



THE BATTLE OVER THE BORDER The United States Presidential election takes place on Tuesday next, and the present week is devoted to getting the two great opposing forces into line. It has been one of the quietest Presidential elections ever held over the border. This is in part owing to the fact that both the candidates are eminently respectable men, who may be relied on to work and act for what they believe to be the best interes:s of their native land; and partly attributable to the well-defined nature of the issues before the people. Many people affect the fore the people. Many people affect the belief that whichever way the majority go it will be a perfect landslide. They say the probable outcome of the voting it will be a perfect landslide. They say this is always the case when there is a calm campaign. There is a great deal of think-ing, a decided leaning to one side, and a big vote. The most generally accepted view, with which we agree, however, is that which looks for a very close battle, with the electoral votes from one large State, or those from several smaller divisions of the country, turning the scale either way.

It may be, of course, that the organized People's Party and the Prohibitionists, both of whom put up candidates for the Presidency, will upset all the calculations of the shrewd guessers, but the most that can be said at this store is the can be said at this stage is that outwardly both of the two big parties are claiming victory and working as if the efforts of individuals may have momentous results.

In New York and Brooklyn, the Democratic strongholds, the registration is in round numbers 50,000 more than it did in 1888, and it is conceded that at least two-thirds of this is Democratic. There is a hard fight in Democratic. There is a hard fight in Connecticut, but the Democrats say they will carry it, too. Enormous sums of money are being spent by the Republicans in Indiana, which is a doubtful State, and which was undoubtedly carried for Marie and Wich was undoubtedly carried for Washington and Washing and which was undoubtedly carried for Harrison by corrupt means in 1888, but the Democrats hope to win it also. In Michigan, where the new system of electing Presidential electors by districts has been inaugurated, the Democrats will make again of five or more. The party has little hope of victory in Illinois, Iowa or Minnesota, but there is a chance in Wisconsin. Supposing the Democrats carry the entire South. New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Wisconsin, and get five electors in Michigan and lose Indiana, they will have 228 votes. They need 223, so that they will have five to spare. of Tennyson's own poems were sung, "Crossing the Bar" and "The Silent Voices," the latter of which had been set to Voices," the latter of which had been set to music by his accomplished though invalid wife, Lady Tennyson. The words of the latter brief poem—the last the laureate ever composed—were wonderfully appropriate to the death scene at Aldworth, which Sir Andrew Clarke, the distinguished physician, said was the most glorious he ever witnessed. "When the dumb hour, clothed in black, brings the dreams around my bed," recalls a famous passage in the book of Job, which book Tennyson greatly admired and closely studied: "In thoughts from the visions of right, when deep sleep falleth on men." After a tender allusion to the lowland ways behind, and the sunlight that is gone, the poet rises to a loftfer note:

On, and always on."

It cannot, I think, rightly be said that
Tennyson's latest effusion is equal to the
ever popular "Crossing the Bar," nevertheless no lines ever written by the poet harmonize more fully with the moonlit chamber
of death. In the poem "Crossing the
Bar" there is a general misunderstanding of
the verse:

That capital P in "Pilot" has mislead
great numbers of Christian people, and
lots of preachers have quoted the last couplet, with unction, as expressive of the Christian trust that immediately on "Grossing
the Bar" the dying saint will see Jesus,
his pilot, "face to face." By the law which
theologians designate the law of accommodation, this interpretation may be permissible, but it will surprise and disappoint
many good people to learn that the allusion is not to our Savior, but to Tennyson's dead son, Lionel, to whom also the
line, "And one clear call for me" refers.
Even Sir Edwin Arnold falls into the popular error when, referring to Tennyson's
lines, he says:

"And Christ thy pilot to the peace to be."
It is almost a pity to knew too much, for
the laureate's lines henceforth lose their
sacred charm. Like the primal pair when
their eyes were opened, we pass out of a
fragrant and glowing paradise into a hard
practical wilderness world.

Some hold that they refer to French, a college chum of Tennyson's, but it is generally believed that they refer to Goethe, with special allusion to his immortal poem, "Faust." Tennyson was once asked to name the person alluded to, and he answered rather hesitatingly, as if he had almost forgotten, "I believe the allusion is to Goethe." A writer in the Ateneum tells the following story of the deceased poet, "The late William Allingham informed me that he had recently been assisting Tennyson in a removal from one of his London residences to another. The laureate was naturally solicitous respecting his books and instead of allowing the men who were carrying out the removal to pack them in cases, the poet hired a truck, or hand-cart, wherein he himself placed the volumes so precious to him, and then, assisted by Allingham, wheeled them himself triumphantly to his new abode!

After the death of the laureate, some mystery was made of the fact that there was placed in the orfin a sealed box the contents of which were secret. It seems that this was a copy of Shakespeare. The last few days of Tennyson's life, he asked for his Shakespeare and read "King Lear," "Trolius and Cressida," and "Cymbeline," through. On the last day of his life he asked for his Shakespeare. His son says, "I gave him the book, but said, 'You must not try to read.' He answered, 'I have opened the book! I looked at the book at midnight when I was sitting by him, lying dead on the Thursday, and found he had opened one of the passages which he had called the tenderest in Shakespeare. We could not part with this volume, but buried another copy of Shakespeare with him. We had the lavorite work inclosed in a metal box and laid by his side."

