OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—Before the Privileges and Elections Committee to-day Thos. McGreevy stated that in addition to the \$25,000 previously mentioned, another \$10,000 was given for the Le Monde newspaper fund. This makes \$35,000 found to have been received by Thomas through Robert, for political purposes, in eight years. The remaining \$20,000 proved not accounted for. It was, in part, expended on various campaigns and for other political purposes. Witness was asked how much he received and contributed for the local election of 1886. He declined to answer. He was treasurer for the party, and objected to be-

MR. CARLING AND THE "MEMBER OF THE FIRST FAMILY."

So far the two Parliamentary Commi cees at Ottawa have investigated frauds connected with no fewer than four of the great spending departments under control of the Dominion Government. The grossest irregularities have been found to exist in connection with-

The Department of the Interior. The Postoffice Department. The Department of Public Works.

The Department of Agriculture.

In fact there seems to be no end to the wrongful expenditure of public money, or peculation that has grown up under the present regime. The investigation of the known rascalities in the departments named is far from completion, and the Militia Department, Customs and Inland Revenue are as yet untouched.

One of the worst features of these reve lations is the supineness of the Ministers. They ask us to believe that when irregularities have taken place, when forgeries and peculation have resulted in serious loss to the public, they were in no sense responsible for the doings of their subordinates Leaving out of sight the fact that some of the Ministers personally profited through the kindness of the men who were per-mitted to rob the treasury, there are other not as yet implicated in that manner, have been proved to be guilty of the grossest regligence. If we are to believe the witness Woodward, and neither the Minis ter nor any of his associates have chosen to contradict the testimony, Mr. Carling was told in 1889 that an immigration agent under his charge had been guilty of forgery and wholesale thieving of public money.
The charge was made before the Minister by a responsible member of the civil service. It was lodged in the most circumstantial manner, and could not be misunderstood by a man of common souse who desired to understand it. But Mr. Carling would not listen to the official, probably because the alleged offender belonged "to one of the first families in Quebea," as ex-plained by the Deputy Minister, and from 1889 until last mouth, when Mr. Mc-Mullen, M.P., brought the matter before the House, this forger and thief was permitted to remain in his office, drawing public money for his services. Yet it would no be in the interests of the people to provide that only men of money should be sent to Parliament. What the taxpayers who have to pay the bill should bear in mind is that with honess, capable administrators at the nelm of affairs the business of the sessio might have been transacted in a couple of onths, and the members might have been attending to their own business instead o being engaged in investigating and bringing to light most astounding scandals, for which Ministers or their associates, or both conjoined, are responsible.

IMPORTANCE OF FORESTRY.

Bulletin No. 5, from the United State Department of Agriculture, by Prof. B. E. Fernow, chief of the Division of Forestry answers the question, "What is Forestry? in a manner not only interesting, but of practical service to the farmers of the con tinent. Apart from climatic and other considerations, no more convincing argument for the importance of this resource in a nation's economy can be offered than to state the value of the forest product in the United States. The total annual product of wood material of all sorts consumed in the United States may be valued in round numbers at \$1,000,000,000, representing, roughly speaking, 25,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood, or the annual increase of the wood growth of 500,000,000 acres of forest in fair condition. This value exceeds ten times the value of the gold and silver output, and three times the annual product of all the nineral and coal mines put together. It is three times the value of the wheat crop; and with all the toil and risk which the agricultural crops involve they can barely quadruple the value of this product yielded

by nature for the mere harvesting. The importance of forest management is therefore obvious, the two chief objects in view being: 1. To produce and reproduce certain useful material. 2. To sustain and possibly improve certain advantageous atural conditions.

Through the efforts of Ontario's forestry ommissioner, Mr. R. W. Phipps, the subect has been well kept before the attention of this Province, but certainly no more than its importance demands. DELAYED CENSUS RETURNS. A few weeks ago the census for the Dominion was promised by the 1st of July. 





MONEY IN COOSEBERRIES.

Road and Live Stock Gossip of the Week.

Prepare for Wheat Seeding. The success which has attended fall wheat growing in Weatern Ontario this season is likely to stimulate the sowing of as large if not a larger area again, providing that the price holds up strong so that there will be some encouragement to farmers in devoting their fields to this important cereal. It is now time to begin preparations for the next crop. ot be successfully grown now as in bygone days by merely tickling the soil and hrowing in the seed at the last minute. Terry, a well-known Ohio farmer, who has been most successful in growing clover, potatoes and wheat. His rotation would not suit most Ontario farmers, perhaps, but many of his points are just as good in Ontario as in Ohio. He says:

"If wheat follows oats in your rotation plow just as soon as you can get the oats off. If it is very dry I would keep on if possible, putting on a new plow point often. Then I would harrow and roll. In a few days tear the land up again and harrow and roll afterwards. The best implement I have for this deep stirring is the oatsway harrow. A disk is nearly as good. A sulky cultivator is all right, only it brings up any rubbish that may be plowed under, more or less. Use a lointer on the plow, by all means. See that it is set just right to bury all trash theely. You should have a wheel on the slow also, to keep it at a uniform depth, these things are necessary in order to do serfect tillage afterwards with the fine implements we now have. I would work this land every four or five days. If lumpy, voil and barrow alternately until fine. perfect tillage afterwards with the me im-plements we now have. I would work this land every four or five days. If lumpy, roll and harrow alternately until fine. Always work as soon as it is dry enough after a shower. Let no crust form. It has been demonstrated that if we exclude the insects entirely from white clover, by encasing it in glass or wire screen, there will be no seed formed in the heads. 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





KILLED HIS SON.

A Wealthy Eutcher Strikes a Fatal Blow Unintentionally in a Row.

Philadelphia, Ang. 7.—J. Henry Jahke, jun. aged 26 years, died on Wednesday from the effects of a blow from a piece of lead pipe in the hands of his father, J. Henry Jahke, a prominent and weaithy German butcher, residing at 3,929 Baring street, West Philadelphia. The young man was in parinership with his father in an extensive butchering business. Tuesday he remained away from the establishment and spent the time in neighboring saloons. When he returned about 10 o'clock at night his father remonstrated with him for neglecting business. The young man had a violent temper and seized his father by the threat.

The elder Jahke then picked up a small piece of lead pipe to defend himself, and struck his son on the head. The men were separated, and it was not known the young man was seriously injured until later, when he complained of feeling ill. Physicians were sent for, and they found that the left temporal bone was tractured. Soon after midnight he died. The father is almost crazed with grief, and was committed to await the coroner's inquest. Mr. Jahke is one of the most prominent German citizens in the city. He has always been a quiet man, and his close attention to business resulted in the accumulation of nearly \$500,000.
