OTTAWA, Ont., March 3.—To-day promises to be a field day in the House of Commons. Hon. David Mills will move his motion for the preliminary and revised lists of the London electorate, and may have something to say about the matter. If he does this interesting question will excite a lively debate. Mr. Mills is confident of being able to prove that while the lists were in the hands of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery a large number of names were added fraudulently. The Government naturally will seek to shield an officer who has been so particularly useful as the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and there will be trouble over it.

The Soulanges Canal scheme has attracted a good deal of attention lately, and two members of the House have given notice of their intention to bring up the matter in Parliament this afternoon. Mr. Denison will make his motion to have the construction made to a depth of twenty feet. In opposition to Mr. Denison's motion Mr. Bergeron, Deputy Speaker, who represents a constituency through which the Beauharnois Canal runs, seems to think it ought not to be built at all. Meantime contractors are most interested as to what the chances are for the calling of new tenders for the work.

Mr. Cockburn in the House to-day will likely take the preliminary steps towards securing a commission of inquiry into the claims of unpaid workmen on the Baie des Chaleurs Railway. ### IN LABOR'S FIELD.

The London Election Question Dis- Calculating the Effect of the Coming

Nearly Half a Million British Miners Will Take Part-Over 5,000,000 People will be Closely

London, March 2.—As the time approaches for the inauguration of the strike of coal miners who on March 12 will quit work for two weeks with the object of compelling such an advance in the price of coal as will prevent mine owners from reducing wages the effect on the Government can be more readily gauged. It is certain that over 1,000,000 employes will be thrown out of work by this movement, and with their families nearly 5,000,000 persons will be directly or indirectly affected. The miners themselves, 460,000 men, will take part in the strike. The outcome is watched with more than vaual interest for the attempt is on such a gigantic scale that everybody who uses coal will be either compelled to pay increased prices for fuel, or in cases of manufacturers close down their works. At Sheffield, the rolling mills and the Tillers' Association announce that the works will be closed during the miner's strike. This decision affects thousands of cutlers, grinders and forgers. All the employes of engineering works, iron foundries and wagen building works connected with Lord Durham's and Lord Londonderry's coal mines have given notice that they will suspend work. Thousands of railway employes connected with collieries will be thrown out of work. The price of coal in the Sheffield district has risen 3 shillings per ton. In Dublin the price is 4 shillings per ton higher.

The tariff is now 30 cents on barley and 45 cents on malt, against 10 and 25 cents respectively before the McKinley law went into effect. Representative Fitch has a bill reducing the duties to the latter figures. He and Representative Lockwood and Charles Stadler, ex-Senator of New York, representing the State Brewers and Maltsters' Association, appeared before a sub-committee yesterday of the Ways and Means Committee of the House in advocacy of the bill. Mr. Stadler said the McKinley Bill had ruined malting in New York State. The tariff was absolutely prehibitory. His Lordship said: "I agree that we ought not to express any opinion upon the question whether mandamus lies to a revising officer, for the reason that we were informed by counsel for all the parties that the writ had been obeyed and the rights of the parties can no longer be affected by any decision of ours. We were, however, requested to give our opinion upon the validity of the notices in question, and in deference to that request I have considered them, and I have no hesitation in saying that I consider the notices sufficient. The notice must be read with the list to which it refers just as a statement of defense is to The judgment of ! that I consider the notices sufficient. The notice must be read with the list to which it refers just as a statement of defense is to be read with reference to the statement of a claim, and that being to the objection 'not qualified' clearly and distinctly traverses the qualification specified in the list. It is not necessary to goo far as to uphold the present notices, but I am unable to see why such a specification of objections as we have here should not be sufficient to negative not merely the property or other qualification mentioned in the lists, but all the qualifications mentioned in section 3 of the act entitled "Qualifications of Voters," for the voter can never be taken by surprise by any of these objections, secing that the knowledge in respect of them all must be within his own breast. The object of the proceedings of the revising officer is to purge the roll of persons not entitled by law to exercise the franchise, and the attainment of that object should not be bridled or defeated by technical objections or by a narrow construction of the language of the enactments.