Tennyson was a devout believer in the

Tennyson was a devout believer in the great and holy Nazarene. Canon Benhan said in his memorial sermon, "On my las visit to him, when he lay dying, he spoke of the perfect redemption which Christ had wrought for the world." On one occasion when talking with a friend, who asked him what he thought of Jesus Christ, Tennyson, pointing to a flower, replied: "What the sun is to that flower Christ is to my soul. He is the sun of my soul." It may be of some little interest to students of his works to know that he considered the best line he ever wrote was one in "The Gardener's Daughter":

The mellow oncel fluted in the elm.
Tennyson was twice offered a baronetcy, and both times declined the honor. His elevation to the peerage was the first invisit to him, when he lay dying, he spoke

What Will Be Ecquired of Candidates Before Receiving Chartered Diplomas,

In 1891 the Chartered Stenographic Reporters' Association of Ontario was incorporated by the Provincial Legislature. At the annual general meeting held recently the following curriculum; was adopted, which will be of interest to all shorthand writers desirous of becoming members of the association:

JUNIOR CERTIFICATES.

"That persons who cannot pass the examination for membership of the association, but who desire to obtain certificates under the constitution of the association pursuant to examination according to a lower standard, be examined in the following: (1) Penmanship and typewriting; (2) spelling; (3) simple arithmetic; (4) spelling; (3) simple arithmetic; (4) geography of our own country; (5) correction of grammatical errors, with reasons for the corrections; (6) transcription, i.e., the making of a fair copy from a rough manuscript draft, in which interlineations, emendations and marginal additions have been made, the breaking of the article into additional paragraphs, etc.; (7) the writing of a letter, including the addressing of the envelope, and the indication thereon of the place for the postage stamp; (8) the writing in shorthand of a passage consisting of 400 words, in language of about the general character of that in an ordinary leading article in a newspaper, at the rate of 12 words per minute, and the transcription of any required portion thereof at the rate of 12 words per minute in longhand and 15 on the typewriter; (9) the reading of a fairly written, lithographed or engraved specimen of the style of shorthand practiced by each candidate, the passage to consist of about 200 words; (10) punctuation.

HEATING PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

A Former Londoner on the Furnace and Ventilation Question.

To the Editor of the ADVENTISER:

Reading the letter written by Mr. Jeffery in your paper has prompted me to write a few remarks on the system of school-house heating and ventilating. It is pleasing to know that the school boards of the Dominion are having their eyes opened to the fact that the heating and ventilating is not the least important matter in designing and planning of school-houses. It is not long since the subject of heating was not considered until the building was about completed; then a heating man was called in to give en estimate for heating (not ventilating) the building. Of course his object was not oscure the contract if possible. As the lowest estimator would secure it, the result was that a furnace of insufficient capacity was put in refer to secure comfort, it is necessary to raise the radiating surface to a high temperature, often to a red heat. The contraction and expansion due to such great changes of temperature soon loosen the joints of furnaces built of several pieces and permit the escape of gases of combustion into the fresh air supply. Of these gases, earbonic oxide and sliphurous acid are the most hurtful, and in violation of the planest teachings of hygiene, they contion into the fresh air supply. Of these gases, carbonic oxide and sulphirrous acid are the most huriful, and in violation of the plainest teachings of hygiene, they continue to pour forth into the almost air-tight rooms luge volumes of dry, suffocating heat laden with poisonous gases, which the occupants were compelled to inhale over and over again, along with their own vitiated breaths (there being no provision for the removing of, foul air), thus establishing in the rooms a stagmant atmospheric pool, the baneful impurities of which are destructive of health. Due to this cause largely, throat and lung affections of all kinds have within the last few years been alarmingly on the increase. It was stated some few years, ago, according to the statistics of mortality, it was estimated that 10,000 children die annually in the city of New York alone, of the effects of the vitiated air of badly ventilated schoolrooms.

Mr. Jeffery's arguments are good, and he is a man I would like to deal with in arranging for a proper and good system of heating apparatus. It is impossible to heat two large rooms and two smaller ones with cloak rooms, containing 35,000 cubic feet of space, for such sums as the lowest bids given, unless it was earried out on the plan I have just described. 

BISHOP FOWLER ON DEATH.

BISHOP FOWLER ON DEATH.

He Says His Sunday Sermon Was Not Intended to be Sensational.

New York, Nov. 2.—The dramatic sermon of Bishop George Fowler, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, at St. James' Church, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Madison avenue, on Sunday, has created a sensation in church circles. His portraiture of death, which was the subject of his sermon, was so realistic and grewsome that several women in the church were overcome and a few left before the eloquent speaker concluded. Dr. Fowler, who belongs in Minnesota, is here attending the semi-annual meeting of Methodist bishops, and a reporter interviewed him at the conference.

"I saw the account of my sermon on death in the morning papers," he said. "I suppose they wanted to get a crack at me. The point I made later about the Protestant Church in England in its struggle with Romanism was ignored. My object in delivering the sermon was to show that we are delivered from death, and to enhance the value of that deliverance I painted death as it is. I wanted to show that going into death is going into the shadow of obscurity, but that the light of faith illumines that gloom and dissipates it. I noticed that two or three persons left the church, and I thought perhaps that I was bearing a little hard on them, as they were in mourning, so I let up in my remarks. My object was not to achieve and think them over, but I do not use notes in the pulpit. This one was preached without notes."


