Collingwood Atrocity Still a Profound Mystery.

SHOT AND CLUBBED TO DEATH

Result of Post-Mortem Examination-Government Sends Detective to Assist in Case.

Collingwood, May 29.-From the postmortem examination made vesterday by Dr. A. M. McFaul, on the body of Glory Whalen, it was apparent that no outrage had been committed, although this may have originally been the motive for the crime. Glory was wearing a flat hat, tied under the chin, and the blow with the club had been given over this kat. The post-mortem showed that underneath the scalp, the top of the head, where the club had fallen, there was blood and serum. The bullet had entered the right side at the back of the head. passed right through the skull, and lodged beneath the skin over the left eye. It was extracted by Dr. Mc-Faul, and found to be from a 38-caliber revolver. The bullet was hardly flattened at all. The murder must have taken place shortly after 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, while Glory was on her way to school, for she never reached Collingwood that day. No distinct traces of footprints or sign of a struggle in the bush could be found, but there was a heavy rainfall Wednesday night, which might easily have obliterated any sign. The moss and grass on which the dead's child's head rested were saturated with blood It is a curious thing that a shot could have been fired at that hour of the morning and within such a short distance of the Kendall farm and yet no-

body there have heard it. Russell Kendall lives there with his widowed mother, and she stated to correspondent last evening that although she was wasning in the outer kitchen that morning she heard no

KNOCKED DOWN AND SHOT. It was when an examination was made that the brutality of the crime became apparent. Glory Whalen had evidently first been struck down with a club and then deliberately shot in the back of the head. 

FRANCE AND WHEAT

Chamber of Deputies Decide to Keep Up the Duty.

Paris, May 29.-In the Chamber of Deputies Tuesday, after a brief discussion, the bill reducing the duty on about 200 delegates attended the open-ing session of the annual convention of wheat to five francs was defeated by a majority of 301 votes.

The minister of agriculture, M. Mougeot, in opposing the measure, stated that the present price of wheat was not excessive, and that the farmers were receiving a lower price than was regarded as legitimately profitable. The proposed reduction of duty would not produce the desired end of cheaper bread, as it would not affect the price of flour. The remedy, if bread was too dear,

continued the minister, was for the municipalities to exercise their power to fix an official price of bread.



An attempt is being made to fasten another Yukon scandal on the Dominion Government over what is known as the Treadgold concession. In the early days of mining development in the Yukon the rich yield in the placer diggings could be taken, out with ease and at trifling cost, but as the beds along the creeks became exhausted the work became increasingly difficult because of the scarcity of water with which to wash out the gold in the less auriferous deposits. Expensive hydraulic machinery became necessary, and this could only be supplied at a large outlay. The work would be too expensive for the individual miners. A large waterworks her neighbor's neck. system was required, just as in a municipality, where each citizen could not be expected to furnish his own water supply. The Dominion Government was asked by the Yukon Board of Trade to undertake these works at public expense, but after looking into the matter found that the capital outlay would be \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000. The Government did not feel that it would be warranted in so huge an expenditure, but recognized that some system should be established for collecting water to afford facilities to the miners to work their claims. 




