meat" of Jack Burke, his farewell fight. But Ed Dukhorst could have put up a better battle at Reno than the "right" Jeff.

BASEBALL SALARIES WONT BE CUT. 

NEW PROFESSOR APPOINTED

Dr. Weelock, New Professor of Physics

Sackville, N. B., March 14.—Dr. Becknell, professor of Physics in Mount Allison University, has signified his intention of not returning to Sackville next year. A meeting of the Mt. Allison Executive to consider the matter was held Tuesday afternoon, when the chair was filled by the appointment of F. E. Weelock Ph. D., as present professor of Physics in the University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri. He is a native of Lawrence, N. S. and received his early training in the public schools of Nova Scotia. He attended Normal school in Truro, N. S., 1896-97; was principal of Lawrence town high school for two years, subsequently attending Acadia College, Wolfville, 1901-02. He was vice principal of the MacDonald Consolidated school 1905-06 and afterwards Yale University 1906-10, taking the degree of B. A. in 1907 and Ph. D. in 1910. While at Yale Dr. Weelock assisted in laboratory work and the last year had charge of one of the laboratories. He is spoken of as being a very strong teacher, careful and thorough, conscientious and reliable.

Personally he is said to be very attractive, large and robust, handsome and with excellent manners. He is quiet, modest and goodnatured, honest and sincere.
