THE Provisional Council of the Corporation of the County of Renfrew hereby give notice that the following is a true copy of a By-law to be taken into consideration on the sixteenth day of November next, A. D. 1863, for the purpose of raising by way of loan the sum of twenty thousand dollars, for the purposes and to be applied in the manner therein mentioned.

**By-law No. 15.**  
A By-law to raise by way of Loan the sum of twenty thousand dollars for the purposes therein mentioned:  
WHEREAS the Provisional Municipal Corporation of the County of Renfrew, have resolved to finish and complete the County Buildings, which have been in part erected in the Village of Pembroke, the County Town of the said County of Renfrew, and also to erect such other Buildings as may be necessary for the transaction of Judicial, Municipal and other business of the County.

And whereas, to carry into effect the said recited object, it will be necessary for the said Municipal Corporation to raise the sum of twenty thousand dollars in the manner hereinafter mentioned.  
And whereas it will require the sum of twenty-two hundred dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said loan of debt, and interest as also hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Municipality, irrespective of any future increase of the same and also irrespective of any income to be derived from the temporary investment of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, according to the last revised assessment roll of the said Municipality, being for the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, was one million seven hundred and eleven thousand two hundred and ninety-nine dollars.  
And whereas for paying the interest and creating an equal yearly sinking fund for paying the said sum of twenty-two hundred dollars and interest as hereinafter mentioned, it will require an equal annual special rate of one mill and three-eighths mill on the dollar.  
Be it therefore enacted by the Provisional Municipal Corporation of the County of Renfrew:

1st. That it shall be lawful for the Warden to raise by way of loan from any person, or persons, body, or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer for the purposes and with the object above recited.

2nd. That it shall be lawful for the said Warden to cause any number of Debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required not less than One Hundred Dollars each, and that the said Debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Municipal Corporation and be signed by the said Warden.

3rd. That the said Debentures shall be made payable in Twenty years at further from the day hereinafter mentioned for this By-law to take effect at the office of the Treasurer of the said Municipality, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

4th. That the said Debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of six per cent. per annum, from the date thereof, which interest shall be payable on the first days of June and December in each and every year at the office of the Treasurer aforesaid.

5th. That for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said Debentures and the interest at the rate aforesaid to become due thereon, an equal special rate of one mill and three-eighths mill on the dollar shall in addition to all other rates be raised, levied and collected in each year upon all the rateable property in the said Municipality during the continuance of said Debentures or any of them.

6th. That this By-law shall take effect and come into operation upon the sixteenth day of November in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty Three.
