

Any False Step in Regard to India Wil Cause Situation Worse Than That of South Africa.

London, July 20 .- In introducing the Indian budget in the House of Commons this afternoon, Indian Secretary Morley sounded a warning note on the necessity of excluding India from the field of party politics. 

"Motherhood is the chief interest of the human race," said Professor Zeublin in his lecture. "Unsexed animals cannot attain so high a degree of development as sexed animals. Sex is necessary. Without it the greatest

progress cannot be made. "Gorky is more married to his wife than are many Americans of today. The attitude manifested by the American people toward him and his wifefor she was just as much his wife as the laws of Russia would allowseemed to be characterized by hydrophobia. At the very time that Gorky and his wife were ejected from the hotels, a third of the Americans there were in a much more objectionable marital state than he. Our society







She not only maintained the stately traditions of the viceregal court, but gave them a special attraction by her own graciousness and the devoted pride which she took in upholding the dignity and effectiveness of her husband's exalted office." The Daily Mail says: "The most

brilliant among a large group of brilliant American women who have come, to live among us, Lady Curzon combined all the intellectual force and vigor of the new world with the charm and grace and tact of the old. Much of the wonderful success of Lord Curzon's rule in India was due to his wife's quiet but strong aid."

After her marriage and before she

went to India Lady Curzon was recognized as one of the most beautiful women in London society. This was the time when her husband was under secretary for India and under secretary to the foreign office.
